

cases elsewhere varied from 5s. per week to 9s. per week according to the amount of salary, the larger bonuses being given to the lower salaried officials. Recipients of salaries up to £100 had generally received 9s. per week as war bonus and 5s. per week to officers receiving up to £300 per annum.—Mr. Cornthwaite proposed that the board should grant a war bonus of 8s. per week.—Mr. Harger seconded.—Mr. Hunter said he had no objection to granting increased payment at the present time, but he thought they should be clear as to whether they were granting bonuses for the duration of the war or permanent increases of wages.—The Chairman said the proposal was to grant a war bonus, and that would expire at the end of the war.—It was agreed to grant a war bonus of 8s. per week.

**Supplies.**—The Clerk said the time was practically at hand for arranging contracts for supplies for the coming half year, but he did not think any good purpose would be served only by arrangement with contractors, as at mid-summer.—It was agreed to adopt that course.

**Estimates.**—It was arranged to consider the estimates at the next meeting, and authorisation was given for the signing of contribution orders.

## RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL.

### WAR BONUSES AND HOUSING.

Cr. F. J. Haggas presided at the monthly meeting of the Rural District Council.

**Telegraph Poles.**—The highways surveyor was empowered to sanction the erection of telegraph poles from Horton-in-Ribblesdale to New Inn, in connection with which alterations where necessary through post-office changes.

**Alleged Damage at Ingleton.**—The Clerk read an apology from boys at Ingleton for having committed damage to wagons and quarry, and an offer was made to defray the cost of the damage, which amounted to 22s. 9d. It was agreed under the circumstances not to press the summons, which had already been issued, and the matter was left to the clerk.

**More Bonuses for Workmen.**—In regard to an application from the Council's workmen for increased pay in view of the increased cost of living, the Surveyor reported that the wages of roadmen varied from 25s. to 30s. per week, including the war bonus of 3s. per week granted by the Council in July, 1915. The quarrymen received 7d. to 7½d. per hour, including a similar war bonus. The roadmen's wages did not compare favourably with men in similar capacities and quarrymen in the district received 7d. to 7½d. per hour exclusive of higher war bonuses than the amount granted to the Council's employees.—The Chairman said it seemed only fair to consider the matter favourably, and grant an additional war bonus.—Cr. Hunter said it might be advisable to give an additional war bonus of 2s. per week and an increase of wages of 1s. per week. Such a step might give more satisfaction than the granting of a war bonus only. He thought they would have to realise that rates of pay were not likely to come down after the war.—The Chairman said if they granted increases in the form of war bonuses they would be able to consider the question of future wages from the point at which they stood before the war.—Cr. Cornthwaite said the Council had some good workmen, and they should try to retain them.—It was decided to grant an additional war bonus of 3s. per week.

**War Bonus for Surveyor.**—The Highways Surveyor reminded the Council that the high cost of living also affected him, and asked that consideration be given to the matter. If he was worth £200 per annum in normal times, it would appear that he was worth more at the present time.—It was agreed to grant the surveyor a war bonus of 6s. per week, which was the same amount as the bonus granted to the road and quarrymen.

**Food Control Committee.**—A letter was read from the Local Government Board and the Food Control Department, respecting the appointment of a local Food Control Committee. Letters were also read from the Bentham Co-operative Society and the Settle Co-operative Society, suggesting that a representative should be included in the membership of the local committee.—The Chairman said local advisory sub-committees would eventually be appointed, and representatives from trading organisations could be included on these sub-committees. The committee which they had to appoint had to comprise not more than twelve members, not necessarily members of the Council, but one lady and one Labour representative had to be appointed.—Cr. Harger said he thought there should be more than one committee in such a wide area. If the committee was to be representative of the whole area, travelling expenses to a central place would be rather heavy.—Cr. Cornthwaite said if they appointed representatives of co-operative societies they should also appoint private traders and it was a committee to control the food that was wanted.—Cr. Harger: Traders and farmers.—Cr. Hunter said the greatest danger was in getting too much control. If the control continued they would stop production.—It was agreed to appoint a committee of twelve, and the following were elected:—Messrs. Haggas, Metcalfe, Harger, Swinbank, and Winskill (members of the Council), Miss Ford (Bentham), Mrs. J. Parker, Mrs. Pearson, Messrs. G. Northey (Ingleton), J. Leeming (Bentham), J. Hancock (Settle), and N. Newman (Hollifield), the last-

inees. He (the clerk) thought it was a compliment to Mr. Stuart, and to the Council generally, that he had been appointed a member of such an important body (hear, hear).

