LIBERAL CLUB.—At the annual general meeting of this club, held on Wednesday evening, Mr. William Dawson was elected chairman, and a considerable number of members were in attendance. The treasurer's financial report showed that the club had improved and was in a satisfactory position. The election of officers for the ensuing year then took place. Mr. Isaac Holden, M.P., was elected president; and Mr. Hector Christie, Mr. T. Brayshaw, Mr. Walter Morrison, Mr. Henry Hartley, and Mr. W. A. Robinson, vice-presidents. Mr. G. M. Robinson was re-elected hon. secretary, and Mr. Christopher Graham under-secretary, and Mr. W. Overing treasurer. Papers were selected for the next six months. A vote of thanks was accorded to Mr. G. M. Robinson, Mr. W. Overing, and other officers for their services during the past year, and to the chairman of the meeting.

THE NEW GASWORKS.—New gasworks have just been erected for Settle on the south-west side of the town. The buildings and plant are of the most modern and approved kind, and not only will the inhabitants now receive an increased pressure of superior gas, but the works are capable of affording a supply of gas to the neighbouring villages of Giggleswick and Langcliffe, which are still without gas. The diameter of the gasometer is 46ft., by 15ft. deep, and its holding capacity is nearly 28,000 cubic feet. The entire cost of the new works, inclusive of site, is over £3000. Mr. Jno. Laycock, of Keighley, has been the engineer; Messrs. Harzer Bros., Settle, contractors for the buildings; and Messrs. Clapham Bros., Keighley, for the ironwork. It may be stated that Settle gasworks were constructed shortly before 1856 at Upper Settle, about 30ft. above the level of the town, and from that period until last Friday the town has received its supply of gas from that source, which has, by extra pressure, been forced down hill. The gas, for which the consumers were compelled to pay 7s. 6d., 6s. 8d., 5s. 10d., 5s. 5d., and latterly 5s. per 1000 feet, was of such a quality that numerous complaints were naturally made, and when the works became an absolute nuisance a number of the inhabitants memorialized the Local Government Board for their removal; hence a more suitable site on the south-west or lower side of the town was purchased, and new, suitable, and convenient works have been constructed. Consumers are now asking how soon they will be able to have gas at less than 5s. per 1000 feet.


Dear Sir,
