GIGGLESWICK SEWING SCHOOL.

At a Meeting of the Lady Subscribers of the Giggleswick Sewing School, held in the School-room, on the 26th November, 1859,

Present,

Mrs. Coulthurst, Miss Atkinson, Mrs. Brayshaw, Miss Geldard, Miss Hartley, Miss Sutcliffe, Mrs. Stackhouse, and notes were received from Mrs. Kempson and Mrs Sanderson, and verbal messages from Mrs. Geldard, Mrs. Hartley, C. H., Miss Clayton, and Miss Smith, stating they approved of a Rule, excluding Fancy Work.

The following Rules were adopted:—

1. That an Annual Meeting of the Subscribers be held on the Saturday before the Christmas Holidays, at 2 p. m., that the accounts for the year be then Audited, and a General Manager to be styled the "Lady in Office" be appointed for the ensuing year.
2. That the Lady in Office have the power of calling an extraordinary Meeting at any time in case of necessity.
3. That the Mistress Mrs. Bentham, be continued in her place at her present salary.
4. That the payment by the Children in the Township of Giggleswick be one penny per week, to be paid to the mistress weekly.
5. That Children out of the Township be admitted on payment of twopence per week, to be paid to the mistress weekly.
6. That every half-year on the day the school breaks up, the Mistress give an account of the pence received, and that the remainder of her salary be then paid by the Lady in Office.
7. That the hours of attendance for the Girls be, from one to four o'clock in the afternoon, and the strictest punctuality be observed.
8. That the work in the School be confined to plain sewing, repairing, knitting stockings, and plain samplers, no wool or other fancy work being allowed.
9. That in case of sickness, or a necessity for absence, the mistress give notice to the Lady in Office and apply to her at all times under any difficulties.

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING.

A meeting of the Giggleswick Parish Council was held in the Provided Schools on Tuesday evening when Mr. S. H. Francis presided. Others present were Messrs. W. Atkinson, W. Chiddy, W. R. Brown, C. Graves, C. Harrison, J. Hodgson and J. Wright, with the Clerk (Mr. W. J. Robinson).

A letter was read from the Clerk to the Governors of Giggleswick School, asking the Council if they were disposed to sell the property of the Council situate at the Green.—It was resolved that the Council could not at present entertain the idea of selling the premises in the absence of suitable alternative accommodation.

The Clerk reported an interview with the Clerk to the Settle Girls' High School, the latter stating that the Governors were willing to allow the Council to have the ashes from the School for the repair of the footpath running through their property. It was resolved that the matter be left in abeyance for the present, as it was thought that a recurrence might take place of the floods which did damage to the footpath.

A letter was read from Mr. T. Brayshaw sending three handsomely bound volumes of "Settle Pamphlets," "Stackhouse Tracts" and "Local Notes" as a gift to the Council. It was stated at the meeting that Mr. Brayshaw was the first chairman of the Giggleswick Parish Council, and it was resolved that the Chairman write to Mr. Brayshaw to thank him for his most thoughtful and highly interesting gift.

SHUTE'S CHARITY.

The estate held under this donation consists of three fields, containing together 26a. 1r. 5p. One of the closes devised by the will, called Huntwait Field, was exchanged for another of equal value. The property is let to yearly tenants as follows:—

The lands are let by the governors of the grammar school, and are let at their fair annual value. The rents, after deducting £5 for the exhibition, are distributed by the Rev. John Clapham, with the consent or on behalf of the governors, among poor people of the township of Giggleswick not receiving parochial relief.

THOMAS CLAPHAM'S CHARITY.

Mr. Thomas Clapham, late of Giggleswick, deceased, in 1797 purchased £100 navy five per cents, in the names of William Clapham, since deceased, and the Rev. John Clapham, his son, upon trust that they and the survivor of them, his executors, &c. should annually distribute, at his and their discretion, on St. Thomas's day, the dividends thereof amongst such of the poor housekeepers of and belonging to the township of Giggleswick, as they should think the greatest objects of the donor's charity.

A declaration of trust of this stock, dated the 20th April, 1797, was executed by the two trustees. The dividends of the substituted stock, £4 4s. a year, are distributed by the Rev. John Clapham once a year, on or about St. Thomas's day, among poor people of Giggleswick not receiving parochial relief.

BROWN'S CHARITY.

William Brown, of Stackhouse in the county of York, gentleman, by will, dated the 4th January, 1762, gave to Thomas Brayshaw the elder, and William Lund, the sum of £20, upon trust that they and their heirs should pay the interest arising therefrom to two poor housekeepers of the township of Giggleswick (not being pensioners) on the 25th December yearly; the said legacy to be paid at the end of 12 months next after his decease; and the testator charged his messuages, and hereditaments thereinfore devised unto John Lund and Thomas Brayshaw the younger, with the payment thereof, and appointed them executors of his will.

