- 002050 Letter from Church Commissioners to Rev. H.Elliott: Repairs ordered by the Diocese Dilapidation Board in 1950 estimated at £115. So far (4.10.51) £123 spent & has approved a grant of £84.1.8
- 002051 Dilap Board gave grant of £20 towards cost of buying Rayburn cooker - £61 (25.10.51)
- 002057 In interregnum one of churchwardens, A.Greenbank, got estimate for outside painting of £54.19.4
- 002066 1955: estimated cost of repairs = £160. List of these repairs given on next 3 pages.
- 002081 Church Commissioners give annual grant of £11.2.2 towards repair assessment. P.C.C. provide the balance of the annual payment. Increased in 1955 from £29.9.11 to £36.11.8
- 002085 P.C.C. contribute £25.9.6 per annum to delapidations
- 002098 Loan of £171 over 10 yrs to P.C.C. from Delap. Board
- 002100 Repairs cost £20.7.11 Delap Board suggests P.C.C. pays this, which P.C.C. did by 23.10.59
- 002107 12.11.59: P.C.C. paid E.Fercy £20.17.3
- 002113 "The Board realises that the Parish have already done a lot to the house and that abnormally generous help will be required towards the deficit"
- 002120 1.5.61: P.C.C. to pay £47.10.0 to Delap. Board

Church appeal raises the roof

FOR hundreds of years St Oswald's Church at Horton-in-Ribblesdale withstood the harsh weather of the Yorkshire Dales.

But centuries of wind, rain and snow took their toll, and eventually the roof could take no more. In November 1988 it was also discovered the heating boiler was on its last legs, the organ needed a complete overhaul and the church bells had to be put back into action.

An initial quote for £68,000 was given, and the Parochial Church Council launched the biggest appeal the village had ever seen with a pancake party on Shrove Tuesday, 1989.

This Tuesday the Bishop of Bradford, the Rt Rev David Smith, will attend a thanksgiving service to mark the end of the fundraising — exactly seven years to the day since the appeal began.

The work is now complete except for a small amount of fine-tuning, and the total raised has reached a staggering £93,752. Horton-in-Ribblesdale has only 420 residents, and that means £223 for every man, woman and child.

This week appeal chairman George Perfect and appeal secretary Sheila Haywood praised the enormous efforts of the community. It wasn't only St Oswald's church-goers who had helped, but people of every age and denomination.

People and organisations outside the village also gave their support — some from as far away as Canada!

"With tooth-gritted determination, local people have put in an enormous amount of effort to help raise funds," said Miss Haywood. "People have really given us the most wonderful

backing, and we appreciate everything that has been done.

"I have in mind that nothing will need to be done to the church now for at least the next hundred years — and that will be down to future generations."

Mr Perfect added: "It's been a very united effort and I have worked with a very loyal and

hard working committee. There has never been anything done of such a large scale in the village — it's a step in the history of Horton-in-Ribblesdale."

The appeal began with the setting up of an action group with the help of the former vicar, the late Rev Neville Coulton. The group approached

English Heritage and was awarded a grant for £22,000 — leaving £46,000 to be raised.

Mr Perfect was elected appeal chairman, and local celebrity supporters — Thelma Barlow, who plays Mavis in Coronation Street, writer and actor Alan Bennett, comedian, musician and photographer Mike Harding and Norman Adams, Keeper of the Royal Academy — were recruited as patrons, along with the former Bishop of Bradford Roy Williamson and his successor David Smith.

At the end of the appeal locals had raised £48,517 through fundraising ideas, and grants and donations from charities and companies totalled £45,235.

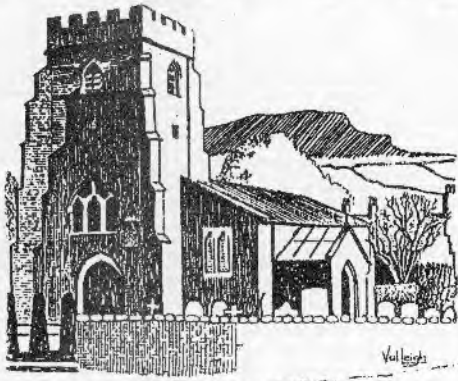
● To mark the seven year effort the appeal committee has produced a booklet, recording the years of fundraising.

