SETTLE ARTS AND CRAFTS EXHIBITION.

During the five days the "show" was open, the public by their attendance testified their appreciation of its high merits, and the promoters must feel highly gratified with the result of their labours. All through the promoters have been indefatigable in their efforts to make visitors comfortable, and ensured by their courtesy the success of the undertaking. On Saturday afternoon Mrs Farrer, of Ingleboro', attended for the purpose of distributing the prizes to the successful competitors. The vicar (Rev R. C. Barnett) presided, and supporting him on the platform were Mr J. A. Farrer, Mr J. G. Robinson, Rev A. Crofton, Dr Atkinson, Mrs G. Robinson (Overdale, Skipton), Mrs Ingleby, Mrs W. A. Stackhouse, Mrs Perfect, the secretary (Mrs J. G. Robinson), and the treasurer (Mr T. Dixon). The list of prizes was a fairly long one, and

occupied the greater part of an hour

At its conclusion Rev A. Crofton, in moving a vote of thanks to Mrs Farrer, said the exhibition was arranged to bring out local talent, and to enable all who attended and all who competed to compare their handiwork with others. Wood carving had come most to the front, the district having been somewhat noted for its excellence in this department. Speaking on Art, Mr Crofton said it was a growing thing, but he was afraid there had been too much mechanism and too little scope for individual eccentricity. In some kindly words of advice to students as to winning prizes, he said when a pupil won a prize he was apt to take all the credit to himself, to think that all the success was from his own efforts, and to forget the efforts of his teachers. Mr Crofton concluded by hoping that this exhibition would have a tendency to more original work, and as a final word spoke in hearty praise of Kirkby Lonsdale and its work.

Major Stackhouse seconded, and the vote was carried unanimously

Mrs Farrer responded, and spoke in hearty praise of the exhibition. It was a great pleasure she said, for her to be present. She had seen many exhibitions both at home and abroad, but none more interesting than the one she had the pleasure of inspecting that day.

Votes of thanks to the committee brought Mr T. Brayshaw to his feet with a few pointed remarks as to the loan collection, and this part of the proceedings terminated.

To the notice of the exhibits which appeared in the "Pioneer" last week should be added a few words of commendation on the excellent work done by the scholars in the infant schools. Specimens of raveling, embroidery, paper-folding, brush painting, clay models, &c. were shown, and revealed much care and attention on the part of the teacher, Miss Beasley, and her assistants. Longpreston also sent some capital samples of work done by the young people.

Upstairs in the gallery were some capital dolls in woolwork, the product of the nimble hands of the inmates of the Bradford School for the Blind, side by side with which were cushions, tea cozys, &c. worked by some of the inmates of the Union Workhouse. In the loan collection there were not wanting some rather ludicrous contrasts. Side by side with other apparel were some ancient dresses, made about the beginning of the century, including the "Sunday-go-to-meeting" frock of a lady of New Guinea.

THE LOAN EXHIBITION.

Carnley, Pennine View, plaster casts; Mr Alric Watkins, Beck House, Austwick, lace from Cape de Verde; Mrs Foster, Duke-street, old china; Mr J. Butler, Giggleswick, sporting trophies; Mr Tamblin Watts, medals, &c.; Mrs Geldard, a copy of the "Leeds Mercury" of 1725; Mr Timothy Green, a varied collection; Miss Clarkson, Wakefield, embroidered books; Miss Jackson, Austwick, carved oak spice box, antique muslin dresses, &c.; Mrs Harvey, Chapel-square, various antiquities in china and wood; Miss Sarah Hartley, Langcliffe, china and an old picture of Kirkby Lonsdale Bridge; Mr W. F. Clark, china; Mr A. Bilton, an old trombone, truly a fearsome instrument; Mrs Christie, Langcliffe Place, old silver and antique fans; Miss Spencer, Skipton, various articles of foreign workmanship; Miss E. Hartley, Stratford-on-Avon, some splendid miniatures on ivory; Mr James Holmes, Duke-street, foreign curios; Mrs Garner, Cragdale Farm, measure mug; Mr H. Christie, J.P., glasses from Nottingham Castle, formerly the property of Col Hutchinson, who defended the Castle against Cromwell, and various articles; Mr John Lord, Greenhead, china; Mr E. Handby, pictures and friezes. Mr Thomas Brayshaw's collection, as might be surmised, was very interesting, containing as it did articles and matter pertaining to the district. Amongst the engravings were the sun dial which existed in front of Castlebergh and a somewhat apochryphal drawing of the Ebbing and Flowing Well as it used to be.

The exhibition after a most successful "run" closed its doors on Tuesday night.

PENDING CRAVEN LAW SUIT SETTLED.

