CONCERT.—A very successful entertainment was given on Saturday last in the Victoria Hall by the pupils of Overdale School for girls, in aid of the Belgian Refugees Central Fund and Princess Mary's Christmas Fund. The house was crowded and over £17 was taken. Thanks to the kindness of many voluntary helpers the expenses were reduced to a minimum, and nearly £15 has been sent to the funds. The first part of the entertainment consisted of part-songs, the National Anthems of the allies, two solos with chorus, two recitations, a Morris dance and a pianoforte duet and solo, the latter a brilliant performance by Miss Ritz, L.R.A.M., to whose capable training the success of the musical part of the evening is entirely due. "The Witch's Triumph" commenced the second half of the programme. This play is based on the Christmas play in Miss Alcott's "Little Women," but considerably modified and extended so as to give parts to fifteen performers. After the play the actresses returned in costume and rendered very brightly a toy symphony consisting of a number of familiar tunes arranged by Miss Ritz to be sung to a variety of toy instruments. The combs and whistling created considerable amusement.

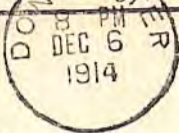

SKIPTON TERRITORIALS FOR FOREIGN DUTY.

We hear on very good authority that the 6th Battalion Duke of Wellington's West Riding Regiment, whose headquarters are at Skipton, and who are now in camp at Doncaster, are to go abroad in the early part of December. The Colonel in Command is Col. J. Birkbeck, who resides at Settle and is a member of a well known and respected Craven family. His brother, Capt. Birkbeck, is adjutant in the Reserve Battalion, and served in the South African War with the 3rd Camerons. The other officers of the regiment are:—

Major C. P. Cass, solicitor, Keighley—Represents the Eastern Division of Keighley on the West Riding County Council; is an Alderman of the Borough and has served on the Town Council for several years. Is prominently identified with sport in the West Riding and has had a lengthy term of office as President of the Keighley Northern Union Football Club.

Major O. M. Bateman—Interested in the firm of Messrs. T. and M. Bairstow, manufacturers, of Crosshills and Bradford. Formerly a well known player with the Skipton Rugby Club.

Surgeon Major Gabriel.—In practice in the medical profession at Keighley, and Medical Officer for the Keighley Union Infirmary.

Captain and Adjutant S. F. Marriner.—Attached to the 1st West Ridings. Served in the South African War, and was appointed Adjutant of the 6th West Riding about two years ago.

The Rev. S. Howard Hall, Sproately Rectory, Hull, Chaplain of the Battalion.

Captain M. Wright, Senior Captain of the Battalion.—A member of the firm of Messrs. A. R. Wright and Co., fancy stuff merchants, Bingley and Bradford. Served three and a half years in the Yorkshire Hussars.

Captain T. K. Wright.—Brother of Capt. M. Wright, and also interested in the firm.

Captain R. V. Marriner.—Partner in the firm of Marriner, Son and Naylor, of Keighley.

Captain W. B. Carson.—With the Bank of Liverpool Ltd., Skipton. Formerly a member of the Skipton Football team and later with the Skipton Grammar School Old Boys.

Captain A. B. Clarkson.—A member of the firm of Messrs. Spencer, Clarkson and Co., Solicitors, Keighley.

Captain B. G. Whittaker.—Organising Agent for the Skipton Division Conservative Association.

Captain K. Nicholson.—Brother of Mr. Wm. Nicholson, of Hellifield Peel, who is an ex-Lord Mayor of Leeds. Associated with the latter in the firm of Messrs. W. Nicholson and Son, Ltd., Leeds, builders and contractors.

Capt. N. B. Chaffers.—Interested in the firm of Messrs. T. and M. Bairstow, manufacturers, of Crosshills and Bradford.

Captain A. E. K. Slingsby.—Son of Mr. J. Arthur Slingsby, J.P., Carla Beck, Carleton. Formerly prominently identified with the Boy Scout movement, being one of the Commissioners for the North of England. One of three brothers now serving with the colours.

