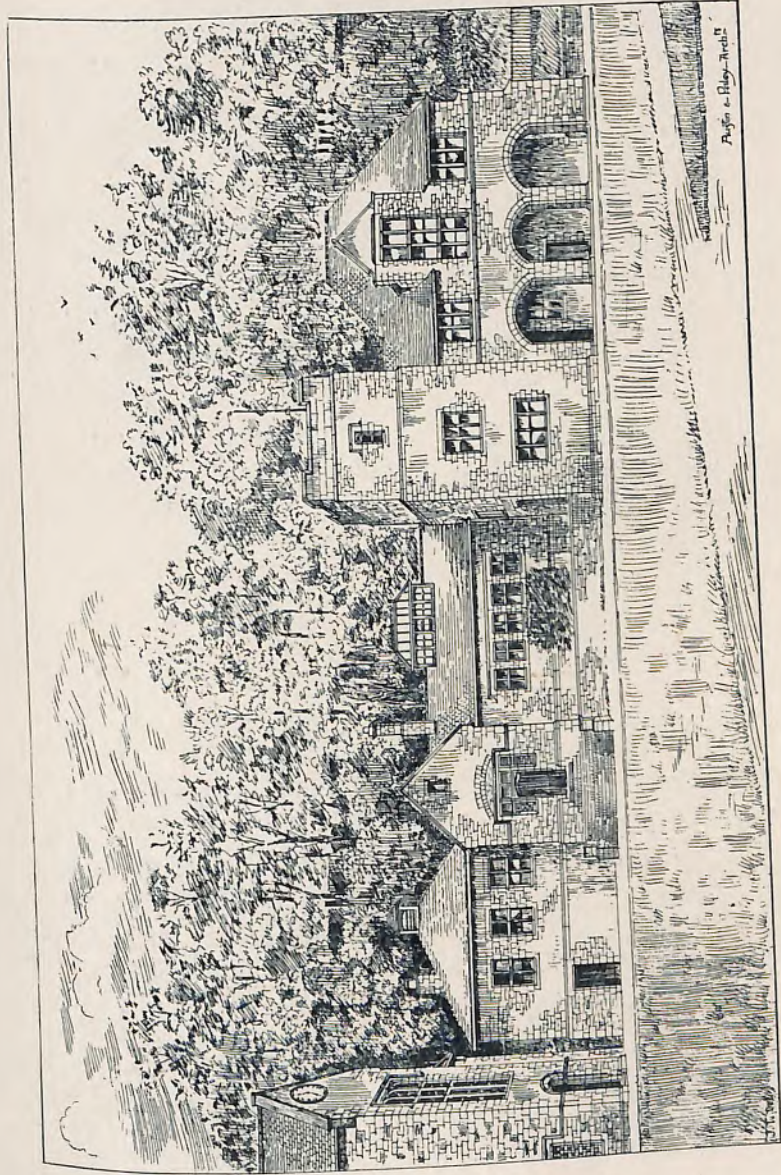


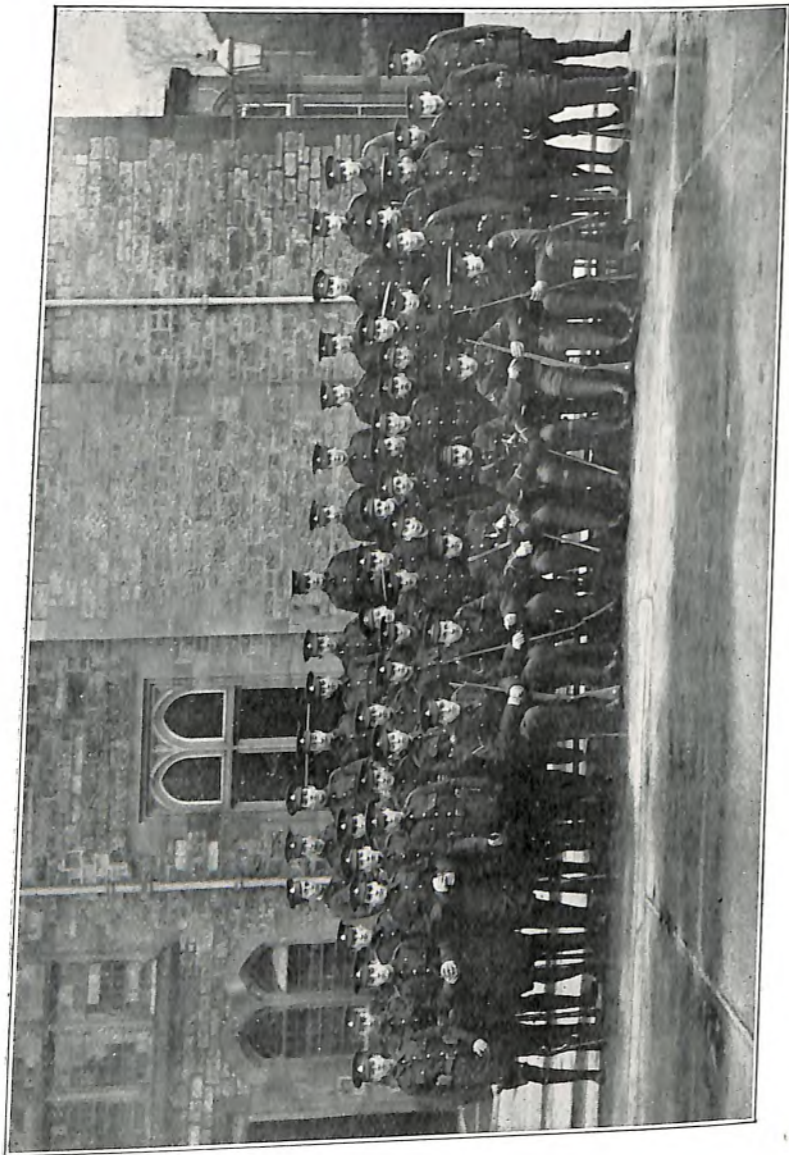

GIGGLESWICK SCHOOL
 PROPOSED 'HYDE MEMORIAL'

Since Mr. Hyde's death last March many of his friends have felt a strong desire to preserve the memory of his life and work at the School by some memorial closely connected with the School itself.

And in consequence a Committee has been formed to carry this object into effect.

As there is no School Chapel in which a window or other memorial might be placed, the Committee feel that their aim should be to do what they can to develop and strengthen a love of music in the School; and (amongst others) two plans have been considered, (1) the founding of a Prize or Prizes, for proficiency in music, (2) obtaining an organ for Big School.

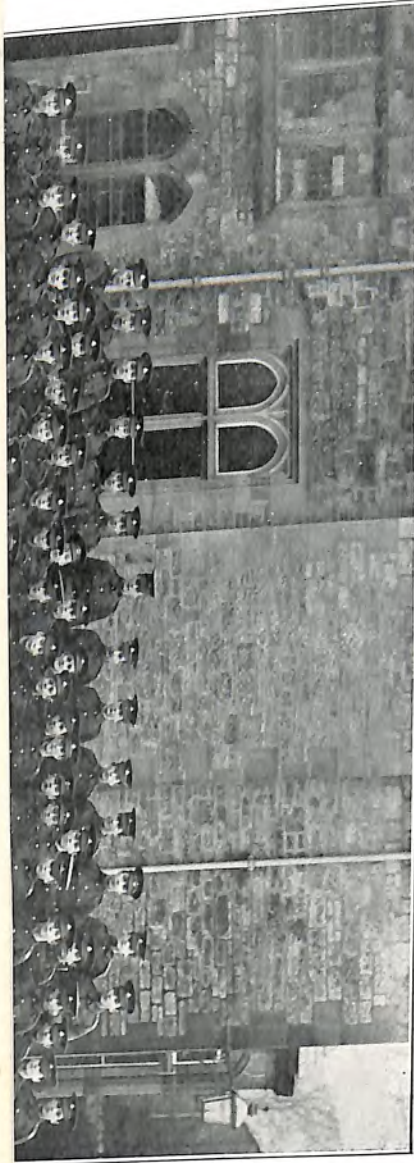
The Committee much prefer the second plan as being, they are sure, in complete accordance with what Mr. Hyde would have himself desired. Almost all his life was devoted to music, and particularly to the Organ. Quite recently his help and counsel did much towards obtaining the beautiful organ placed in Giggleswick Church, upon the completion of its restoration; and he had the satisfaction of knowing that the School Services thereby gained greatly in devotional spirit. The Committee think that, in a similar way, the School Music, and particularly the music at our short daily services would be permanently benefited by an organ in the Schoolroom. An organ so placed would also be very useful educationally, and would be a valuable help in the Choir Practices and at the School Concerts.

