

## SETTLE AND DISTRICT WAR RELIEF.

A well attended meeting of the Council was held on Tuesday, Mr. Walter Morrison in the chair. Thanks were tendered to Mr. Morrison for paying for the 120 pipes and tobacco sent to the Settle Company of Territorials; to the staff of the Midland Railway Telegraph Department for weekly "Cry"; to Mr. and Mrs. W. Dawson (Market Place) for the gift of 60 shirts, 72 handkerchiefs and a large quantity of bootlaces; and to the Settle Brass Band for their valued assistance on several occasions.

It was decided to have a "Roll of Honour" printed in gold on cardboard, containing the names of all Regulars, Territorials, &c., from the district as soon as a complete list could be compiled: and it was also suggested that a certificate signed by the President should be given to every man who volunteered for active or foreign service, but who failed to pass the medical tests. Letters were read from the Soldiers' and Sailors' Families Association suggesting that this Council should act as their committee for the Division of Staincliffe West, but it was decided not to do so. The Council will attend to all cases included in Settle, Giggleswick, Langcliffe, Horton, &c.

The lines on which an appeal should be made for further subscriptions to be issued by the President and Hon. Secretary were discussed and decided on.—Captain Whitaker asked for 120 shirts and 240 pairs of socks for the Settle Company of Territorials, and it was resolved to send them, Dr. Mackenzie promising that socks, &c., should be sent for the men from the Ingleton District.

As the Settle Company of Regulars raised by Mr. Tunstill is expected to leave on Saturday, it was resolved that the men be supplied with shirts, socks, pipes and tobacco, shoe-laces, &c. A small body of local gentlemen, under the chairmanship of Mr. John Moore, are providing a dinner, and it was expected that the public would give them a "send-off" and see to other comforts.

# A WAR CATECHISM

*Compiled from an Appeal for Recruits  
made by His Grace Archbishop Maquire  
to the Young Men of Glasgow . . . . .*

BY THE RECTOR OF ST. JOHN THE EVANGELIST'S

THE REV. HENRY JAMES GROSCH (Hon. Chaplain 21st Middlesex)

Q.—Why not wait for Conscription and let the burden fall equally upon all?

A.—Because tens of thousands of all classes have gone to defend their country without Conscription. Compulsion for us would be disgrace; your forefathers did not wait for Conscription when their rights and the honour of their country were at stake.

Q.—If others have not gone, why should I?

A.—You have not to answer for others, only for yourself. Their failure to do their duty does not excuse you. Two wrongs never make a right.

Q.—Is not the sacrifice demanded of the mothers and fathers and other relatives too great?

A.—Nothing is too great a sacrifice to make for liberty, civilisation, religion. Nothing too much to save your schools and Churches from destruction, your fields and homes from ruin, your daughters from outrage and shame, your babes from cruel death.

Q.—What may we think with regard to the future lot of those who fall in the cause of defence of our country?

A.—We may piously hope and believe that those who so fall are sure of reward beyond the grave.

Q.—What may we think with regard to those who return?

A.—That they will come home men who feel that they have done a man's work.

Q.—Are not those who join the Army exposed to great temptations?

A.—All men are so exposed. We may safely believe that a young man going to the

Front has certainly not more—has, perhaps, less temptations than he would have at home.

Q.—Is there not a danger that in the Army on active service our young men neglect their religious duties?

A.—Thank God, from what we hear from our chaplains, the danger is small. On the march, in the trenches, and in the dangerous and trying circumstances of the war, our young men are showing their appreciation of religion and of the blessings it affords.

Q.—What special service will be rendered by our young men joining the Army now?

A.—They can release many who would be of greater service at home. Many who went at the first call were skilled and experienced men, who are wanted for skilled work in the factories. They could be set free for work where they are most wanted. Young men can best bear the fatigue of the war.

Q.—What can help to bring about what we all desire—a hastening of the end of the war?

A.—Men and munitions—these, and these alone, under God's providence, can bring us victory and peace.

Q.—How can young men who are physically unfit for the Army serve their country?

A.—They can volunteer for work on munitions, and even if they are unable to give themselves up completely to such labour, they can, as so many are doing already, sacrifice some of their spare time to provide the weapons and the ammunition, without which all the courage of our brave soldiers will be thrown away.

Q.—What is our present business?

A.—One, and one only: to conquer the Prussians and those who have been misled by them.

Q.—What are we seeking as the result of our efforts?

A.—Not money, nor land, nor glory, nor revenge. We are seeking to restore peace, and to make it a lasting peace.

Q.—How can this be secured?

A.—By the crushing of Prussian militarism and ambition, by complete victory on our side, complete surrender on the other.