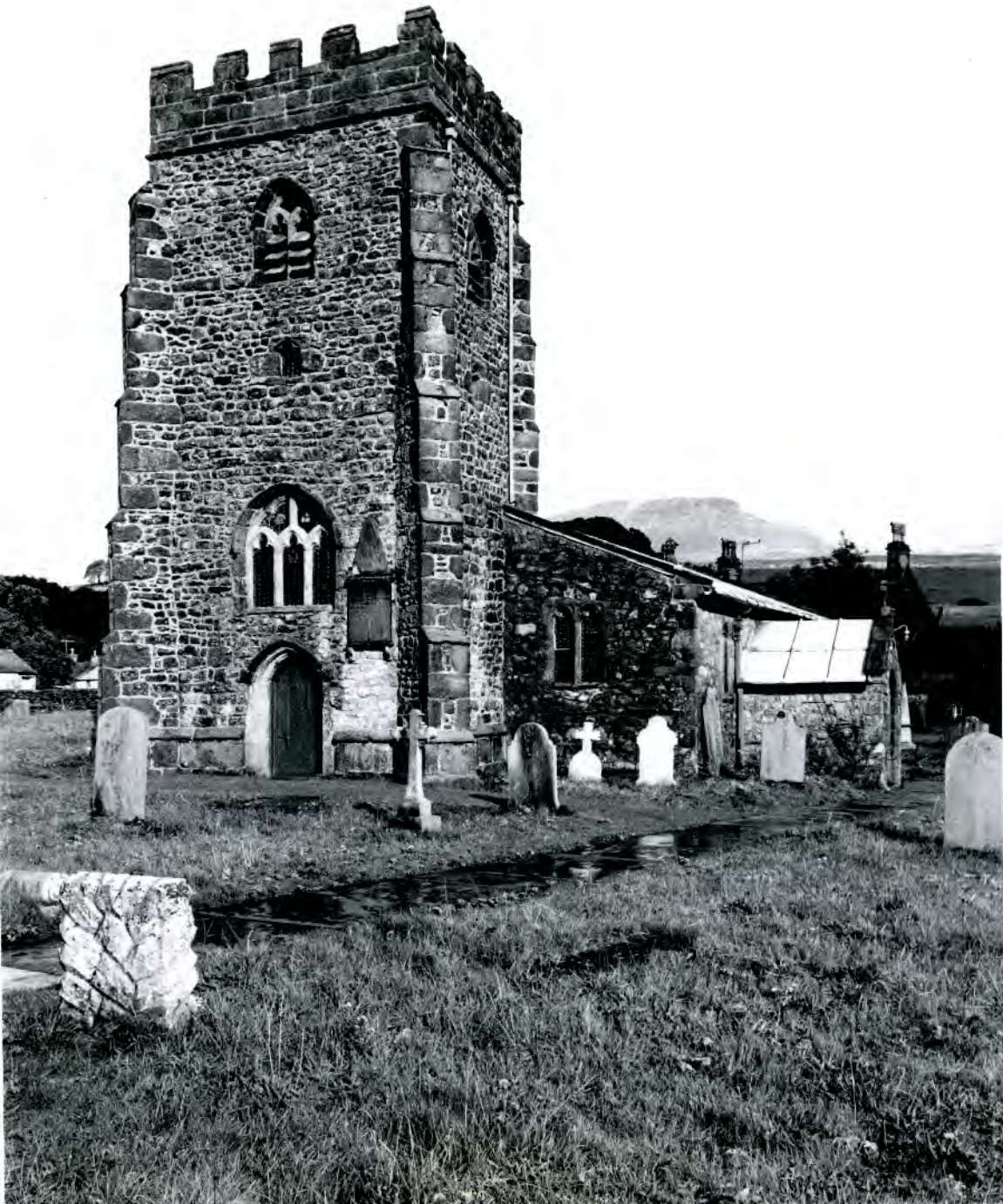

The Brass Cross is a memorial to Thomas Ion, 33 years Sexton who died in office November 4th 1903.

