

Youth and Reconstruction.

GIVE THE GROWING BOYS A CHANCE.

As General Mends remarked at the meeting in September last for the furtherance of the cadet movement in the Keighley district, the purpose of those who are desirous of seeing the cadet force greatly strengthened is not simply, or even primarily, a military one. The leading idea of the whole movement is the promotion of the general well-being and all-round equipment for the duties of life of the boys and youths on whom will devolve in due course the responsibilities of citizenship. Persons of an observant and thoughtful turn of mind cannot but be uncomfortably impressed by some of the developments to which the present exceptional state of affairs is giving rise, and gravely concerned as to possible consequences. The enlistment of so many men in the Army and the working of married women in munition factories, with the consequent withdrawal or slackening of parental control, has seriously interfered with the upbringing of the youth of the nation. The gravity of the problem has been recognised in the recent talk about educational reconstruction. A great scheme of continuation schools has been foreshadowed, which, it is understood, will include provision for some form of physical training. But most of these projects, excellent as they are, are not capable of early realisation.

A PRESSING NEED AND A WAY TO MEET IT.

Meanwhile, there is pressing need of some immediate provision for enabling and encouraging the youth of the country to take up physical training and for giving them the advantages of a disciplinary experience of the best possible kind. How great the need is must be obvious when it is realised that out of about 1,400,000 youths between the ages of 14 and 18 in the Kingdom, only some 65,000 are in recognised cadet corps. Besides, most of these corps draw their membership from youths of secondary schools, where some form of discipline is already provided in the ordinary school syllabus. The great majority of the boy population, who finish their school life at 14, receive no sort of training at all. They may or may not spend their days in some form of useful service or beneficial work, but, outside this work, they are left to shift for themselves. There is at present unquestionably a big breach in the provision for the welfare and general equipment of the rising generation; and, for the time being, at any rate, the cadet force offers the most promising means of filling that breach. For that reason alone endeavours to strengthen and improve the force are deserving of every encouragement.

WON'T YOU COME AND HELP?

AN URGENT CALL AND A GREAT OPPORTUNITY.

After a very strenuous struggle to keep the cadet flag flying in the Craven area through the war period, the new scheme for the reorganisation of the corps, with a view to a great extension of activities, was just being launched last autumn when the armistice came and put everything else out of mind with almost everyone, for the time being. Then followed the Parliamentary election, which kept a good many of those who had promised to help in the matter pretty fully occupied in other directions until the end of the year. Since then there have been numerous obstacles to a resumption of consultations on the part of the central and district committees. The last week or two, however, have brought a few signs of a renewal of interest. There are two or three hopeful features in the new situation that has arisen since the matter was last under consideration, and if the opportunities that offer are promptly taken advantage of it ought to be possible to work up a bigger development of the force than seemed feasible six months ago. The constant drain on the force due to the calling up of members as they reached military age has ceased, and, so far as the trained members are concerned, it is simply a question of discovering means of retaining their services and getting them to help in extending the force's sphere of usefulness. The return of old members from war service should also assist in the solving of one of the main problems—that of finding a sufficient number of capable leaders to lend a hand in the training of new recruits as they come in.



Camp Attractions and Recreational Possibilities.

There is very little doubt that the plans for holiday camp training would make a very strong appeal if only they are given sufficient publicity. But there is no time to lose if this opportunity is not to be missed for the present season. Provisional arrangements, are being made for a camp at either Morecambe or Blackpool at Whitsuntide, and the prospect of a camping experience should offer a very great inducement to youths who have not yet joined the force to enrol. It is a pity the reorganisation scheme is not already sufficiently advanced to enable the most to be made of this opportunity. Still, a good deal may still be accomplished if things are pushed on with vigour. There is plenty of scope for cadet battalions to play a big part in the general educational reconstruction which most people want to see. Especially can they help in providing for improved physical training by offering facilities for recreational activities and games. But to play their full part in this respect they need the backing and support of the employers and leading citizens in every locality.

AN APPEAL FOR HELP.

We are sorry to hear that the Cadet movement in Craven is not receiving the support it deserves. The 6th West Riding Battalion, which since the war started has provided over 300 officers and lads for the Army, is in want of officers and lads, as well as funds. This is a condition of affairs which ought not to obtain in a district which has in a variety of ways shown its patriotism, and we appeal with confidence to those who are in a position to help to come forward and assist the present officers to make the Battalion the success it ought to be. Under the circumstances in which the country finds itself, Cadet Corps are required now more than ever. No one knows how long the war will last and the training the lads receive in the Corps enables them to become more efficient soldiers in the event of their being called to the Colours. In other ways also, such as the promotion of comradeship, the Corps confers many useful benefits on the lads. It should be noted that applications for commissions should be made to Capt. Mildrum, The War Office, York.

With a view to taking steps to creating greater interest in the movement, the officers met at the Skipton Conservative Club on Saturday afternoon under the chairmanship of Mr. William Nicholson, of Hellifield Peel who, with Mr. Walter Morrison, has done so much to keep the Battalion alive. Representatives were present from Skipton, Keighley, Barnoldswick, Crosshills, Settle, and Hellifield. A communication was read from Brigadier-General Mends, expressing his concurrence with the view expressed that a committee should be formed with one or more representatives from the localities now possessing a unit, platoon, or company, such localities to be responsible for the finances of their particular units and of the Battalion. The Battalion's financial position was discussed, and it was reported that the debit balance of £150 14s. 3d. at the end of last year had been reduced by £100 by a grant of £25 from the West Riding Territorial Association, and subscriptions of £50 and £25 from Mr. Morrison and Mr. Nicholson respectively.

During some informal conversation the view was expressed that sufficient support was not given by the people of Keighley, Skipton, Settle, Barnoldswick, Crosshills, Haworth and Cononley to the Companies of Cadets in these districts. It transpired that the chairman some months ago met the Mayor of Keighley and offered to subscribe £20 to the funds of the Battalion if ten Keighley gentlemen would give a similar amount. This generous offer has not yet met with the success it deserved, but it is still open; and Mr. Nicholson is also prepared to subscribe a certain amount for the upkeep of each unit provided the local people will come forward and subscribe at least a similar amount. This is an offer that ought to be met in a similarly generous spirit by the people of the several towns and villages concerned.

The opinion was also expressed that the West Riding Territorial Association, if they desire to make the movement a success in Craven, ought to grant railway warrants for the Cadets to travel for Battalion drill purposes. The companies are so far apart that Battalion drill is impossible without railway travelling, and the expense is at present militating against the Battalion drill being carried out as it ought to be. The resignations of the Commanding Officer, Capt. Clark, and the secretary, Mr. George Aked, were received, and it was decided to forward them to the War Office for instructions.
