#### SUCCESSSES WITH CATTLE.

In the cattle classes, Mr. C. Wolfenden, Crooks Farm, scored several notable victories. The two animals with which he took premier awards for cows were a light roan and a red cow, both newly calved and in rare bloom. These were in competition with each other in the class for newly-calved cows, and the judges had to call in a referee for a decision. The first prize was given to the red cow, which also won the special award for the best dairy cow in the show. The light roan took the premier prize for the best female animal, a class in which the other was not eligible for competition, but the red cow was successful in a special class for the best dairy cow or heifer in the show.

In the class for the best cow in calf, the first prize went to Mr. J. Chapman, Rowe End, with a light roan cow due to calve early next month. Mr. J. W. Morphet's light roan, due to calve in October, took second place, and Mr. Wolfenden won third prize with a light roan cow due to calve in November.

Mr. J. Morphet, Blind Beck, with a well grown heifer, won the class for heifers over 12 months and still possessing calf teeth. Red in colour, the heifer is within a month of two years and due to calve within that period.

In the classes for bulls, Messrs. T. Newhouse and Sons, South House, made an almost clean sweep of first prizes, the only class in which they did not win being that for members of the Horton Calf Club, a class in which they did not compete. The bull which gained a series of successes was a dark roan under 12 months in age, but showing very promising qualities.
