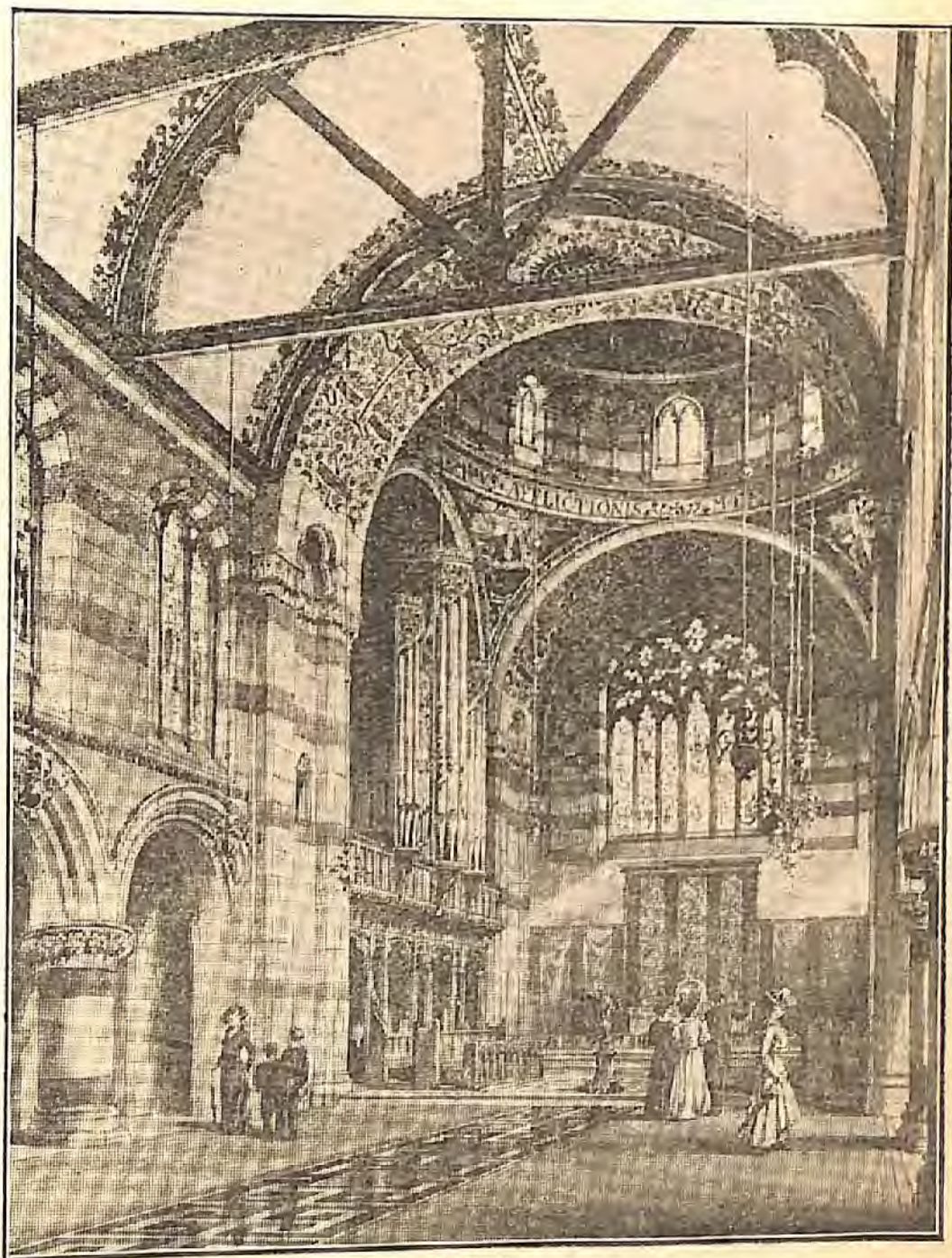

A MEMORIAL OF THE DIAMOND JUBILEE: THE NEW CHAPEL OF GIGGLESWICK SCHOOL, OPENED YESTERDAY.

GIGGLESWICK SCHOOL'S NEW CHAPEL.

Yesterday the Bishop of Ripon dedicated, and Dr. Warre, the headmaster of Eton, opened, the new chapel at Giggleswick School, given by Mr. Walter Morrison, in commemoration of Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee. The memorial-stone was laid by the Duke of Devonshire, on October 7th, 1897. The chapel occupies an imposing site on a knoll of mill-stone grit, which rises steeply above the school buildings. The plan consists of a Latin cross, with a dome over the crossing, surrounded at the four angles by turrets, which are crowned by small cupolas. The principal dimensions are:—Length, 101ft.; breadth of transept, 54ft.; of nave, 46ft.; height of dome above the floor of nave, 85ft.; and above the vestry floor, 92ft. Mr. T. G. Jackson, R.A., was the architect.