At the West Riding Assizes at Leeds on Tuesday before Mr. Justice Roche, Mr. W. J. Waugh, K.C., mentioned that a settlement had been reached in a case in which the plaintiff was Elizabeth Ann Vant, widow, Steeton, and the defendant Eustace H. Vant, solicitor, Whitefriars, Settle, the subject of the action being a declaration as to liability, &c.

Mr. Waugh informed his Lordship that the case had been settled on terms inscribed on the briefs to be handed to the Associate. An order of judgment would be asked for if necessary.

His lordship, having read the terms of settlement, assented that the case was withdrawn.

Mr. W. J. Waugh, K.C., and Mr. Richard Watson, instructed by Messrs. Spencer, Clarkson and Co., Keighley, appeared for the plaintiff, and the defendant was represented by Mr. E. G. Mortimer, K.C., and Mr. J. A. Greene, instructed by Mr. C. P. Cass, Keighley.

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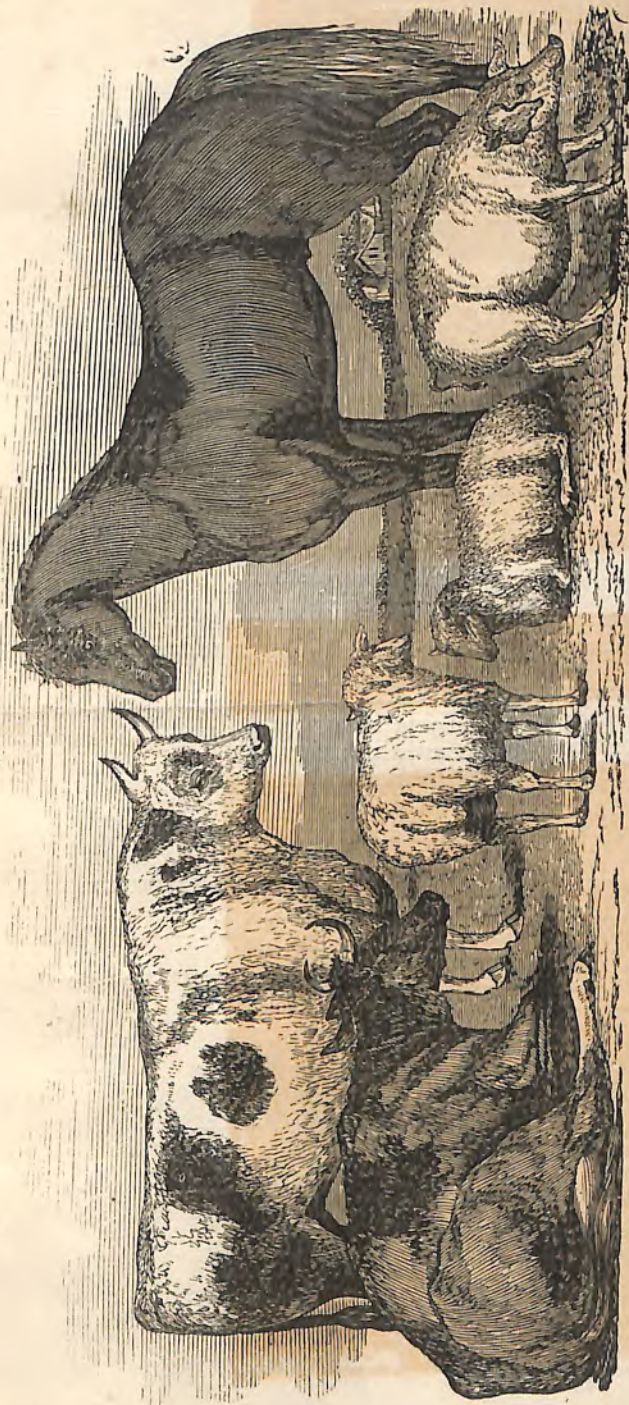

 CHESS CLUB.—This Society was remodelled in April last, and in addition to chess and other games, has now added a well furnished News Room for the convenience of Members. The number of members has been increased to 38. The subscription is one guinea per annum with an entrance fee of half a guinea. At a general meeting of the members held in the room (the old News Room in the Town Hall,) on Saturday, June 24th, the following papers were ordered for the ensuing half-year: viz., the Times, Standard Telegraph, Leeds Mercury, and Manchester Guardian, daily, and weekly, the Illustrated London News, Field, Bell's Life, Punch, Saturday Review, Reader, Lancaster Guardian, and Leeds Intelligencer.

The Box is closed one hour before the Departure of the Mail, and 1d. is charged extra upon each Letter put in the first half-hour of the Box being closed, and 6d. during the latter half-hour. Attendance from 8 A. M. to 10 P. M., in Winter; and from 7 A. M. to 10 P. M., in Summer.

