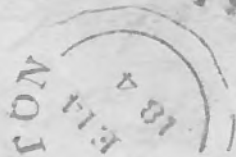

Gentlemen

I write to Beg that you will not forget me at the time you divide your poor money amongst those poor of your Township who are not receiving relief from you as paupers, It is now 18 years since I troubled you as such, and during that time I have Experienced a many difficulties in Rearing a large family, but still I withheld from calling upon you for assistance, being determined to act with Independence as long as possible I have Bound two of my sons to trades at a great sacrifice on my part, one being 19 the other 17 years of age, their wages at present being only 3 Shillings per week each - their trades being one a Mechanic the other an Engraver - Gentlemen I trust you will do me Justice and assist me as much as is consistent with your mode of acting upon such occasions observe I am growing ^{old} and Infirm being 56 years of Age, trusting to your Generosity I conclude with remaining your

Gentlemen

I make Bold to write to you - The Reason of me writing is, that the time is nearly at Hand, when you distribute your poor Money, to those of your poor, who are not Regular paupers, and receiving parish relief - it is 19 years since I ever troubled you in that way - during that time I have had hard Struggling with a large family some of whom are not earning any thing, and I have 2 Sons the one 20 the other 18 years that only Brings 7 Shillings per week in between them, I have them apprenticed to trades, I am getting old and infirm with bad Health - So gentlemen I trust you will act with Justice and Liberality towards me
