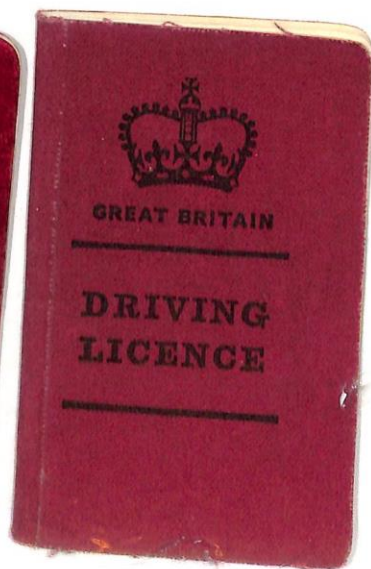
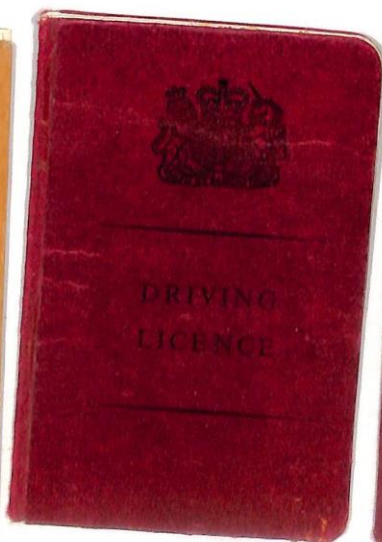
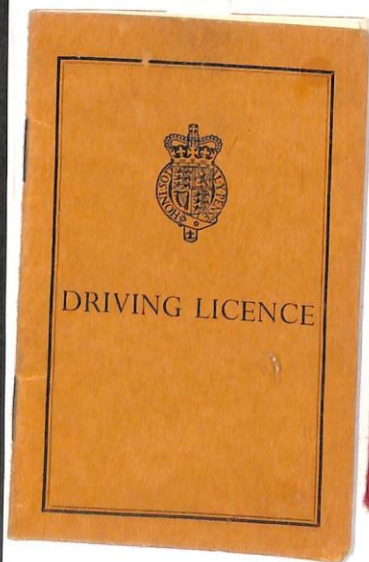

AT a representative Meeting of the inhabitants of Settle, held under the auspices of the Settle Parish Council, it was decided that the Commemoration of the Coronation of Their Majesties King George VI and Queen Elizabeth should be celebrated by Festivities to be held on Wednesday, May 12th, 1937, the Coronation Day.

It is proposed that the Festivities take the form of a Public Procession, a Tea for all children under 15 years of age and for persons of 65 years of age and over, Sports, Fancy Dress Parades, Fireworks Display, Folk Dancing, etc. It is also proposed to give to all Settle children under 15 years of age on 12th May next, a china Beaker.

Committees have been formed to arrange for the above events, and it has been decided to appeal to the inhabitants of Settle for Subscriptions to carry out this programme.

The Committee trusts that the response to its appeal for Funds will be generously responded to, in order that this historical event may be celebrated and commemorated in the same worthy manner as former similar events have been celebrated in Settle in the past.

POMP, PAGEANTRY AND PLEASURE

Settle Elizabethan Fayre triumph

As the midnight hour chimed and brought to a close a Saturday which had been fair and sunlit in the afternoon, and pleasantly warm at evening, the Coronation lights in Settle were dimmed, and on lofty Castleberg the Union Jack was lowered: below in the ancient market place the crowds—in their many hundreds—sang the National Anthem to end what had been unquestionably the gayest day in Settle's gayest week.

All through the day they had jostled and crowded in the Market Place, bannered and sung with greenery, and looking very much a bit of Old England.

From there they had seen their Coronation Queen, Miss Marion Johnson, and her pages and attendants, move in stately procession from the Town Hall steps to her throne—kindly oiled by the Settle Rural District Council—on a raised lais in the Square.

They heard the Town Crier Mr. Basil Moule who probably was unable to say a word all Sunday, ring his bell and yell silence for Her Majesty. The strolling players—the Settle and Giggleswick Silver Band—halted their melody and the Queen commanded the Fayre to begin and also declared a Coronation amnesty for the helpless knave imprisoned in genuine stocks at her feet. He, Mr. Charles Lawson, thanked her in a flowing, gesturing oration which was seen, but not heard, like a scene from a silent film, because he was not allowed a microphone like the queen.

He was then free to direct the "fun of the fayre" as it is called, with his chosen cronies who, divested of camouflage, were Messrs. E. Wiseman, J. Hargreaves and J. Leeming. They had some lemonade, and proceeded to spend a jolly afternoon belting each other from a greasy pole.

3,000 watch Car Rally

Settle's Market Place, very decidedly Elizabethan throughout the day, went 20th Century with a vengeance for the period that the North Ribblesdale Motor Club staged their Coronation Rally in the evening; brakes screeched, engines roared and the crowds—some 3,000 of them—gasped as the drivers put their machines through the final elimination tests.

Some of the onlookers, stepping in where good pedestrians would fear to tread, crowded dangerously near in the braking and acceleration tests, and, in the cause of humanity, that part of the rally was abandoned.

There were 27 entrants, who left Goldielands Garage, Settle, at timed intervals for the 30 mile course which

Roy Hepworth, now living in Bristol, sheds some light on the date of last month's photograph and the reference to a 'No coupon' store: "It wasn't just food that was rationed during World War Two - clothing also became scarce and clothes rationing began on 1 June 1941, two years after food rationing started. Clothes rationing ended on 15 March 1949, which suggests to me that coupons were not required to purchase goods of that particular stall."