Lieut. M. O. M. Law.—A member of the firm of Messrs. Law, Russell, and Co., Merchants, Bradford.

Lieut. S. H. Clough.—Son of Mr. Sam Clough, Steeton Hall, an ex-Mayor of Keighley, and nephew of Mr. Wm. Clough, M.P. for the Skipton Division.

Lieut. C. H. Sarsby.—A member of the firm of Messrs. Sarsby Ltd., merchants, Bradford.

Lieut. J. D. Horsfall.—Son of Sir J. C. Horsfall, Bart., Chairman of the West Riding County Council, and a member of the firm of Messrs. J. C. Horsfall and Sons, worsted spinners, Hayfield Mills, Ghasburn.

Lieut. H. Dixon.—Son of Mr. John Dixon, J.P., of Steeton, and a member of the firm of J. Dixon and Sons, bobbin manufacturers, Crosshills.

Lieut. C. H. Petty.—Son of Mr. F. W. Petty, manufacturer, Bradford and Crosshills.

Lieut. and Quartermaster J. Churchman.—Served with the Third West Ridings in South Africa and was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal. Formerly Sergeant Major of the 6th Battalion Duke of Wellington's (Territorials).

Second Lieut. B. R. Brewin.—Son of Rev. C. Brewin, a former Vicar of Longpreston. Saw service in the South African War.

Second Lieut. C. S. Horsfall.—Eldest son of Sir John Horsfall, and a member of the firm.

Second Lieut. R. M. Robinson.—Second son of the late Col. Robinson, of Overdale, Skipton, who was for many years O.C. the 3rd Volunteer Battalion Duke of Wellington's West Riding Regiment.

Second Lieut. E. J. C. Supple.—Formerly a master at the Skipton Grammar School and now in the scholastic profession at Brighton.

Second Lieut. F. L. Smith.—Son of Mr. Alfred Smith, Woodworth, Keighley, who is associated with the firm of Messrs. Hattersley, loom makers, Keighley.

Second Lieut. H. Knowles.—Son of Mr. M. R. Knowles, solicitor, of Skipton, and Clerk to the Skipton Board of Guardians and Rural District Council.

TRULY this is an hour when "Our Country is calling," but Craven can hold up its head in pride, for the sons of the Yorkshire Highlands have now, as their fathers did of old, nobly responded to the trumpet's blast. No longer does a Clifford or De Percy *command* his retainers to follow him to the field of battle, but the sturdy youths from the hills and dales over which Pen-y-ghent, Ingleborough, and Pendle keep watch and ward, have cheerfully and voluntarily answered to the call of duty.

By the banks of Ribble and Aire, of Greta and Wenning and Wharfe, there is many a homestead where, for the time being, there is a vacant chair. But the parents' hearts, though anxious, are filled with laudable pride.

In the more populous places the clerk and the business-man have put aside their pens, in the villages the skilled workman has laid down the tools of his craft, and in the outlying farms

the agriculturalist has left his spouse young and idle, and each of them has, with calm determination, made pecuniary sacrifices and given up home comforts, and is prepared, if need be, to lay down his life in defence of his beloved country. And we are all proud of these "Young Heroes" who have volunteered to undergo hardships and dangers in order that those of us who remain at home may rest in security.

But unfortunately there are some exceptions. In our streets we can still find able-bodied young fellows, who have no one dependent on them, and whose places would be kept open for them. But they prefer ease and comfort at home. Such individuals ought to be decorated with the "Order of the White Feather." Whether they stay at home from greed or cowardice or laziness is immaterial. Their country needs them, but they put Self before Country, and turn a deaf ear, and they may rest assured that the contempt of their fellows, which they have so richly earned, will cling to them throughout the years to come.

For married men with families, and for those whose dependents would be reduced to poverty if aught happened to the bread-winner, there is of course good excuse, but there are still specimens of humanity to be seen at whom the finger of scorn will be pointed to their dying day if they do not respond to the appeal of their King and Country.

