Use of Reading Room in case of National Emergency

(1) Rent: 7/6 per week. This figure includes the upstairs room, as we are not prepared to let the downstairs room separately. The upstairs room will be no earthly use to us without the lower room. There is, however, some talk of the West Riding County Council requiring accommodation for a school for the children who will be billeted in Rathwell perhaps you might be able to arrange for them the use of the upstairs room

(2) Rates

We have no idea what the rates would be in war-time, and these would be your responsibility entirely.

(3) Lighting

The rooms are lit by electricity and current is 7d per unit. A meter is installed and you would pay for the amount used.
