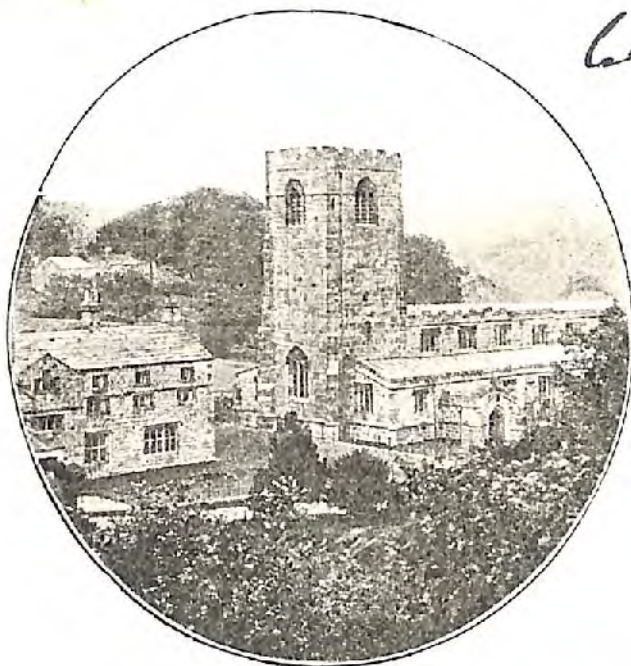

ROAD FROM BELL BUSK.

About one mile and a half from Bell Busk, a conspicuous white house on the east of the Aire, in the hamlet of Calton, marks the site of the house of General Lambert, who owned a large estate in the parish. After passing Airton, Kirkby Malham is reached. The church is a noble example of North Country Perpendicular. The pillars have Saints' niches on their western faces, said by Whitaker to characterize churches built by the great Craven Family of the Tempests. It contains a very ancient, and very curious, probably unique font, and some monuments of the Lambert Family, and of an unknown prior. The Register has entries of marriages celebrated by Oliver Cromwell; in one case the bridegroom was a certain Martin Knowles, who lived at Middle House, about a mile north-east of Malham Tarn. This house is the highest house in England, being 1,500ft. above sea level, or 24 higher than the house in the Kirkstone Pass. From the hill between Kirkby Malham and Malham Malham Cove and the entrance to Gordale, and the road leading to Malham Tarn, are conspicuous.

ROAD FROM SETTLE.

One mile from Settle the road passes through Langcliffe, where on the village green stands the house in which lived Dr. Paley, the Headmaster of Giggleswick Grammar School, and the father of Archdeacon Paley, who was educated at the school. The road now ascends a very steep hill, from the top can be seen the sears in which is found the Victoria Cave. After descending into a valley, and mounting the opposite ascent, the watershed of England is reached at a height of 1,460ft. above sea level, at a solitary barn; grand views of Penyghent, Ingleborough, and the Lako Mountains, are seen from this point on a clear day. Malham Tarn is seen in front, with Rylstone Fell in the far distance.

MALHAM TARN.

Covering about 160 acres, and 1,240 feet above the sea-level, is a shallow lake grooved out of the Silurian Rocks by glacier action. The presence of Silurian Rocks under the Tarn is proved, these rocks being found east and west of the Tarn in beds dipping deeply unconformably with the nearly horizontal limestone beds, by the springs which break out round the moss, and by two boulders of Silurian pebbles embedded in lime near the north-east angle of the Tarn. Limestone will not hold a sheet of water. Proof of glacial action is perhaps found in the mounds of subangular gravel east and south of the Tarn. The Silurian Rocks are found at Kirkby Malham, 600 feet lower. Thus the line of sears behind Malham Tarn House marks an upthrow, as the sears about Gordale and Malham Cove mark the line of the great Craven Fault. The greatest depth of the Tarn is 14 feet; of this about 5 feet is due to an embankment, constructed first by Lord Ribblesdale, and afterwards rebuilt.

The water issuing from the Tarn sinks about half a mile from the outlet into the limestone, and emerges again at Aire Head, half way between Malham and Kirkby Malham.

The trout are remarkable for a peculiar and uncommon defect, about one in fifteen has the operculum or gill-cover deficient. The cause is not known.