As for the absent ones, our loving thoughts are ever with them. How we honour their names! How eagerly we look for tidings of them! And how we long for the day when we shall give them a joyous welcome on their triumphant return! We pray there may be no gaps in their ranks, and that no chair may remain vacant on that memorable day.

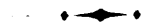

SETTLE AND DISTRICT WAR RELIEF FUND.



Government Allowance to Dependents of Soldiers OTHER THAN WIVES and CHILDREN.



The Government are now making an allowance to Fathers, Mothers, Sisters and others who were in any way dependent on Soldiers before they enlisted.

The allowance is on a scale according to the amount the man paid before he went away, and to obtain same he must consent to a deduction from his pay as follows:

The amount which will be allowed is the net profit which was derived from the Soldier by the Dependent. Thus, supposing he paid 12/- per week for Board and Lodging, the cost of his board is deducted (say 7/- per week) and the allowance will be 5/- per week. If, however, a Soldier agrees to a deduction at a higher rate than will entitle the dependent to the amount so due to him or her, any surplus paid by the Soldier will be paid over to the Dependent over and above the allowance.

If there are no children of the Soldier, 12 6 per week is the highest allowance which will be made. If there are children belonging to the Soldier the allowance can be increased to 20 per week in accordance with the scale.

In the cases of non-commissioned Officers the Allowances and Deductions are somewhat higher than those given above.

HOW TO GET THE ALLOWANCE.

In the case of Soldiers at present in England, write at once to the Soldier with this paper. He will then apply to his Commanding Officer who will give him the proper form on which to make application. A form will also be sent to the Dependent to fill up.

In cases of men serving abroad a form of application can be obtained by the Dependent at any Post Office or Police Station, and if there is good reason to suppose the Soldier will contribute his share a temporary allowance will be made. If, however, he refuses, this will be withdrawn.

Any member of the Relief Committee of the Settle War Fund will be pleased to give assistance in filling up the above forms.

When the allowance is granted it will be paid weekly at a Post Office.

In future, the Committee in making grants will assume that the Government Allowance has been applied for, and any amounts given by them will be regulated accordingly.

I.

THE ORDER OF HOLY COMMUNION.

¶ *In the Order of Holy Communion these Collects shall be used after the Collect of the Day, with the Epistle and Gospel as followeth :*

O GOD, whose never-failing providence ordereth all things both in heaven and earth : We humbly beseech thee to put away from us all hurtful things, and to give us those things which be profitable for us ; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

LORD of all power and might, who art the author and giver of all good things : Graft in our hearts the love of thy Name, increase in us true religion, nourish us with all goodness, and of thy great mercy keep us in the same ; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

The Epistle. Romans viii. 18.

FOR I reckon that the sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory which shall be revealed in us. For the earnest expectation of the creature waiteth for the manifestation of the sons of God. For the creature was made subject to vanity, not willingly, but by reason of him who hath subjected the same in hope : because the creature itself also shall be delivered from the bondage of corruption, into the glorious liberty of the children of God. For we know that the whole creation groaneth and travaileth in pain together until now. And not only they, but ourselves also, which have the firstfruits of the Spirit, even we ourselves groan within ourselves, waiting for the adoption, to wit, the redemption of our body. For we are saved by hope : but hope that is seen is not hope : for what a man seeth, why doth he yet hope for ? But if we hope for that we see not, then do we with patience wait for it. Likewise the Spirit also helpeth our infirmities : for we know not what we should pray for as we

ought : but the Spirit itself maketh intercession for us with groanings which cannot be uttered. And he that searcheth the hearts knoweth what is the mind of the Spirit, because he maketh intercession for the saints according to the will of God. And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God.

The Gospel. St Matthew vii. 7.