The Windows

The East window of the Chancel and that of the South Aisle are both examples of Victorian stained glass.

The Chancel window has three lights representing: The Nativity: The Crucifixion: The Ascension. The window was given by the Foster Family in memory of John William Foster 1879.

The two light window at the East end of the South Aisle represents the Raising of the Widow's Son at Nain. This window is in memory of Thomas Foster who died in Canada in 1880 and Bryan Heseldon Foster who died in 1889.

The West window contains three fragments of pre-Reformation glass. The Mitred head of Thomas a Beckett Archbishop of Canterbury. A portrait of the Blessed Virgin Mary. A portion of an heraldic shield believed to be part of the coat of arms of Jervaulx Abbey in Wensleydale who owned land in Horton.

The windows on the South and North sides of the church are filled with tinted glass in a pleasing chevron pattern. The windows on the North side were inserted in 1879 to replace ugly sash windows of wood.

The Lady Chapel

At the East end of the South Aisle was Dedicated by the Bishop of Bradford on Sunday April 17th 1969. The seats formerly facing the Chancel were shortened and turned to face East and refixed on a new floor. The existing floor was raised to form the Sanctuary.

The Altar Rail and Credence were made from the remaining oak. The Altar is the one removed from the Chancel when the new High Altar was purchased in 1946. The Altar Pall, Carpet and Curtains were purchased from the sum of £100 bequeathed by the late Mr A. Hall 'for the adornment of Horton-in-Ribblesdale Church'. Other furnishings were given by parishioners.

Church Plate

This consists of one Silver Chalice bearing the Hall and date marks of York 1679 Maker Marmaduke Best.

One large silver Chalice inscribed "The gift of Mrs Jane Wilson relict of Mr Thomas Wilson late of Beecroft. Anno Salutis Humanae." 1722. London Hall Mark 1722.

One large silver Footed Paten with similar inscription. Hall Mark 1717. Maker John Boddington. Amorial bearing on Chalice and Paten

A wolf salient and in chief a fleur-de-lis between two roundels.

One silver Wine Flagon date 1906

One silver Wafer Box date 1948

One modern silver Paten to match the 1679 Chalice

One silver Communion Service for use at the Communion of sick. Given by the parishioners to commemorate the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Victoria. June 1897.

Two large Pewter Flagons without spouts c. 1700 said to have been filled with warm ale and handed round the company at funerals.

Electric Lighting

Was installed in 1937 through the generosity of members of the Langstroth family residing in U.S.A.

"In memory of their Ancestors 1559—1767."

Registers, Books and Documents

The Registers commence in 1556 and except for one or two pages which are missing continue to the present time. In 1597 the burial of 74 persons is recorded. Horton evidently had a plague. On April 3rd 1821 George Metcalfe of Horton was buried, aged 100.

The Churchwardens Accounts for 1800 show the various activities and business of the Parish. The Accounts of the Overseers of the Poor provide an interesting commentary on the so called 'good old days.'