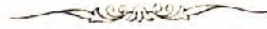

Annual Report of the Committee, 1899-1900.

IN presenting the Annual Report for the past year, your Committee wish to call your attention to the serious state of the Club. In numbers and finances, we are still declining, and it is for you to consider the best means of enabling the Club to be continued.

The Treasurer's account shows that our balance in hand is reduced to £10 : 6 : 4, and the greatest economy must be practised if we are to continue to exist.

A Tea Committee was appointed last year, and our action was justified by a considerable saving in connection with refreshments.

Your Committee suggest that no money be expended on the Ash Court this year, as it is very little used, and requires a considerable sum to keep it in order.

During the past year Croquet formed the principal attraction. The Misses Shepherd again very kindly organised a Croquet Drive, and presented handsome prizes, the fortunate winners being Miss Stackhouse and Mr. J. Lund Brayshaw. We regret that the Misses Shepherd have left the neighbourhood, as they have always taken a great interest in the Club.

It is your duty at this meeting to appoint Ground and Tea Committees, Treasurer, and Secretary; also to fill the vacancies in the General Committee, caused by the retirement of Mrs. Buck, Miss I. Shepherd, Mr. Cornah, and Mr. Shepherd, who are not eligible for re-election.

Your Committee regret that Mr. John Dickinson, who has been our groundsman since the formation of the Club, has resigned his position owing to ill-health. It will be your duty to appoint someone in his place.

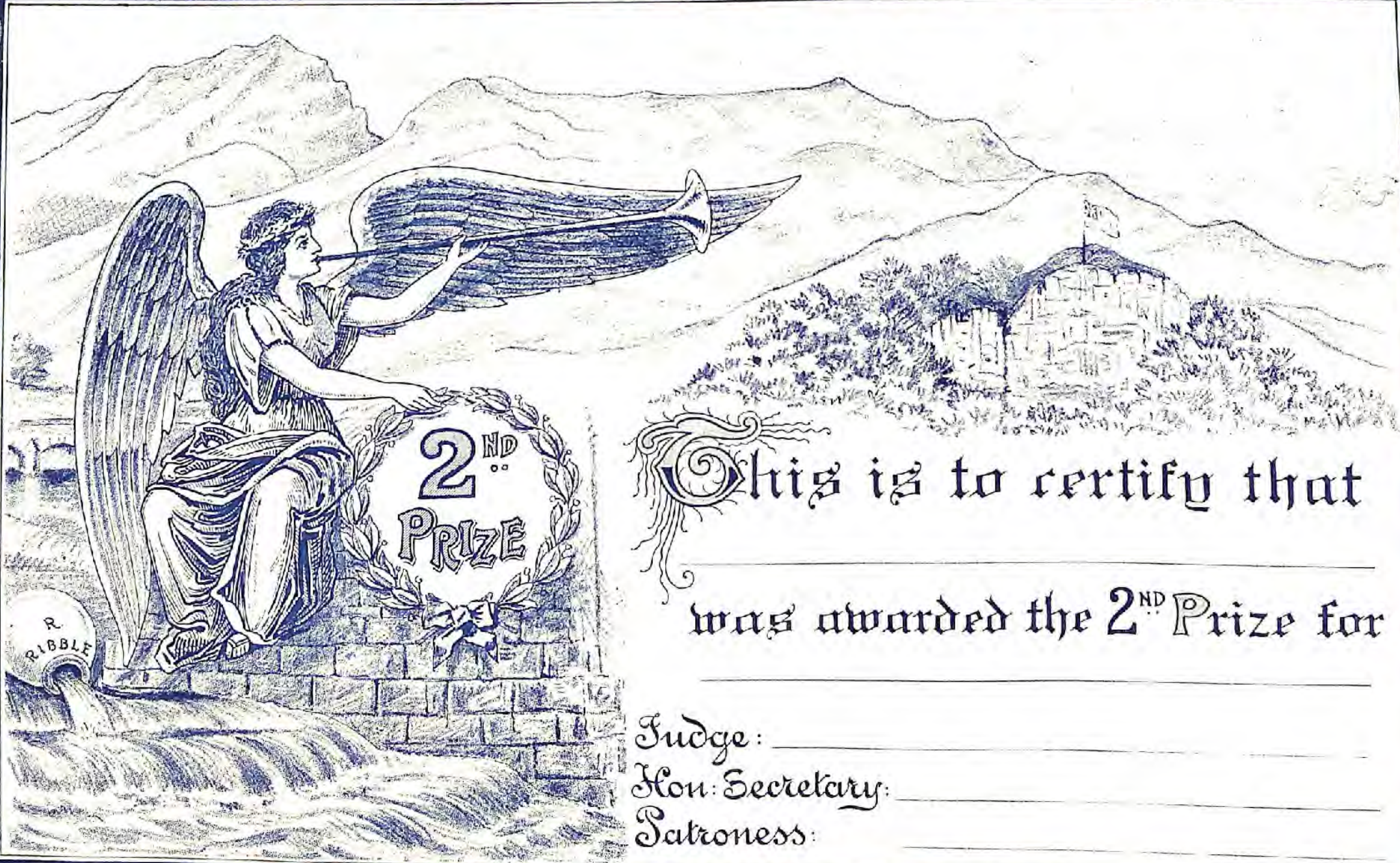
DR. BUTTERTON.