GIGGLESWICK.

SCHOOL ESTATES.—In pursuance of their
policy of transferring their real estate from
the East Riding to the immediate neighbour-
hood of the school, the Governors of Giggles-
wick School last week offered by public auc-
tion their property at North Cave, near Hull,
when Messrs. English and Son submitted 21
lots for public competition. Of these, 19 lots,
consisting of farms, water-mill, house and
cottages, pondry, manorial rights, etc., real-
ised £13,000, whilst only two lots, consisting
of the "White Hart Inn" and certain tithe-
rent charge (which together were bid up to
£2,200) had to be withdrawn. Messrs. T. and
J. L. Brayshaw were solicitors to the vendors.

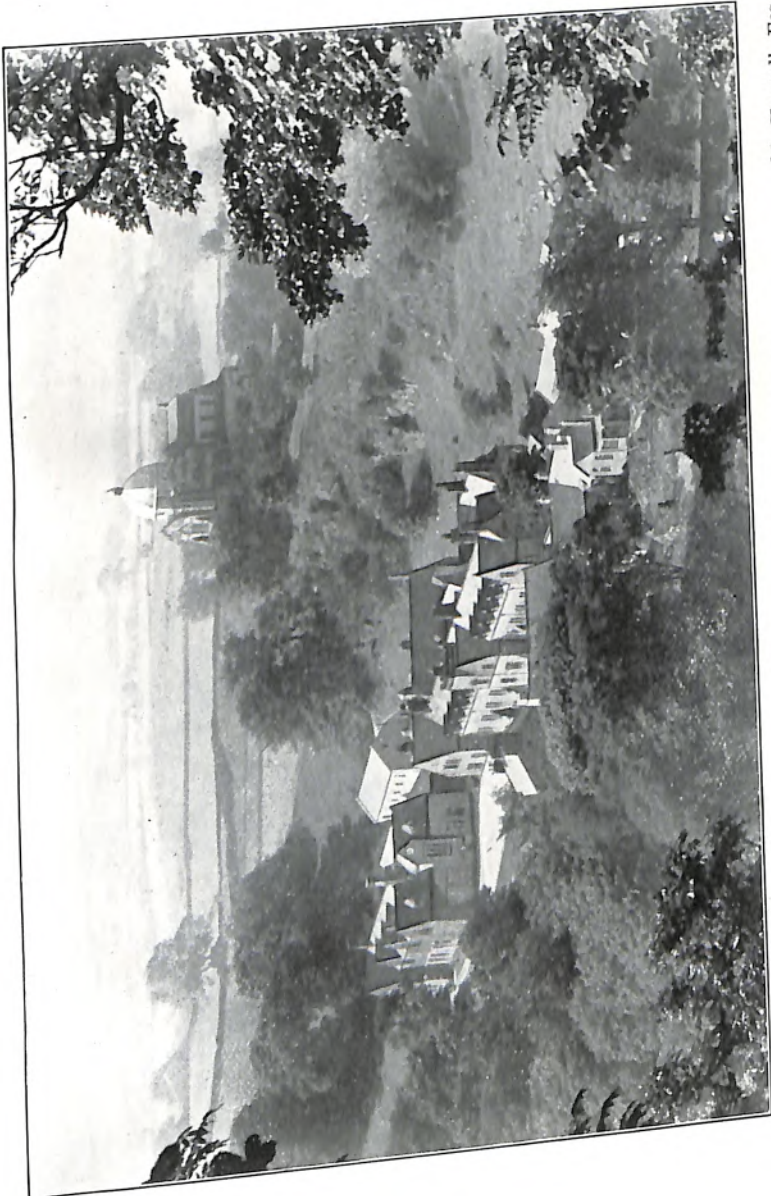

TO THE GOVERNORS.

