Dear Mr. Riddiough,

A week or two ago I sent you a copy of a letter which I wrote to our local Parish Council on the subject of Children's road-safety. Consequently I felt that I should also send you a copy of their reply. It must seem that I have a road-safety bee in my bonnet, but as you know the road through our village, I trust that you do not feel that I am overstating the case or making a nuisance of myself!

When I wrote to the council, I was well aware that they, as an Authority, were practically powerless to assist, but I did hope that they might send the points I made on to the RDC, the WRCC, the police, or someone. However, I gather that they do not propose to do so, as they feel that higher authority is already well aware of the dangers. As for the points made by the Parish Council in their letter; I have spoken to the parents, I have made fluorescent jackets available, and I arranged transport for the epileptic child with Mr. Grimoldby a couple of weeks ago.

The copy of the council's letter is below. When you have read it, I would be most grateful if you would give me your advice as to whether I should raise these points elsewhere, or whether I have already stirred things up enough and am flogging a dead horse!

Dear Mr. Brinley,

The Council wish me to thank you for your letter of 18th ult. to which they gave full consideration, and whilst appreciating all you say is quite true, the views which they expressed are that perhaps it would be possible for you to meet the parents and try to persuade them to supply their children with fluorescent jackets and/or accompany the children to school for a few weeks.

This Council has been pressing the Authorities for years to do something about the dangerous road through the village and at long last priority has been granted and alterations are to start next year.

The suggestion you made about an alternative route from Cragg Hill Rd. to the Golden Lion; this was discussed years ago and turned down as no footpath exists.

Mention was also made about one child who suffers from fits. I had no knowledge of this, but the Councillors wondered if some transport

could not be arranged for a case of this nature.

I am sorry the Council cannot do more. The solution is alteration of the highway and we can only hope it is done within the next few months.

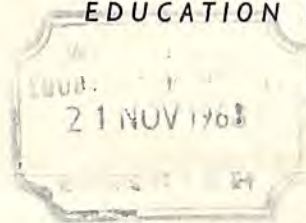

Dear Sir,

Road Safety - Horton in Ribblesdale Schoolchildren

I am concerned, as also, I understand, was my predecessor, about the safety of children who have to walk to and from school along the main road through this village. At the moment, twenty-one of the children on roll live in the Beecroft/Cragg Hill/Billygarth area, and it would appear that this figure will remain fairly constant through the years. All these children have to walk along the stretch of main road from the Cooperative Society shop to the Golden Lion Hotel. This stretch of road is extremely narrow, is bounded by stone walls, includes two hump-backed bridges on a corner with appallingly bad visibility and has no speed limit. It is used by a very heavy volume of traffic, a large proportion of which comprises heavy lorries and tankers travelling to and from the quarries. Although it is true to say that most drivers are most careful, there are some who appear to show little care and attention, to put it mildly! I list below some factors which may help in any consideration of this matter, and would be most grateful to receive the views of the Parish Council about them.

(a) This winter, and for the remaining winters of the 'Summertime' experiment, children will be walking to school in the dark.

(b) Many children are wearing fluorescent jackets, but these have to be bought by the parents and thus we cannot guarantee that all children will have them.

(c) The Butts Lane/Vicarage Lane short-cut still leaves the bridges to be negotiated, and is in any case not suitable in wet weather.

(d) The LEA are not in a position to supply transport, as all these children live less than two miles from the school.


(e) I understand that there was, at one time, a right of way from the Golden Lion, through the meadows to the river and thus to Cragg Hill road via a bridge which has been swept away, and I wonder whether this could be reinstated.

(f) A temporary expedient might be something in the nature of a 'Lollipop' man to see the children over the bridges.

I do realise that road-safety presents problems almost everywhere and that many of them are insoluble. If, however, a local solution is possible without causing too much controversy, I feel we should work for it.

The possible need for alterations in the times of school sessions during the shorter days of mid-winter following the introduction of British Standard Time has now been fully discussed with due regard to Head Teachers' observations and suggestions.