RULES.

1. **District.**—The competitions are open to all persons living within a radius of 12 miles from Settle.

In classes marked 'open' any person residing either within or outside the radius may compete.

2. **Work Admissible.**—All work offered for competition must be the production of the Exhibitor. No Exhibit, which has received a prize at a previous exhibition is eligible for competition, but is welcome for exhibition.

3. **Prizes.**—No article can be entered for competition in more than one class, and no Exhibitor can take more than one Prize in any one class. The committee reserve the right of withholding any Prize where the competition appears insufficient, and of increasing the number of Prizes if it should seem desirable to them.

4. **Certificates.**—Certificates of Merit will be given at the discretion of the Judges.

5. **Power of Selection.**—The Committee reserve the right of refusing any articles sent for Exhibition, either on the ground of insufficient merit, or of non-compliance with the directions in the Schedule, especially with regard to the time of sending in.

6. **Sales.**—The sale of all articles entered and priced for sale must be made through members of the Committee or their assistants. A commission of 5 per cent. will be charged on all sales made during the Exhibition. No work may be removed before the end of the Exhibition.

7. **Forms of Entry and Labels.**—Intending Exhibitors must obtain forms of entry during the month of May, and must return them *filled up legibly*, and with entrance fees, on or before June 1st; they will then receive a label with the number of the entry and class, and this must be attached to the Exhibit before it is sent in. More than one exhibit can be sent in, in the same class, for one fee.

8. **Delivery of Exhibits.**—All Exhibits must be delivered *carriage paid*. They must be addressed to the Sectional Secretary, and must have the name and address of the Exhibitor legibly written on the direction card and also on a card attached to the *inside* of each packing case.

9. **Return of Exhibits.**—Exhibits will be returned if not removed after the close of the Exhibition, at the Exhibitor's risk and expense.

10. **Committee's Responsibility.**—The Committee undertake that no care on their part will be wanting to provide against risk, but they cannot be responsible for damage or loss from any cause. The exhibits will be insured against fire and a night watchman will be on duty.

11. In any dispute the decision of the Committee will be final.

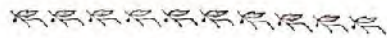

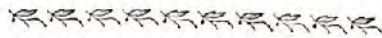

DEAR SIR OR MADAM,

It is proposed to have a **Loan Collection** in connection with the above Exhibition, which Collection will be on view at the Craven Assembly Rooms on the above dates.

We have been asked to take charge of this branch of the Exhibition, and we therefore venture to ask you if you will lend anything for the purpose.

In almost every house in this locality there may be found some objects of interest, either in the shape of Curiosities, Antiquities, Articles of Local or Historical interest, specimens of handicraft, carvings, works of art, needlework, scarce books, prints, pictures, foreign goods, furniture, ornaments, or the thousand-and-one things which from their quaintness or out-of-the-way character, admirably serve to fill a place in what is practically a temporary museum.

