DR. BUTTERTON.

REV. GEORGE ASH BUTTERTON, born 1805, and educated at Shrewsbury. Appointed Head Master of Giggleswick School 1846, which he resigned 1859, after raising the school to a high standard, and being held in great esteem by all. Died at Rhyl, August, 1891.

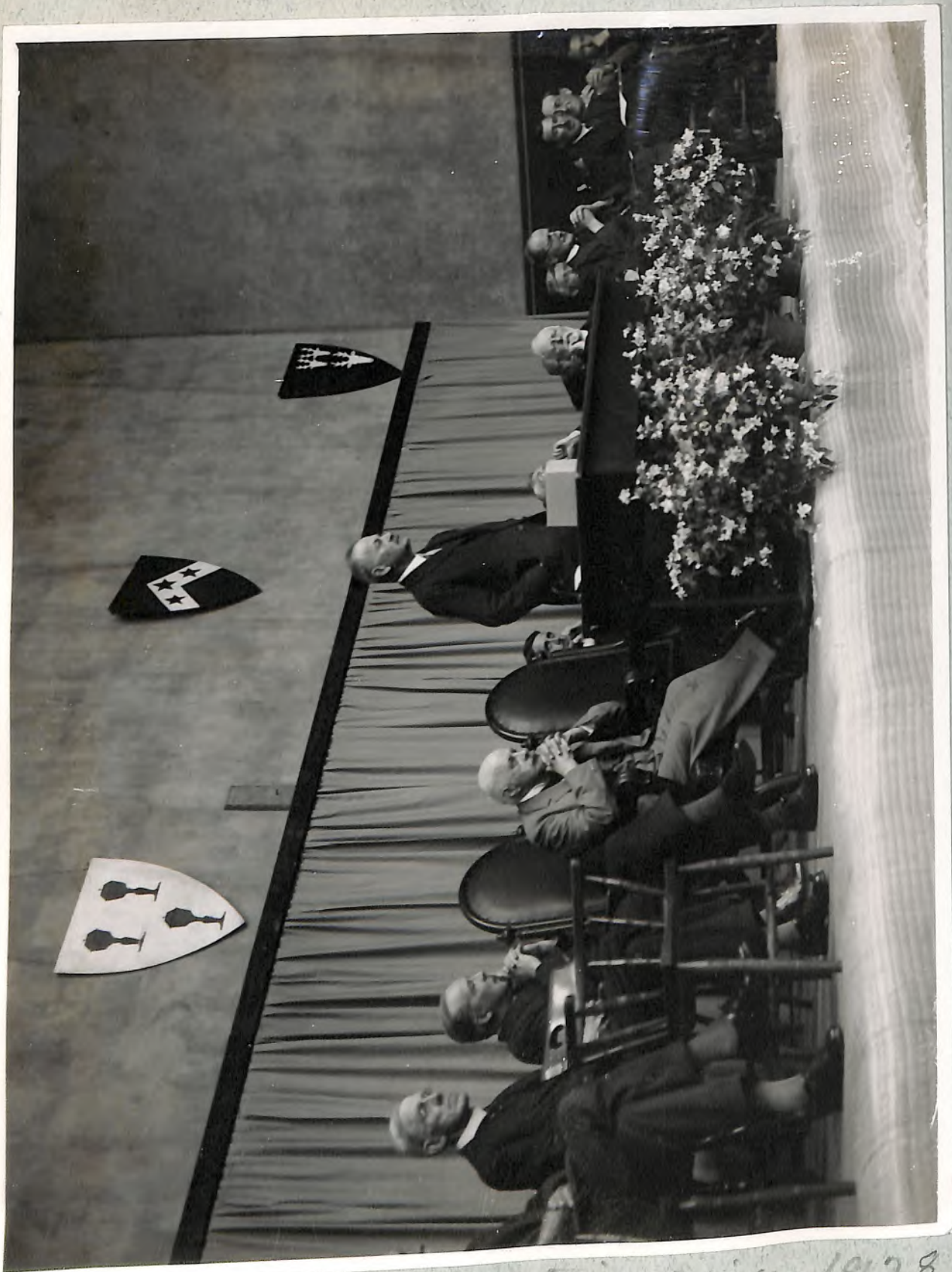

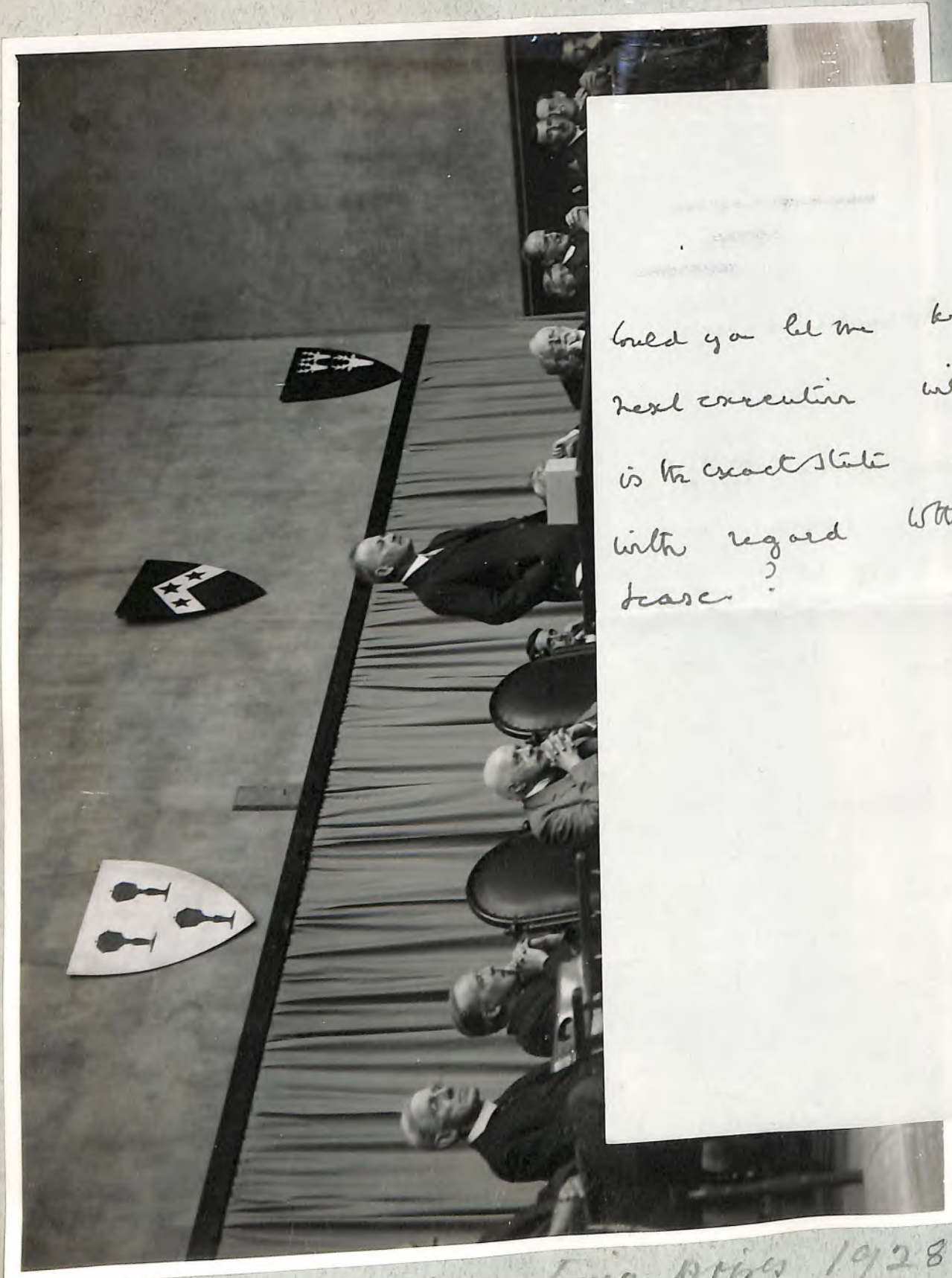

(T. Brayshaw in extreme left, next to Mr. Gerf. Dawson.)