The sum of 18s. a year is regularly paid in respect of this gift by Mrs. Brayshaw of Giggleswick and Miss Lund of Stackhouse, the daughters of John Lund, and Thomas Brayshaw the younger. It is yearly distributed by themselves at Christmas between two poor housekeepers of Giggleswick not having relief from the town.

LISTER'S CHARITY.

This charity, given by Matthew Lister, consists of a yearly payment of £1 6s. for poor widows, understood to be a rent-charge on some property at Paley Green in the township of Giggleswick. The money used formerly to be laid out in bread, which was brought to and given away among the poor at the church, but at present the money is given under the direction of the Rev. Anthony Lister, vicar of Gargrave, to poor widows of Giggleswick.

HARGRAVES'S CHARITY.

By indenture of feoffment, enrolled in Chancery, dated 12th July, 1768, reciting that Agnes Hargraves had agreed to purchase of Thomas Clapham the close therein mentioned for the sum of £84, which she was desirous to have conveyed upon the charitable trusts after mentioned, the said Thomas Clapham in consideration of the sum of £84 conveyed unto Christopher Clapham, and his heirs, a close called Bowerly in Langcliffe, with the appurtenances, and all the tithes of wool, lamb and calf, arising upon or out of the said close, upon trust that the said Christopher Clapham and his heirs should from time to time apply the rents thereof, or so much thereof as should be necessary, for teaching three poor children of the township of Austwick, in the parish of Clapham, and three poor children of the township of Giggleswick, to read the English language, and that the overplus of the rents, if any, should be yearly applied in buying books for such children, or otherwise in teaching them, or any of them, or any other poor children in the said townships, to write, according to the discretion of the person who should have the nomination of such children, and it was thereby declared that the children should be nominated by the said Agnes Hargraves during her life, and afterwards by the said Christopher Clapham, his heirs and assigns.

The Rev. John Clapham, vicar of Giggleswick, is the only surviving trustee, as the heir of Christopher Clapham. The close contains about two acres, and is let to Jonathan J. yearly tenant, at the rent of £6 per annum, the rent is paid to the masters of two schools in Giggleswick, one half to each, and three children to each school as free scholars by the Rev. The children of the township of Giggleswick at a national school there.

AN OLD DEED.

Amongst my old Deeds I have several specimens of the conveyances known as "Fines." These are so called from being the final agreement between the parties to a fictitious suit or action, commenced and then compromised by leave of the Court, whereby the lands in question were acknowledged to be the right of one of the parties. The principal uses of the "fine" were to bar estate-tail, and to pass the interests of married women.

I give the following translation of one of these quaint old Latin documents, executed in the year 1555, whereby twelve acres of land in Giggleswick were settled upon the Thomas Brayshaw of 350 years ago and his heirs.

This is the Final Agreement made in the Court of our Sovereign Lord the King and Lady the Queen, at Westminster, from Easter-day in fifteen days in the first and second years of the reigns of Philip and Mary, by the grace of God King and Queen of England, France, Naples, Jerusalem and Ireland, defenders of the Faith,

Princes of Spain and Sicily, Archdukes of Austria, Dukes of Milan, Burgundy and Brabant, Counts of Hapsburg, Flanders and Tyrol, before Robert Broke, Humfrey Bronne, Edward Saunders and William Staunford, Justices of our Lord the King and Lady the Queen, and others then and there present; Between Richard Peyllowe, plaintiff, and Christopher Hesyldene and Elizabeth his wife, and Thomas Brashaghe and Agnes his wife, deforciant of twelve acres of land with the appurtenances in Giggleswick; Whereupon a Plea of Covenant was summoned between them in the same Court, that is to say, that the aforesaid Christopher and Elizabeth, Thomas and Agnes have acknowledged the aforesaid tenements to be the Right of him the said Richard as those which the said Richard hath of the Gift of the aforesaid Christopher and Elizabeth, Thomas and Agnes. And those they have remised and quit claimed from them the said Christopher and Elizabeth, Thomas and Agnes, and the heirs of the said Elizabeth and Agnes, to the aforesaid Richard and his heirs for ever. And moreover the said Christopher and Elizabeth, Thomas and Agnes, have granted for them, and the heirs of the said Elizabeth and Agnes, that they will warrant to the aforesaid Richard and his heirs the aforesaid tenements, with the appurtenances, against all men for ever. And for this acknowledgment, remise, quit-claim, warranty, fine and agreement the said Richard hath granted to the aforesaid Thomas the aforesaid tenements, with the appurtenances. And those he hath rendered to him in the same Court. To have and to hold to the said Thomas and his heirs of the chief lords of that fee by the services which to the aforesaid tenements appertain for ever.
