Dear Sir,

Water Supply - Lawkland.

I have now received from the Craven Water Board definite terms on which they will bring a supply of water from Cross Streets to a point at the rear of the cottages in Lawkland. From this point it will be the responsibility of individual Owners to pipe the water to their own premises.

The Board will require a contribution of £550, and it will be necessary to consider how this should be shared amongst those who will benefit.

As a basis for discussion, I put forward the following proposal :-


I suggest a meeting of those concerned to take place at Lawkland Hall at 6.30 p.m. on Wednesday next, October 12th when this idea can be further considered.

The Craven Water Board appear ready to go ahead with this scheme almost immediately, if I can let them know that all the potential consumers are agreeable, so I hope you will be able to attend on Wednesday, or let me know your views beforehand.

It will, no doubt be possible for a grant to be obtained on the Agricultural part of the cost, and this can be taken up with the Ministry of Agriculture, but the first step is to obtain the agreement of all parties to join in.

The contribution of £550 is slightly more than the estimated cost of bringing a private system from Mr. Fawcett's trough to the same position, but under the scheme now suggested all future maintenance will be the responsibility of the Board, and a completely new main will be laid all the way from Cross Streets, following the road, which will avoid the necessity of building a storage tank.