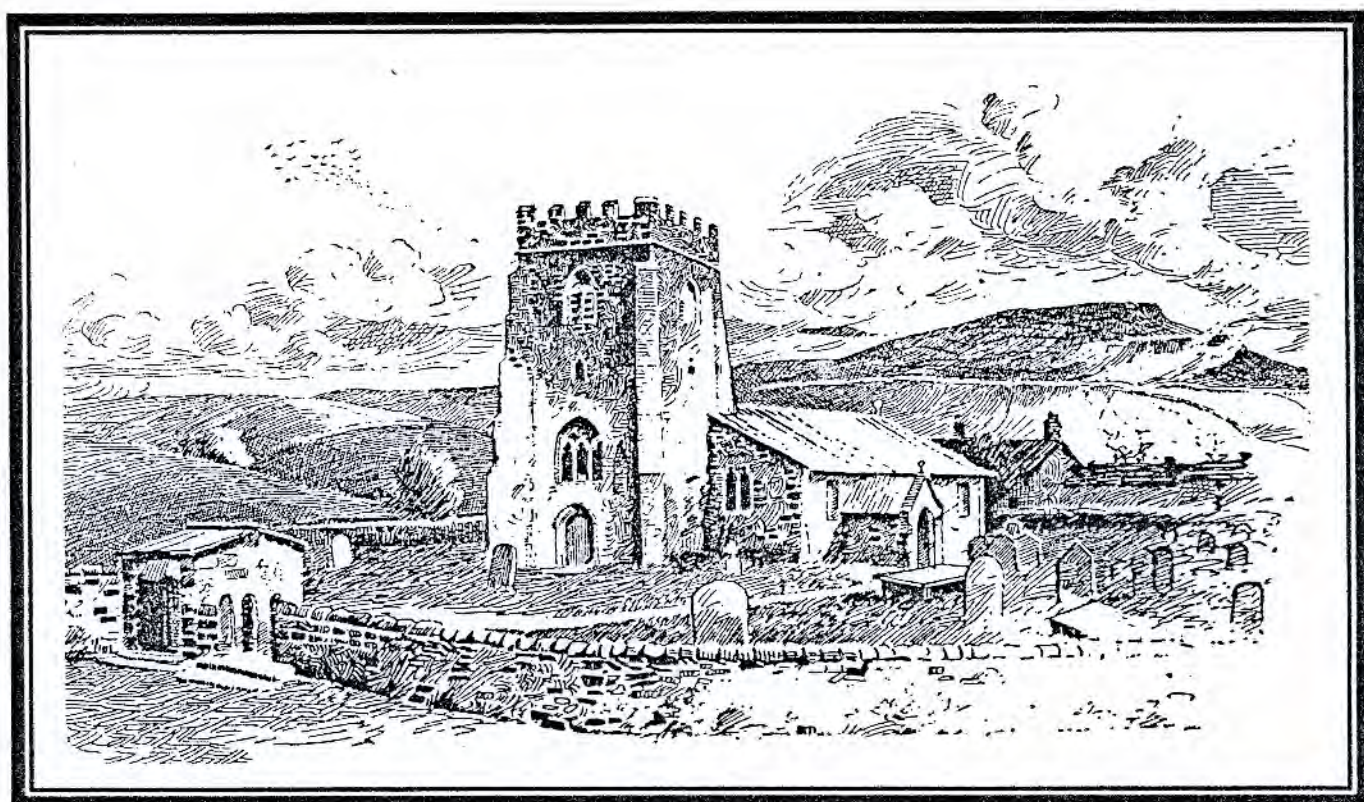








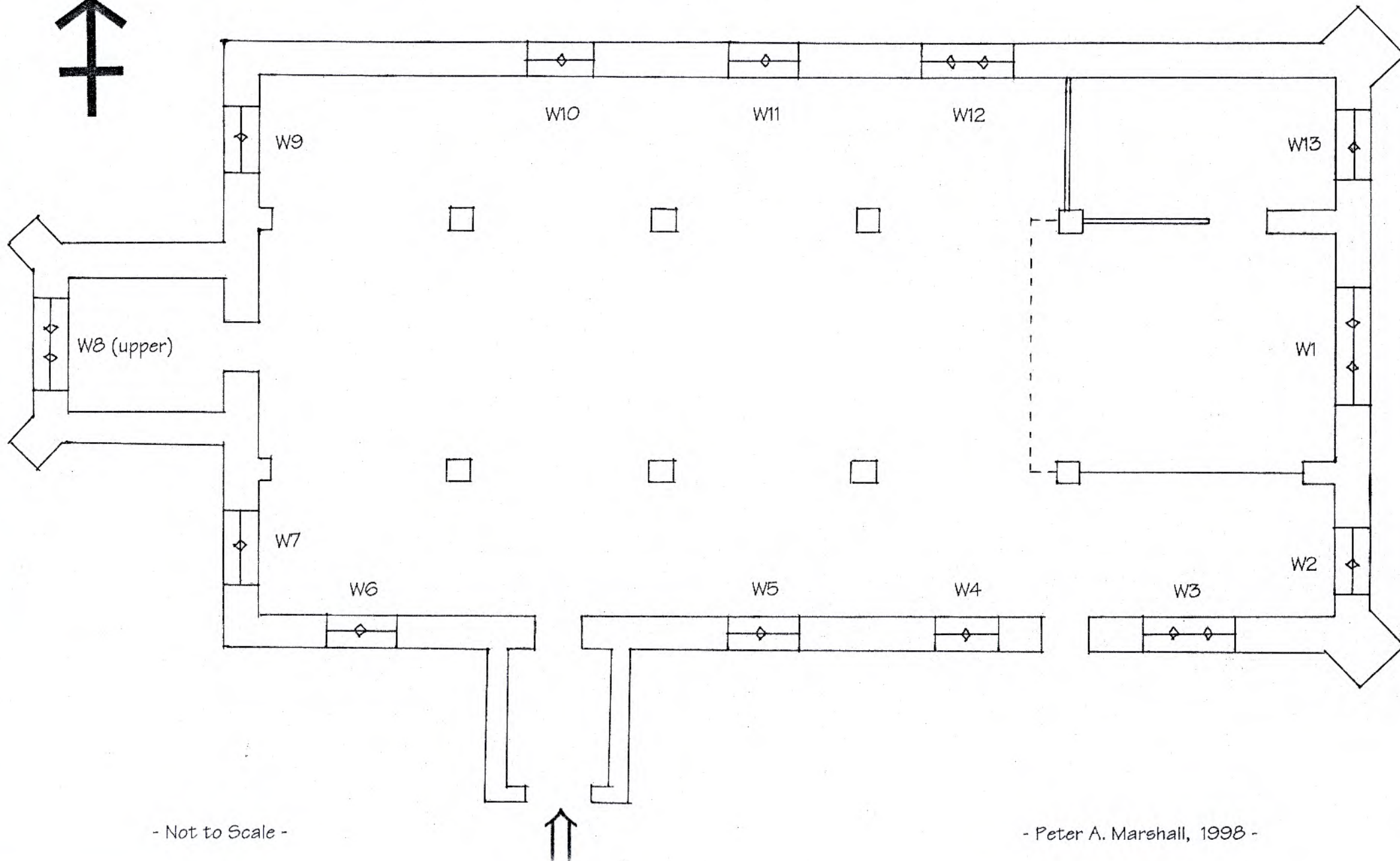

3 lights, the glass being similar to W5.

2 lights, the glass being similar to W5.

2 lights, the glass being similar to W5.

W8.

This window contains 3 small examples of probably 16th Century glass which was situated in the East Window until the 1880 renovation:

On the left is the upper part of an unidentified figure holding a shield.

On the right is a head, complete with mitre, and staff, carrying the name of
"Thomas Cantuar".

This is identical to a figure of Thomas à Becket in the chapel of Holy Trinity in Canterbury Cathedral.

The lower glass shows part of a shield:

Vairy Argent and Gules, within a border Azure bezanty.

This was attributed to Jorevall (Jerveaux) Abbey by Dr. Whittaker in 1807, but there is no record of a border being used by this institution. In a revision of Whittaker's work in 1878, Alfred W. Morant suggested it could refer, inter alia, to the families of De-la-River or Marmaduke.

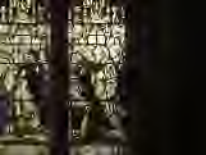