Ask, and it shall be given you ; seek, and ye shall find ; knock, and the door shall be opened unto you. For every one that asketh receiveth ; and he that seeketh findeth ; and to him that knocketh it shall be opened. What man is there of you, whom if his son ask bread, will he give him a stone ? Or if he ask a fish, will he give him a serpent ? If ye then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts unto your children, how much more shall your Father which is in heaven give good things to them that ask him. Therefore all things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do even so to them : for this is the law and the prophets.

¶ *Before bidding the people to pray for the whole state of Christ's Church militant here in earth, the Priest shall say :*

Let us pray that Almighty God will grant his continual help and guidance to us and to the peoples who are allied with us in this war.

Let us pray for all to whom is committed the duty of government, that they may act with wisdom and courage.

Let us pray for the sailors and soldiers of our King and of his Allies.

Let us pray for the sick and wounded, the anxious and the bereaved, whether our own or of the enemy ; and let us commend to the merciful God those who fall in the service of their country.

Let us pray that peace may be restored, and that the issues of the war may be over-ruled for the glory of God and the enlargement of his kingdom.

¶ *Before the Blessing shall be said these Prayers that follow :*

O ALMIGHTY God, who canst bring good out of evil, and makest even the wrath of man to turn to thy praise : We beseech thee so to order and dispose the issue of this war, that we may be brought through strife to a lasting peace ; and that the nations of the world may be united in a firmer fellowship for the promotion of thy glory and the good of all mankind ; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

REMEMBER, O Lord, what thou hast wrought in us, and not what we deserve ; and, as thou hast called us to thy service, make us worthy of our calling ; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

That we may be the better able to do this our duty, let us first endeavour to deepen in ourselves those feelings of need and unworthiness, which alone we may fitly approach the throne of grace; and let us carefully consider what those things are for which we may rightly present our petitions.

The conflict in which, by grievous necessity, we are engaged, as we must try to the utmost the strength of ourselves and our Allies, were that strength never so much greater than it is, it would not be such. And only be

In parishes where it is desired to make special intercessions on the days of the week which follow the appointed Sunday, the Form preceding may serve again; and use may be made of the Forms already authorized and issued. For the commemoration of those who have fallen in the War such Form shall be used as is sanctioned by the Bishop of the Diocese.

The following Table may be found convenient for the assignment of particular subjects to the several days:

Monday. The King. The Government. The Leaders of our Forces. The Allied Nations, with their Rulers and Commanders.

Tuesday. Our Forces, and those of our Allies; at sea, on land, in the air. That they may be granted protection in danger; and victory in battle.

Wednesday. The wounded, the sick, the dying. All who minister to the sick. The mourners, and all who suffer distress through the War.

Thursday. The Nation; the Empire; the Church. That there may be a deeper civilization based upon a deeper knowledge and a firmer acceptance of the Gospel message.

Friday. That we may put away the unchristian feelings of hatred and vengeance; and may learn to pray for our enemies. That they and we may receive forgiveness of all our sins, and may be guided into the way of Peace.

Sunday. Those who have fallen in the War; whom we commend to the mercy of God; thanking him for their devotion even to death.

Times of special prayer are observed in Church daily for our Nation and Empire, and our Allies during this time of war. A few people attend daily,—usually a very few. About a score attend the Intercession Services on Wednesday and Friday evenings. The approach of Lent suggests the enquiry as to whether more advantage might not and ought not to be taken of these opportunities. Is it that a great many of our people do not believe in the efficacy of prayer, or that they are too indifferent to the well-being of our Nation and Empire to pray for its well-being? We gladly recognise that many pray in their homes, who do not come to Church, to make intercession for those who are fighting and training to fight our battles. But united prayer should also be offered. The 8 a.m. Celebration on Wednesdays is for the special purpose of pleading the death of Christ for those who occupy positions of responsibility at this time of grave crisis and anxiety, and for our sailors and soldiers. These need all the help and support that our prayers can bring to them. Whilst we are thankful for the few—usually the same persons, who come regularly, we would like more to attend. Lent would be a good time to make a beginning.

A short address will be given during Lent at either the Wednesday or the Friday evening Service of Intercession.