Q.—What ought I to do?

A.—Let your own conscience answer solemnly before God.

Q.—How may I weigh the arguments of the justice of the war?

A.—You need weigh no arguments, you need to consult no clergymen or professors—the case is too clear.

Q.—What am I asked to fight for?

A.—For Europe's religion and civilisation against the powers of darkness, sitting in high places; against the prince of this world; against ambition, treachery, cruelty, lust, and robbery.

Q.—How have our adversaries behaved since the beginning of the war?

A.—They have shown their contempt for the law of nations, for the laws of war, for all that distinguishes a reasoning man from a furious animal.

Q.—Have their atrocities increased as the war has progressed?

A.—They have passed from one almost incredible act of treachery and cruelty to another, drowning in cold blood hundreds of non-fighting passengers on ships, and poisoning our soldiers with noxious vapours.

Q.—Are not these acts the work of drunken and excited soldiers urged on by passion or revenge?

A.—They are the work of cultured statesmen, of highly-born generals and admirals, of one who prides himself on being a Christian monarch.

Q.—What have our adversaries hoped for from such ferocity?

A.—To terrify us into yielding up Europe to the tyranny of the Prussians and their king.

Q.—Is the call for men for the Army urgent?

A.—It is more urgent now than before; it is more clear now than before that it is a matter of life or death for us and for the world; we are fighting not merely a foreign foe but an enemy of the human race.

Q.—Why are more men required?

A.—Because many have fallen, covering themselves with glory. Many have returned wounded. The emptied ranks must be filled again if we are to hold our own at present, and then go on to victory complete and final.

Q.—Have our losses been smaller than those of the other side?

A.—Much smaller, because our generals do not risk their men recklessly and our commissariat provides our men with good food and good clothing.

Q.—Have not lives been sacrificed of wrecked in vain through mistakes of ministers and others?

A.—Mistakes are made in every war. We all make mistakes. To err is human.

Q.—But why were the German designs to destroy us not discovered earlier?

A.—Because it was almost impossible. The German Emperor came here as an honoured guest. He wore the uniform of an admiral of our Fleet. He addressed a deputation of the representatives of the Churches of the United Kingdom who went to Germany for the purpose of fostering friendly relations between the peoples of the two Empires, as "gentlemen and brothers"; British journalists and professors were received in Germany with the strongest professions of friendship; Germans came to this country in representative capacities and professed their devotion and love for us; humanly speaking, it was impossible to think that our destruction was being aimed at by those who were professing to be our friends.

Q.—What have we to look to now?

A.—The present and the future; the past is gone.

Q.—What choice lies before us?

A.—To spend millions of money, risk thousands of lives, or to be content to come under the heel of one of the most cruel despotisms the world has ever seen.

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# THE TRANSVAAL WAR RELIEF FUND.

On Tuesday evening, despite very unfavourable weather, a numerous public meeting was held at the Victoria Hall, Settle. Mr. Walter Morrison, M.P., presided, and was supported by the following clergymen, ministers, and gentlemen:—The Rev. R. C. Garnett, M.A., Vicar of Settle; the Rev. G. Style, M.A., Giggleswick Grammar School; the Rev. Father Parkin, Settle; the Rev. W. E. Quicke (Wesleyan), Settle; Dr. Edgar, W. A. Stackhouse, Esq., C. A. L. Swale, Esq., J. W. Shepherd, Esq., J. Wagh, Esq., T. Brayshaw, Esq. (secretary.) Letters of regret were read from Hector Christie, Esq., C.C., J. A. Farrer, Esq., and the Rev. G. H. Brown (Congregationalist.)

Mr. Walter Morrison, M.P., in opening the proceedings, delivered an interesting and at times eloquent address. After explaining the reasons for the present meeting and giving details of the various funds organised in London and Yorkshire for the relief of the sufferers through the South African War, he proceeded to criticise in scathing terms the unfair methods of warfare adopted by the Boers in the present campaign, denouncing some of their tactics as absolute murder. The frontal attacks made by the British Army upon strongly entrenched Boer positions was contrary to former military experience, but they had probably been carried out with the object of striking quickly before other enemies of this country had time to join the Boers and swell their ranks. In conclusion, Mr. Morrison suggested that the money raised at Settle might be united with that at Skipton, or given to the fund of the Yorkshire Regiment.

Mr. John Wagh, C.E., moved the following resolution:—"That this meeting recognises the claims made on the sympathies of all Englishmen by the sufferings caused by the present war in South Africa, not only to combatants, but also to their wives and children, to the dependents of those who fall in their country's cause, and to the wounded; and trusts that the inhabitants of Settle and district will maintain their old reputation for liberality by nobly responding to the appeal now made on behalf of the sufferers." He stated that at the time of the Crimean war a sum of £268 was promptly raised at one public meeting at Settle.