By the New Postage Regulations, all Letters not pre-paid are charged double; and all Letters are charged by weight according to the following scale:—

Under $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce,	One Penny;	Under 3 ounces,	Six Pence;
" 1 ounce,	Two Pence;	" 4 ounces,	Eight Pence;
" 2 ounces,	Four Pence;	" 5 ounces,	Ten Pence.

And Two Pence for each ounce up to one pound, above which weight they are not received. At present the Penny, &c., according to the weight of the Letter, must be handed in with the Letter, and not be put into the Box; But Government are preparing Stamps on Stamped Covers and Stamped Wafers, to be sold by the Booksellers, Stationers, &c., which will prevent the trouble of paying at the Office; and these stamps will have the same power of freeing a Letter as the Franks of the Members of Parliament lately had. A Letter may now be sent from any part of the United Kingdom, whether double or single, if under the $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., for One Penny;—distance or number of inclosures making no increase of price, if the $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. be not exceeded.

S E T T L E, YORKSHIRE.

IS sixteen miles from Skipton, thirty-seven from Halifax, and two hundred and thirty-seven from London; it is in the West-riding of Yorkshire, on the Ribble; a good town, being at the foot of the hills which part York-shire and Lancashire.—A market on Tuesdays; also a market for fat and lean cattle every fortnight on the Monday, attended by the butchers from Manchester, Bolton, &c. as at Skipton.—Annual fairs, Thursday before Good-Friday for cattle; three fortnight fairs every other Friday from thence to Whit-funide for pedlary; April 26th, sheep, &c. Whit-Tuesday, woollen-cloth, pedlary, &c. August 19th, for leather and cattle; 20th, sheep and wool; 21st, woollen-cloth, pedlary, &c. and the first Tuesday after the 27th of October, for cattle.—Principal inns: Golden Lion, William Fawcett; Spread Eagle, William Bradley. Bankers: Birbecks, Alcock, and Co. draw upon Baron Dimidale, Sons, and Barnards, London.

The post is dispatched from Settle, for the south, on Sunday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday, at seven o'clock in the morning; and Monday, Thursday, and Saturday, at half past eleven o'clock in the morning; and on the first-mentioned four days at two o'clock in the afternoon, the other three days at nine o'clock in the morning; the north post arrives on Sunday, Wednesday, and Friday, at ten o'clock in the evening, and sets out on Monday, Thursday, and Saturday, immediately on the arrival of the fourth post of that day. SETTLE, GIGGLESWICK AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

SETTLE, a small well-built market-town, in the parish of Giggleswick, and in the wapentake and liberty of Staincliffe, west riding, is 225 miles from London, 59 from York, 50 from Manchester, and 16 from Skipton. The situation of Settle is singular and picturesque, but a great detraction from its pleasantness arises from the high and gloomy stone fences placed round the fields, instead of refreshing verdant hedges. The cotton manufacture prevails here, and the establishments belonging to Messrs. Clayton & Co. at Langcliffe, and Messrs. Proctors' and Mr. Brinnand's, in this town, employ many of the labouring class; the other chief trades are, paper making, by Messrs. Wood & Croudace; and roperies, the principal being in the hands of Mr. Leace. The Duke of Devonshire is lord of the manor, and holds courts baron twice a year, at one of which a constable is appointed. Settle contains two methodist chapels, a national school, and a public news' room and library. The market-day is on Tuesday; and there are fairs for fat cattle on every alternate Monday. According to the

census of 1821 the town of Settle contained 1,508 inhabitants. GIGGLESWICK is a neat village, one mile from Settle, well deserving notice as containing a free grammar school, founded by Edward VI. in which, amongst other eminent men, was educated Archdeacon Paley. The parish church is also in this village, a very ancient building, dedicated to St. Alkald. Near here is a singular ebbing and flowing well, the waters of which have been known to rise and fall nineteen inches in the space of five minutes. The time of its flux and reflux is apparently unconnected with rain or drought, or any other external causes; sometimes it is completely dry, and then, on a sudden, is heard to issue from the recesses of its native rock with a hollow gurgling sound. The water, which is received into a stone cistern, is limpid, cold and wholesome, and has no peculiar taste. Formerly this was a market-town, but it has long since ceased to enjoy that distinction. The township of Giggleswick contained, in 1821, 746 inhabitants.

An interesting document has just been handed to the editor of THE FREEMASON for perusal. It is an assignment of certain quit-rents on land in Giggleswick, a small village near Settle, Yorkshire, dated 10th December, 1714, made between Henry Newhouse "of Giggleswicke in the County of Yorke, freemason, of the one parte and Richard Brayshaw of Giggleswicke, aforesaid, batchelor, of the other parte." So far as can be ascertained, there was no Masonic Lodge in or near Settle until 1774. Was the term "freemason" used to denote an Apprentice Mason or in its modern sense implying that Newhouse was a member of the Craft?