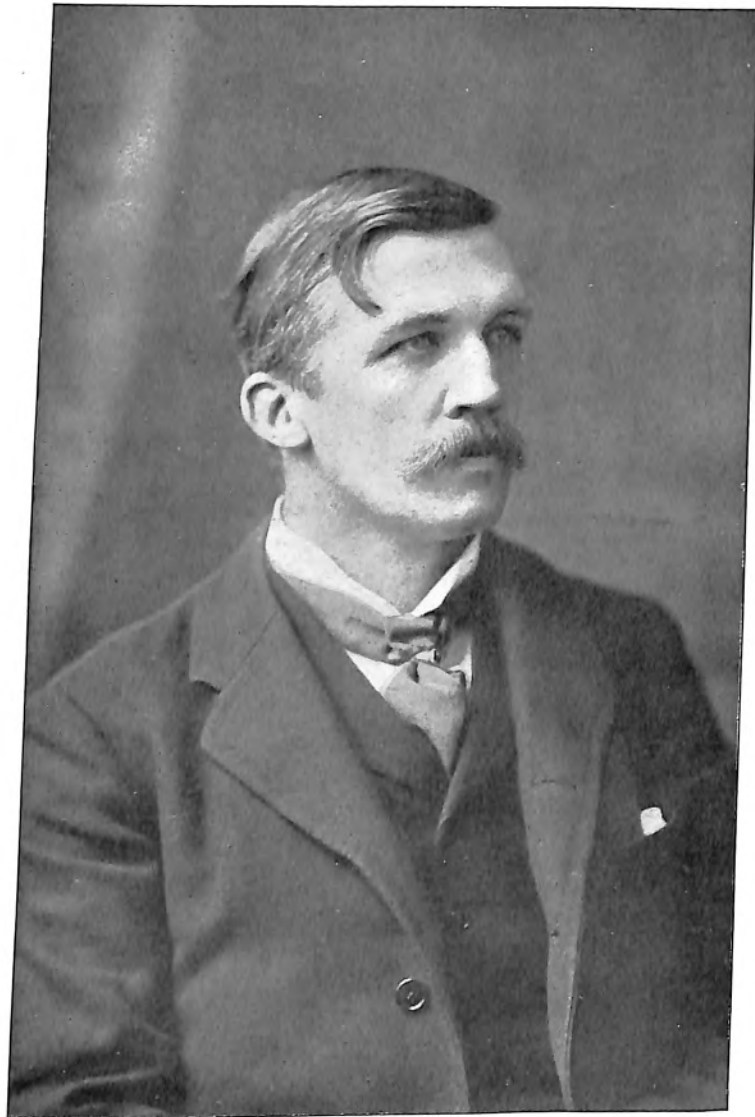

GIGGLESWICK BOYS AT CAMBRIDGE.
 Giggleswick School, during the 400 years of its existence, has proved of incalculable benefit to this locality, not the least of the advantages it has offered being the very large number of local youths who have, by its means, been enabled to enjoy a University training.
 A striking proof of this is to be found in the old lists of admissions to the various colleges at Cambridge and Oxford, and by way of example I append the names of the 23 youths who, in the space of 32 years (A.D. 1631-1662), were sent up to one college alone—that of St. John's at Cambridge,—having received their preliminary education at Giggleswick School:—

GIGGLESWICK SCHOOL.

At a public meeting held this day in the Mechanics' Hall, Settle, in pursuance of a public advertisement, for the consideration of a new scheme propounded by "The Charity Commissioners for England and Wales" for the future regulation and management of the Free Grammar School of King Edward the Sixth of Giggleswick in the County of York, it was resolved:—

1. That this meeting is of opinion that the proposed alterations in the area from which the Governors are to be selected and in the number of the "Governing body" are *entirely* unnecessary, and this meeting desires to express its entire confidence in the Board of Governors as at present constituted.

2. That the power of leasing the Charity lands by the Governors, *without* consent of the Charity Commissioners, be limited to *seven* years.

3. That in clause 9 and throughout the proposed Scheme, the name of "Free Grammar School of King Edward the Sixth" be retained.

11 That this meeting has considered that portion of the "proposed New Scheme," which provides for the admission of boys into the School, and for the payment by some of the Capitation Fees, and that this meeting desires to express to the Charity Commissioners its very strong desire that the privileges, which have been enjoyed hitherto, principally by the inhabitants of this place and the surrounding district, should be preserved as at present by the admission of *at least sixty boys* free and without distinction of rich and poor.

GIGGLESWICK GRAMMAR SCHOOL.
REGULATIONS AS TO BOARDERS.

The Governors, in consideration of the convenience of the Inhabitants of the vicinity of the Grammar School of Giggleswick, will permit Boarders to be received in private houses, from families resident within the parishes of Giggleswick, Long Preston, Horton-in-Ribblesdale, Clapham, Kirkby Malham, and Arncliffe, but not beyond these limits, and under the following regulations—viz,

The son of any such resident may be received as a Boarder in the family of any near relation or guardian into any house licensed by the Governors.

The Governors will not issue their license to a Publican, or to any house in which a convenient room is not set apart for private study; or which, on account of its position, or of the nature of the accommodation, is open to any sufficient sanitary objection, or where the character of the occupants is not in all respects satisfactory to the Governors.