The Rev. R. C. Garnett, M.A., seconded the resolution, and explained the origin of the meeting.

The Rev. W. E. Quicke, in moving the adoption of the names of the local Committee, said that it was the duty of everyone, irrespective of creed, to support the Government at the present juncture.

Dr. Edgar seconded this resolution, and it was adopted.

The Rev. G. Style, in proposing a vote of thanks to Mr. Morrison for presiding, strongly urged the justice of giving adequate compensation to the Natal colonists, who had suffered by the invasion of their territory.

Major Stackhouse seconded the vote of thanks to the Chairman, and it was heartily accorded.

TRANSVAAL WAR RELIEF FUND.—A meeting of the Executive Committee was held at Messrs. Brayshaw's offices on Friday, when the Treasurer reported a balance in hand of £426, including the proceeds of the performance of "The Geisha" by the Amateur Dramatic Society. Several cases of wives and relatives of soldiers were ordered to be relieved, and in view of the handsome response that has been made by the public to the Committee's appeal, it was decided to take over all cases in the Settle, Horton, and Malhamdale districts, at present relieved by the Soldiers' and Sailors' Families Association, in order to prevent any overlapping of relief.

**THE WAR FUND.**—At a meeting of the executive committee of the local fund for the relief of the sufferers by the Transvaal war, held at Messrs Brayshaw's offices on Tuesday last, the treasurer reported that subscriptions to the amount of about £480 had been received, in addition to more than £50 promised, but not yet paid. Grants of relief were made to the wives of three of the local men who are now fighting in South Africa.

**MISS DELANEY** (secretary of the Women's Liberal Association) has received a letter from Mrs Kitchener (wife of Colonel Kitchener) thanking them for the parcel sent, and enclosing the following extract from her husband's letter. The letter is dated Spearman's, 31st January, 1900.—“The draft have brought the box of shirts up here. I am giving them to the men whose shirts have gone to pieces. They come in most useful, and are much appreciated.”

**MAFEKING DAY.**—There were rejoicings in Settle on the night the news of the Relief of Mafeking came, but Thursday (the Queen's birthday) was the day for the organised rejoicings. The weather in the morning threatened to put a damper on the day's proceedings, but later on it took up and turned out beautifully fine. The shops closed in the afternoon, and all day the town looked brilliant, decorated with the flags and bunting. The day's programme commenced with a procession of the school children, the Rechabites and the Ambulance Corps, accompanied by the bands of Settle, Giggleswick and Langcliffe. The children presented a gay and picturesque appearance, with their pratty dresses and their flags, and many were in character costume. The route was taken through the principal streets, finishing in the Market Place, where the National Anthem was sung. This was followed by a short thanksgiving service in the Holy Ascension Church, conducted by the Vicar (the Rev R. C. Garnett), the church being filled. Later in the evening a torchlight procession and cycle parade was held, presenting a magnificent sight, especially when viewed from a distance. The route taken was the same as that taken by the other procession, but with a visit to Giggleswick village included. At the close of the procession the National Anthem was sung, and then the torches were made into a bonfire in the centre of the Market Place. Into this the effigy of Kruger was thrown, and burned amidst the groans and hisses of the vast crowd assembled. This ended the proceedings, but for some time longer the rejoicings were kept up by isolated parties, and it was after midnight before the town assumed its normal quietness. Collections were made for the Mafeking Relief Fund.

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## A SETTLE MAN IN PRETORIA.