The majority view, accepted by the District Sub-Committees, is that no alterations should be made in the times of school sessions for the time being but the question could be reviewed later in the light of experience.

The Settle District Education Sub-Committee, however, suggest that parents should be asked to consider seriously the provision of fluorescent jackets for their children and indeed certain Head Teachers have raised this matter through their Parent/Teacher's Association and suitable jackets have been obtained for re-sale to the children.

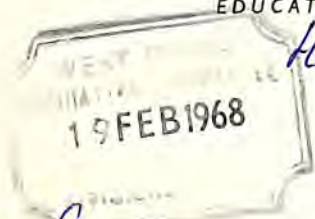

OUT OF SCHOOL ACTIVITIES.

(a) INSURANCE OF PUPILS VISITING FACTORIES.

(b) INSURANCE OF TEACHERS

(a) Insurance of pupils visiting factories.

It is apparent that many teachers are not clear as to the extent to which insurance cover is available when they arrange for pupils to visit industrial undertakings for observation or for work "sampling". So far as educational visits in general are concerned most teachers will be aware that the insurance position is summarised in Appendix 29 of the Education Committee's Handbook as follows:-

"Under the Third Party (Scholars) Policy which is in operation, the County Council are indemnified against all sums for which they may be held legally liable in respect of accidental personal injury to any scholars when on visits in the course of their instruction. The policy also indemnifies the teachers escorting such scholars."

So far as works visits are concerned the County Council's insurers have by agreement extended the cover afforded by this policy to provide similar indemnity in respect of the firm's legal liability for accidental personal injury to a scholar whilst the scholar is under the control of the particular organisation which is being visited.

The legal liability of the Authority, the teacher or the management of the firm concerned is covered in respect of accidental personal injury which may be sustained by a pupil of any age whilst on a visit to a factory for observation purposes only. If, however, it is intended that the pupils should take any part, however small, in the work which is being carried on at the factory, then, whilst this insurance cover would apply so far as pupils over the statutory leaving age are concerned it must be borne in mind that if any work is undertaken in any place covered by the provisions of the Factories Act, by pupils under the statutory school leaving age such pupils would be regarded as employed for the purposes of the Factories Acts and such employment would be illegal.

(b) Insurance of Teachers.

The Authority have effected, through their insurers, the following personal cover for teachers who may suffer an accident whilst engaged in an approved out of school activity:-

- (a) (i) In respect of personal loss or injury to a teacher arising directly out of voluntary participation by the teacher in school activities outside the scope of his contract of service:

Death	£5,000	} or an equivalent annuity.
Loss of one or more hands feet or eyes	£2,500	
Permanent total disablement (not otherwise compensated above)	£5,000	

- (ii) In respect of claims preferred against a teacher by a Third Party arising directly out of voluntary participation by the teacher in school activities outside the scope of his contract of service:

An indemnity in respect of such damages and costs as may be awarded against him or paid under terms of settlement approved by the Authority.

Participation in the following activities would be excluded under heading (a) (i):

- (a) Professional Football
- (b) Ice Hockey
- (c) Polo
- (d) Hunting
- (e) Racing, of any kind other than on foot
- (f) Flying, other than to and from destination by recognised air services.
- (g) Mountaineering - unless such activity is held within the British Isles, and carried out by teachers whilst in the course of instruction of pupils.

The County Council's existing Third Party Insurance Policies have not in the past covered Third Party Claims preferred against a teacher, in the circumstances referred to in head (a) (ii), when such claims arose out of the use of a motor vehicle. The County Council's Insurers however, have now extended the Third Party Contingency Motor Vehicles Policy to indemnify the County Council and teachers against Third Party claims arising from the use of a teacher's car for an Educational Out of School Activity. This extension will also cover legal liability in the event of a teacher's motor insurance being inadequate whilst carrying a pupil to meet the requirements of an emergency.

In all cases where an accident occurs a teacher must initially make a claim on his own Insurers.