Giggleswick School,
17th January, 1866.

GENTLEMEN,

I beg very respectfully to submit for your consideration the following remarks, in the confident assurance that it is in your power to allay in some measure the irrepressible and burning sense of unjust and unworthy treatment under which I have long laboured and still smart.

At the first meeting of the Board held after my appointment seven years ago I submitted proposals for a New Scheme substantially the same as those since approved by yourselves. Four years ago I laid similar proposals before the Charity Commissioners and the public. Two years ago the present Board was constituted expressly to carry out measures acknowledged on all hands to be for the good of the school. And yet what is still the condition of their author?

After patiently enduring indignities annoyances and misrepresentation for discharging my duties and resisting encroachments upon my office, after incurring illwill and spending thought time and money, which I could ill spare, in attempting singlehanded to amend the ills from which the school still suffers, after conducting the teaching and discipline of the school (thinned as its ranks and impaired as my health have been by the attacks made upon me) with a success acknowledged by examiners and parents alike, not only have I been refused compensation for these long delays, and for the many wrongs and hardships to which I have at various times drawn attention, not only have I been refused any share of a sum saved by my sacrificing my leisure-hours during a whole half-year to perform the duties of second master, but I have not even received one word of sympathy nor any acknowledgment from the Board collectively.

GIGGLESWICK SCHOOL.

In consequence of the extensive circulation of a Pamphlet, entitled "Full Report of recent events at the Royal Free Grammar School at Giggleswick, with all correspondence relating thereto," the Governors of that School think it right, to lay before the public the following extracts from the Minutes of their proceedings.

At an adjourned Meeting of Governors, holden 31st March 1862,—Present, Rev. Wm. Henry Coulthurst, Vicar of Giggleswick, in the Chair, John Preston, Wm. Robinson, John Birkbeck and Thomas Stackhouse,—it was resolved,—

I. That the Governors most sincerely regret the present depressed state of the School,—occasioned, as they have reason to believe, by certain differences which have unfortunately for some time past existed, between the Rev. J. R. Blakiston the Head Master, and the Rev. M. Wood the Usher:—but inasmuch as Mr. Blakiston has declined to put the matters of his complaint against Mr. Wood in a more definite shape, than may be collected from his letter to the Governors of the 22nd July last, the Governors feel themselves precluded from making a formal adjudication upon them.

II. That the Governors desire to record their satisfaction, that the charge preferred against the Head Master before the Magistrates at Settle on the 11th June last, for assaulting one of the pupils in the School, was dismissed: and the Governors recognize such dismissal by the Bench, as a complete acquittal of Mr. Blakiston from the charge.

III. That the Governors entirely exonerate Mr. Wood, from the charge of malicious motives towards Mr. Blakiston, in the progress of the legal proceedings referred to in the last preceding Resolution: but at the same time they regret that Mr. Wood should in their opinion have acted with indiscretion, and with discourtesy towards Mr. Blakiston, his superior in the School, in the following particulars; viz.

1. When Mr. Wood thought it necessary to have the boy Wright examined by a Surgeon, in consequence of injuries alleged to have been inflicted upon him by the Head Master, he did not at the same time apprise Mr. Blakiston, in order that some other medical man of his selection might also have made an examination:—neither did Mr. Wood communicate to Mr. Blakiston the fact of his being in possession of a medical report on the case.

2. In asking Marriner, another pupil in the School, if he were willing to give evidence against the Head Master;—instead of leaving the Solicitor entrusted with the prosecution, to transact his own business.

3. In not forthwith, after the hearing of the charge on the 11th June, explaining by letter to Mr. Blakiston the part he had really taken in the course of the proceedings;—inasmuch as Mr. Blakiston probably believed, that Mr. Wood had been a more active opponent to him than seems to have been the case.

IV. That with reference to a charge made by Mr. Blakiston against Mr. Wood, in his letter to the Governors of the 12th August last, of having taken into his house as a boarder a pupil of the name of Holroyd, who had previously been a boarder with the Head Master,—the Governors are of opinion that neither they nor the Head Master had any right to interfere with the exercise of the Usher's privilege,