Private Gibson, of the 2nd K.S.L.I., has written to Miss Waugh, of Settle, as follows from Pretoria, the letter being dated August 26th.—“Dear Madam,—After having letters from my dear wife with your name mentioned time after time for your kindness, it is not only my due bounden duty, but a very great pleasure to drop you a line, thanking you a thousand times for words and kindness like this at these times, &c. I should have written before, only I have been with Lord Kitchener from Pretoria here, to Krugersdorp round by Mafeking, and back to Pretoria after De Wet. This is my third time in Pretoria since June. I had the pleasure of being here on the 5th of June, the day Lord Roberts entered Pretoria. I landed here last night. I suppose our Brigade will follow Lord Roberts’s advance beyond Pretoria. I was in Pretoria last night, and went by Kruger’s house, and as I looked at the two lions in front of his house, this thought struck me “Did he ever think of the British lion that would one day bite if he still would play with it?” These words have come true. The Boers have lost their capital, and still they resist, but the day must come, and it is not far off now, when Kruger must submit to our forces. We have had some very hard fighting this last two months. We have been on the run after De Wet. He destroyed our line between Krugersdorp and Potchefstroom. Thirteen men of our regiment were killed and about 30 injured. The reason this happened to the train was that De Wet had taken the fish plates off the two metals and replaced them. The train had only passed us on the road 15 minutes before, as we were just going to Potchefstroom. We were just in time to save the train from De Wet’s hands. You will have seen, I dare say, a few letters that soldiers have sent home from this country during the war to the newspapers, and I am, as a soldier, ashamed of my comrades who have sent these. Most of them are nothing but untruths, and I am sorry to see Settle is included in the list. I have a copy of a letter sent home to Settle papers. I never saw the man in my life, nor do I know him, but the man must be a fool, and I could prove, and could trust to the War Office backing me out, that his letter, sent to the papers is altogether untrue. Don’t believe in telling so many tales about this war, but what has been done, has been done for the good of our country. I belong to the 19th Brigade—the Smith-Dorrien Brigade it is called—and I enclose a copy of our orders, that were given to our Brigade by Lord Roberts on the 5th of June last, when we entered this place. This is the ground where Kruger had our prisoners before we got to Pretoria.” The following is a copy of the army orders from Lord Roberts referred to:—“The 19th Brigade has achieved a record of which any infantry might be proud. Since the date it was formed, namely, February 12th, 1900, it has marched 620 miles, often on half rations, and seldom on full. It has taken part in the capture of ten towns, fought in ten general actions, and in 27 days in one period of 30 days, it fought on 21 of them and marched 327 miles. Casualties, between 400 and 500. Defeats, nil.”

## PARISH COUNCIL.

The monthly meeting of this Council was held in the Town Hall, on Thursday, the 5th inst. Present—Messrs. R. Clark (chairman), J. Bell, T. Dawson, O. Graham, R. W. Garner, T. Harger, C. E. Lord, and the Clerk (Mr. J. Silverwood).—The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.—The Clerk having written to Mr. T. Brayshaw, solicitor, Settle, re the War Fund, he being one of the trustees thereof. The following reply was read:—

20th March, 1906.

Dear Sir,—I duly received your letter of the 16th inst., embodying the request of the Settle Parish Council that the Trustees of the Settle and District Transvaal War Relief Fund would agree to a representative of the various townships which subscribed to the fund being appointed a trustee of such fund. I may say that the subscribers were chiefly derived from Settle, Giggleswick, Langcliffe, Stainforth, Rathmell, Halton West, Malham, etc., so I fear it will be a difficult matter to decide as to who should nominate such trustees. I will, however, bring the matter forward at a meeting of the subscribers to the fund.—I am, yours faithfully, (Signed) THOS. BRAYSHAW.

—After discussion, Mr. Harger moved that the letter be acknowledged, and that a request be forwarded that a meeting of the subscribers should be called and held as soon as possible.—With regard to the Jubilee Fund, the Clerk reported that he had seen Mr. Shepherd, one of the trustees, and he had said that he thanked the Parish Council for the interest that they were taking in the matter, but that until one of the present trustees died he did not think that an additional trustee could be added.—Mr. Harger moved that Mr. Shepherd be written to stating that the Council thought that an additional trustee should be added now, and also that the present trustees call a meeting of subscribers together at an early date.

It was decided that the lighting season should be closed on the 5th inst. The annual assembly of the Parish Council was fixed for the 19th inst.

The Collector of the Market Tolls gave notice of his intention of resigning the post except under certain conditions. The counter-part lease of the Market-place, signed by the Duke of Devonshire, was produced and laid out for inspection. A precept for lighting amounting to £150 was signed, and bills amounting to £17 13s. 2d. was ordered to be paid, cheques being signed therefor.



The Chairman then called on the Chairman of the Parish Council to take the chair—Mr. C. Graham proposed a vote of thanks for the fair way in which he had conducted the election and the same was carried unanimously.

Mr. T. Harger then presided. The only business arising out of the minutes was with regard to the Transvaal War Fund and the Jubilee Fund.—Mr. John Hardy asked if there had to be another war before the war fund could be spent?

Mr. Thomas Brayshaw pointed out that the subscribers to the war fund elected trustees and these trustees managed the fund, and if they at that meeting or anybody else could inform the trustees of a deserving case they would only be too glad to part with some of the fund. There was £500 in the bank, and there were no claims at present so far as the trustees knew, but if a deserving case was brought forward they would gladly help it (applause).

Mr. G. Horner asked if the account was being kept alive, and he was informed it was.