Where a teacher's own Insurance Policy does not for any reason cover damage to his car or where it can be shown that a no-claim bonus is forfeited solely as a result of an accident of the type referred to in the scheme, the Education Committee may at their discretion reimburse the expenditure or loss incurred up to a maximum figure of £15 for a forfeited no-claim bonus.

Dear Mr. Riddiough,

I have addressed this letter to you personally as it does one good on occasions to explode confidentially!

Mrs. Kinder, our part-time teacher, has been appointed to a full-time post at Settle CE School for next term, as she was hoping. Thus, the part-time post here falls vacant. As you will know, Mrs. Clark, who has been teaching our infants this term as a relief teacher, will not be carrying on next term. In her place, I shall have Mrs. Graham, a retired teacher, for a term. I agreed to this with some reluctance, but there appeared to be no one else available. As she had been suggested to me by the Chairman of Managers, who had already spoken to her, and as your staff had no objections when I telephoned, and explained her rather peculiar superannuation position to me, and indeed as I had been told by her previous head that she was 'well thought of' by Miss Imrie, I had very little choice. It would have been rather churlish not to have agreed to her appointment. Indeed, I must admit that having met her I find her a very pleasant person and things will probably be all right.

After that preamble, I must tell you that Mrs. Clark offered to take over the part-time post. I was delighted, as she is a fine teacher, popular with the children here and well liked by the staff. Knowing what difficulties have arisen at other times when part time staff or relief staff were being sought, I considered our problem to be well solved. I wrote to the Chairman, expecting, in all honesty, pleasure and 'rubber-stamp' agreement. I received from him a confidential letter giving very reluctant agreement, and no approval whatever, on the grounds of a mother's first duty being to her own young children and not to work for extra money! I can see the fundamental sense of this, but today I rang him to explain what local difficulties are and to say how lucky we were, in effect, to find Mrs. Clark. I pointed out, also, the the managers have had Mrs. Morphet, Mrs. Middleton and Mrs. Kinder, in addition to Mrs. Clark, on the staff while they had children of their own of under school age. The appointment of Mrs. Clark I recommended strongly, and I have been told that this will be done. However, in the course of conversation, the Chairman told me that 'many people locally think that the school is overstaffed anyway' and that I, of course, would want a spare teacher as 'it made my life easier.' Now I have no wish to dispute with authority, but I would like to be assured that I do not go too far in these matters. There are points within my professional competence that I do not intend to compromise about. I have told Mr. Stringer that the size of the staff of any school is a LEA matter and that I am not prepared to accept anything less than the official figure. As to whether a school is adequately staffed or whether

teachers are needed and are correctly employed, I think Managers should take the professional advice of the Head which they appoint. Can you tell me whether I am right in this, and whether there are any other local schools where this kind of problem arises?

I like life in Horton, but I would be much happier if I felt that I was being backed up by the managing body all the time.


Thank you for your letter of 27th February. I hope your confidential explosion helped!

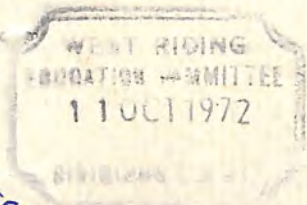

He came in to see me at the beginning of term in the middle of a school session. As far as I can remember I told him to deliver the same number of pints as Mr. Mattinson. I have now discovered that he has in fact been delivering 14 pints a day.

He came in to see me again today although he had already been seen by Mrs Metcalfe, ^{about a month} so I felt obliged to pay him out of my own pocket for the ~~mess~~ extra milk (20 pints). He was offered ~~one-pound-in-payment~~ the full amount in payment but as he had no change he accepted the sum of one pound in payment.

The extra milk as with any milk left over was drunk by the children.





INTERNAL PAINTING

I refer to your letter of the 6th November, 1972.

The assertions of the caretaker are not in accordance either with the facts or the Authority's policy. It is not a fact that gloss paint is put on walls six months after their initial coat.