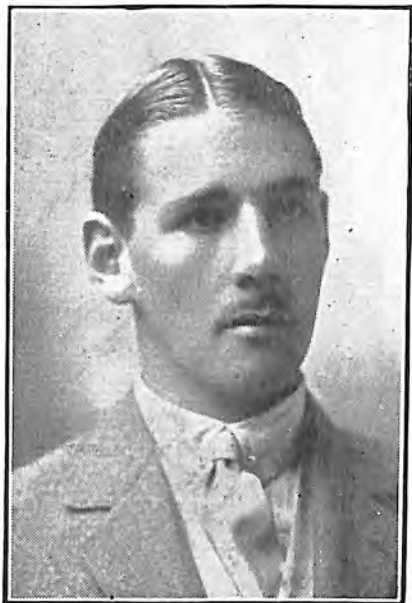

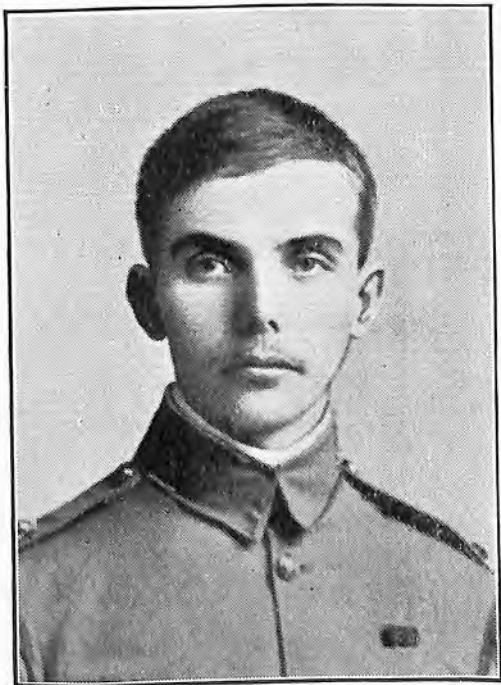

**BRITISH PRISONERS OF WAR.**

**New Parcels Arrangements.**

The Central Prisoners of War Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John has now decided upon a series of standard parcels which can be sent to prisoners at the cost of those regimental care committees and other authorised organisations or individuals who desire the Central Committee to pack and distribute gifts for them. The price of each parcel of food has been fixed at 6s.

The Committee has arranged these parcels, after considering information as to the wants received from prisoners. The Central Committee has its own buyer, and a special point will be made of seeing that the goods are of the best quality. There will be a series of parcels with varied contents, and it is proposed to alternate them so that men will get variety and the highest nutritive value. The great thing aimed at is the provision of substantial and good food in sufficient quantity.

In addition to the regular parcels of food-stuffs another very necessary parcel—the first capture parcel—has been arranged to be sent as soon as news has been received that a man has been taken prisoner. This will contain the obvious necessities, and costs about 7s. All parcels bear the name of the sender.

The London County Council offers about 324 trade scholarships to girls who are between the ages of 13½ and 15½ years on March 31 next.

On Saturday the gun will be handed over to the care of Mr. Walter Morrison at a public meeting in the Market Place.

Brayshaw, R. D. Metcalfe, and J. Swinbank. It was decided to ask for five lectures on horticulture and two lectures on poultry keeping before Christmas if possible. The arrangements made by the Ladies' Sub-committee for instituting social gatherings for students in the technical and evening school about once a month were confirmed.—A Governors meeting followed, at which Mr. Swinbank presided, and Messrs. T. Brayshaw, T. Harger, R. D. Metcalfe, and J. Swinbank were present. The increase of £20 to the salary of the headmistress was confirmed.

**LOCAL WAR FUND.**—A committee has been organised for the purpose of sending Christmas parcels to all men from this district serving with the Forces. A large number of ladies and gentlemen have volunteered to assist in the work, though more assistance will be welcomed. Mr. George Charlesworth is treasurer of the fund, and Messrs. T. Brayshaw and T. E. Pearson the secretaries. Mr. John Moore has been appointed chairman of the Parcels Committee, and he is assisted by Messrs. C. F. Armistead and W. F. Clark, and by several ladies representing sundry organisations, whilst in order to specially interest the young folk in the work, Mrs. Parker, Miss Wilman, and Miss Brennan are looking after the schools at Giggleswick, Settle, and Langcliffe. The Committee are appealing for pecuniary help as well as for gifts of cakes, chocolate, tobacco, worked articles, and other comforts, and it is desired that the names of all men serving from the district should be sent to the secretaries. The scheme has received enthusiastic support, and already over £11 has been received from the collection at the meeting when the captured German machine-gun was handed over to Hon. Lieut.-Col. Morrison.