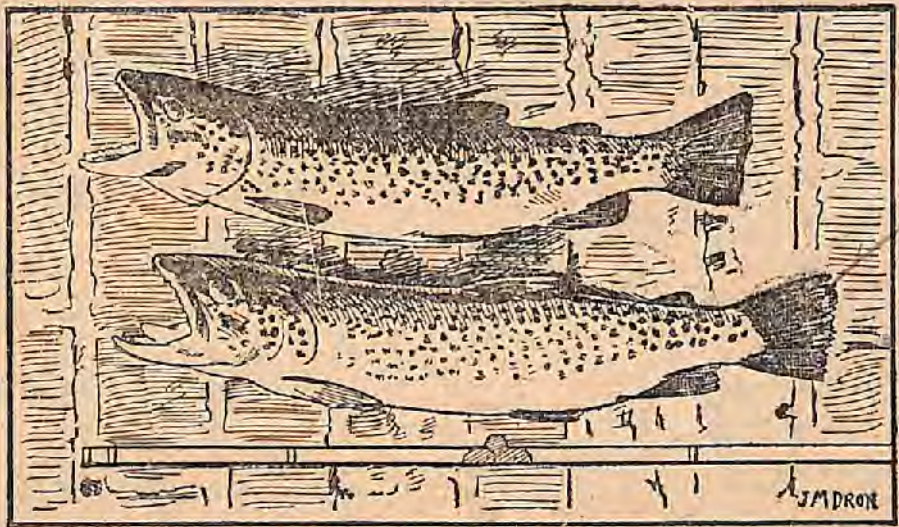

ANGLING NOTES.

BY RIVER, LAKE, AND STREAM.

(BY "MARCH BROWN.")

FROM APRIL 14 TO MAY 14.

'Tis an old saying, and 'tis truth they say,
That April showers bring forth the flowers of May;
And every flower that blows gives fragrant birth
To many creatures scarce perceiv'd on earth;
Each shrub and plant possesses in its kind
The various flies that sport upon the wind.
No sooner does the cowslip burst its bell,
Than the Cream Camel leaves its golden cell;
The clover which the cow delights to taste,
When passed again, brings forth a tribe in haste,
The Lady Cow is seen to flaunt about,
As any lady at a ball or rout;
But very soon her robe of green she'll shed,
And don a dusky orange suit instead,
Hares Ear and Yellow is her final coat,
Colours that never yet have been surpassed;
The Gosling Fox too, seems his nearest kin,
But hark! the cuckoo's note—sweetest May comes in—
The yellow meads with cowslips studded o'er,
Send forth their natives to the pebbled shore,
The yellow May Fly wings o'er brook and lake,
The harbinger of the stone-prison'd Drake,
The Black Bank Spider and the Sooty Black,
The Golden Olive show a wat'ry track,
With Golden Sooty and the Mealy Grey,
Are all good flies throughout the month of May.

Mr. C. F. Armistead, fishing tackle maker, Settle, forwards me the above photo of a brace of trout taken from Malham Tarn. They fell victims to the fly, and have the "honour" of being the first caught from that water this year. Their weights are respectively 2lb. 2oz. and 2lb. 8oz. The two-foot rule included in the picture gives one an excellent idea of their length.

With the improved climatic conditions which has ushered in the week sport should certainly make amends. Up to the present northern waters have yielded but little. "Major" reports that the cold weather had its effect on fishing in the Wyre, and that only a few trout have been taken. Happily they were taken. Despite a splendid

although the dry fly—an art which is certainly becoming more popular in this locality—accounted for several nice fish the other day. "Poor baskets" is still the cry in regard to the Lune and Wenning. One or two good trout were taken with the minnow last Wednesday, but there are few flies on the water, and the hills around are white with snow. The Ribble and Hodder are now a good level, but the temperature still remains low, especially in the early morning and evening. The outlook at present is far better than at any time this season, and anglers are expecting to make a good start this week.

Dealing more fully with the Lune and its tributaries, I learn that they have yielded but disappointing sport during the past week. Cold north winds, together with the low and clear state of the waters, have deterred the most intrepid anglers, and except it is in some favoured stretches of the higher reaches the main stream has yielded nothing at all. The Wenning is reported to have done rather better, a clergyman, who has more than an average reputation for golf, being credited with the best catch of the week. Considerable interest has been aroused by a report that a dispute affecting fishing rights about Halton may come into the courts. Each party claims inalienable rights. A fine show of codling was landed in Lancaster yesterday afternoon from Morecambe Bay. With warmer weather there appears a prospect of some very fine sport in the bay.

A man was standing in front of a Saranac Lake market recently. He had a basket and a fishing rod. "Just throw me a dozen perch and bullheads," he said to the owner of the market. "Certainly," replied the owner, "but why do you ask me to throw them to you?" "So I can go home and tell my wife I caught them," was the reply. "I may be a poor fisherman but I am no liar."

EPITOME OF PRECEDING ACTS.