The Governors will not, during the year 1870, interfere with any existing arrangements for the boarding of boys now attending the school, and will issue their licence to houses for such boys for that year. The Governors reserve power, in all cases whatever, to revoke any licence by notice from the Chairman or Vice-Chairman and Head Master, and for the inspection of the premises at any time, either by the Head Master or two Governors.

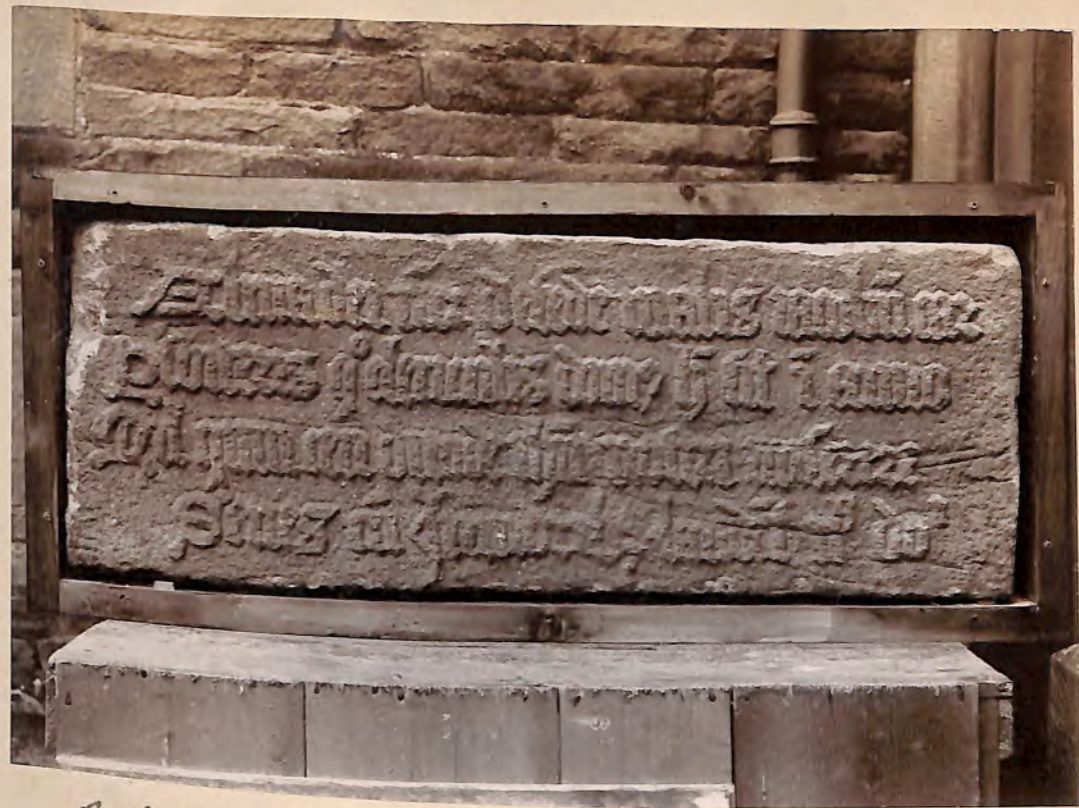

TEMPORARY HEAD MASTER for 1868.

The Governors are desirous of appointing at, or before Christmas 1867 a Head Master to hold office from that time until Christmas 1868, at a Salary of £250, payable quarterly—with a good House rent free, capable if required of receiving six boarders.

At, or before Christmas 1868, the Governors expect that a Boarding House now in course of erection, will be completed.

The proposed appointment is intended to be strictly provisional.

The School is, at present, attended by 65 scholars, chiefly resident in the neighbourhood.

The Head Master is aided by a Second Master, an Assistant Master, and a Teacher of Modern Languages.

A Head Master for the FREE GRAMMAR SCHOOL of King Edward the Sixth at GIGGLESWICK, near Settle in Craven, in the West-Riding of Yorkshire, is wanted after the Summer Vacation.

It is requisite that he should be a Clergyman of the Church of England and a Master of Arts, or of a higher Degree; and that he should be competent to teach the Classics and Mathematics, upon the System now pursued at the Universities.

The Salary is £210 per Annum and £5. for every Boy after the first Thirty, not exceeding Sixty; so that the Salary cannot exceed £360. The Head Master will be permitted to take Ten Boarders, and the whole number of Boys is limited to Eighty.

There is an excellent House belonging to the Head Master, at present occupied by The Rev. R. INGRAM, the retiring Master, aged 80; who has the privilege of occupying it during his life.