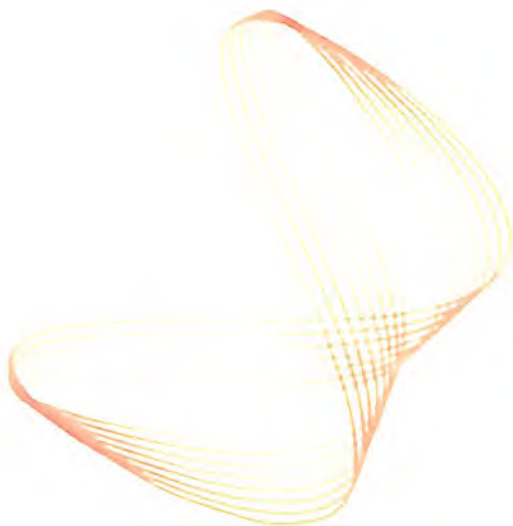

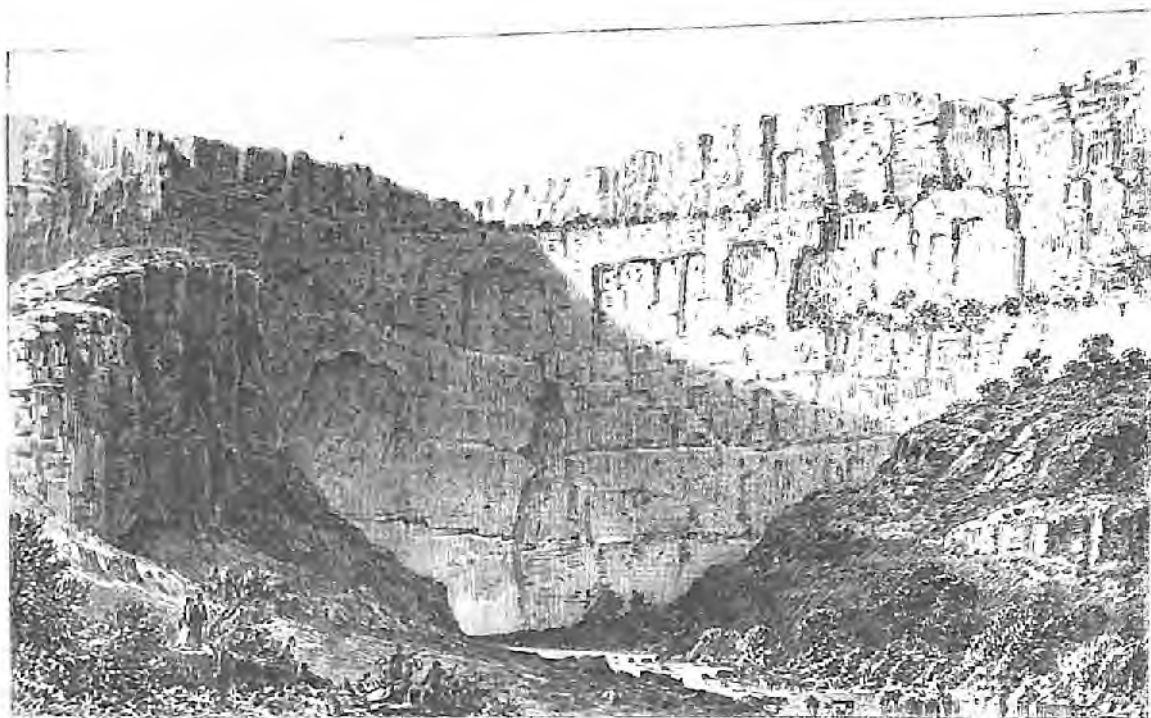

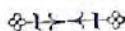

"Queen Victoria's Commemoration."

1837-1897.

Settle Committee.

H. CHRISTIE, Esq., J.P., C.C., Chairman.

AT a Public Meeting held on the 14th of April, 1897 it was decided that, if possible, the Commemoration of Her Majesty's Sixty Years' Reign should be celebrated at Settle by Festivities on the 22nd of June and by the establishment of a Recreation Ground.

The Committee appointed at that Meeting have most carefully considered various suggestions for the last named purpose, and have made exhaustive enquiries, but they regret that their efforts to rent or acquire a piece of land have hitherto been unavailing; unsuitability or cost of same, being considered insurmountable objections.

As to the local Festivities on the 22nd June, the Committee recommend that the same include Sports, a Public Procession, a Tea for all Children under 15 years of age, a Bicycle Parade, and a display of Fireworks.

The Committee feel that although they are at present unable to recommend any particular field, they adhere to the opinion that *it is highly desirable to obtain a Public Recreation Ground for Settle, or for Settle and Giggleswick jointly.*

They therefore appeal for subscriptions to carry out the above programme, and for a Recreation Ground, and after paying the expenses of the Festivities on "Commemoration Day" itself, they trust that a substantial balance will remain to form the nucleus of a fund for the establishment of a Recreation Ground as soon as the same shall become practicable, which balance is to remain for the present in the hands of certain Gentlemen nominated as Trustees.

The Committee hope their appeal will be generously responded to, in order that the memorable occasion may be worthily celebrated and commemorated.

Subscriptions may be paid into the "Queen Victoria Commemoration Fund," at the Craven Bank, Settle; to Mr. Thos Dixon, the Treasurer; Mr. Thos. Brayshaw, or Mr. J. W. Shepherd, the Secretaries; Mr. C. J. Lord, Mr. Henry Ingham, or other accredited collector.