Antonio is a rich merchant of Venice, who has all his wealth invested in foreign trade. His great friend, Bassanio, is in love with the beautiful heiress Portia, and to hasten his suit he begs Antonio to lend him 3,000 ducats. Antonio has not got the money at hand at the time, but to oblige his friend borrows from Shylock, the Jewish money-lender. He signs a bond to repay the money in three months, failing which the Jew can claim a pound of his (Antonio's) flesh, to be cut off his breast "nearest his heart." At the time, they consider this bond as only an eccentricity on the part of the Jew.

Bassanio goes to Belmont and there is married to Portia; but upon their wedding day news comes that Antonio's ships have not returned, that he is unable to discharge his debt to Shylock, which has become due, and that the strict fulfilment of his bond, namely a pound of Antonio's flesh, has been demanded.

Bassanio hastens back to Venice, prepared to pay the Jew twice the borrowed money. Shylock will not listen to him but demands the execution of the bond, as by this means he thinks to repay many fancied grievances which he has against Antonio.

The trial scene depicts how the Jew's revenge recoils upon himself, by the instrumentality of Portia, who comes, disguised as a doctor of laws, to defend Antonio.

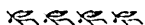

"I have secret information from England that the English people will not support the policy of Her Majesty's Government. If the Government wish to go to war, the Liberal party would not permit it, and if the Liberal party permitted it the Queen would not allow it."

Mr. JOHN E. ELLIS, Radical member for the Rushcliffe Division of Nottinghamshire, wrote:—

"We want a string of facts concerning suppression of telegrams, opening of letters, arbitrary arrests, unfair trial, unjustifiable prison treatment, interference with free speech at meetings, but much information sent lacks the element of fulness, detail and accuracy, which are vital for Parliamentary purposes."

Dr. G. B. CLARK, Radical M.P. for Caithness, wrote to Mr. KRUGER, on September 29th, ten days before the war broke out:—

"My Dear PRESIDENT KRUGER,—It might strengthen you in this struggle that seems inevitable if you were to seize all the passes. Mr. MONTAGU WHITE and BARON DE QUARLES will go across to Brussels. I shall keep them acquainted as far as possible with trend of feeling here, and they will be able to send on any information they may think desirable to you."

Mr. LABOUCHERE, Radical M.P. for Northampton, writing to Mr. MONTAGU WHITE, Mr. KRUGER'S representative, on August 2nd, said:—

"The President has a great opportunity to give Joe another fall. The great thing is to gain time. In a few months we shall be howling about something in another part of the world."

Are you, a Briton, going to support a cause
which includes within its ranks such men?

Mr. Whitley Thomson on his Qualifications to Represent Agriculture.

Extract from MR. WHITLEY THOMSON'S speech at the Town Hall, Skipton, on Thursday evening, 20th Sept., 1900:—

"With regard to agriculture, I have come here to learn. I know there is a great deal of agricultural property in this Division. I have lived all my life in towns, and I have no knowledge of agriculture but what I have been able to learn by reading; but I have come here to give my very best ability to the understanding of this question, and, if returned by you, to do what I can to help those engaged in agriculture by my voice and vote."

MR. THOMSON complains of "enormous doles to landlords and Denominational Schools," being given by the Agricultural Rates Act.

In the Skipton Union the amount of relief from rates given yearly by the Act is £2,588, and this sum goes into the pockets of the occupiers of land, and not one penny to the landlord. MR. METCALFE SPENSLEY, tenant farmer, of Castle Bank, Leyburn, writing to the newspapers last week, declares that he has benefitted to the extent of £40 or £50 a year by the Act.

As to the "dole" to Denominational Schools (in the Education Act of 1897, to which MR. THOMSON refers), MR. R. W. PERKS, the well-known Wesleyan and Radical M.P. for Louth, referred to the Act in these words:—

"Nonconformists have often been twitted with not establishing their own Schools. Hitherto they could not afford it, but **now** with the 10s. grant, supplemented with the new 5s. grant of 1897, and with the abolition of 17s. 6d. limit, **the task was possible**. Why should they not build 1,000 Nonconformist Schools in small towns and country villages, which might be centres not only of educational progress, but of public civic life."

MR. THOMSON says he is in favour of universal School Boards, but it is estimated that to replace Voluntary Schools by Board Schools would mean an immediate capital expenditure of about fifty million pounds, and an annual expenditure of nearly five million pounds.

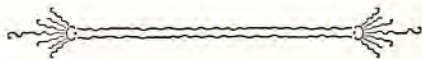

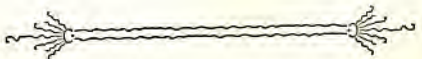
