Item it is presented that William <8d> Howson constructed part of one house and three gardens out
of the common. Therefore he is in mercy.

Item it is presented that John <2d> Twyssilton occupied The Crynglmyre. Therefore he is in
mercy.

Item it is presented that Christopher <4d> Clapham broke the gates of his neighbours and for
gressum[?] [a customary payment] broke their crops.

Robert <4d> Chapman broke the hedges of his neighbours. Robert <4d> Remyngton separately
broke the land with his beasts. Therefore they are in mercy.

Item the jurors say that the wife of Miles Taylzour inhabits a small cottage in Horton demised to
William Hulson by ... Talyzour, such that the aforesaid wife of Miles pays to the aforesaid
William 18s at the feast of the purification of the blessed and the aforesaid William
should be peacefully removed from the aforesaid cottage before the feast of the invention of
the holy cross next coming.

Item the jurors say that Robert Twyssilton overburdened the common pasture with 160 sheep more
than his stint [allowance]. Therefore he is in mercy 13s 4d.

Item they say that Thomas Proctour overburdened the common pasture with 80 sheep. Therefore
he is in mercy 6s 8d.

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Item they say that Sir George Darcy built a house, breaking the lord's soil. Therefore he is in mercy 20d.

Item they say that Henry Pudsey, as an ~~improvement~~ <increase>, broke the common pasture. <He broke the moor.> 20d.

To this court came William Cott and took his tenement from the Lord Abbot and Convent of Jervaulx, yielding 16s per annum.

Item to this court came Thomas Bentham of Stoddefald and took his tenement from the Lord Abbot, yielding 8s 1d per annum to ~~the~~ the house of Jervaulx on the 8th day of April.

And before Robert, Abbot of Jervaulx, came William de Hermetsted and took the tenement lately in the tenure of William Cott, yielding 16s 5d per annum, and he gave 16s in relief to the Lord Abbot.
