THE REVEREND JOHN CLAPHAM WINDOW 1879 The Reverend John Clapham

He was the vicar of St Alkelda's Church, Giggleswick, from $6^{\rm th}$ October, 1782 until his death on $21^{\rm st}$ May, 1839, aged 80, a total of 56 years.

Alice Atkinson was the lady who paid for the Clapham window.

The window has the inscription:

"In Memory of Rev'd John Clapham, for 56 years Vicar of Giggleswick, this window was erected at the request and expense of his friend Alice Atkinson, of Giggleswick, by her Executors. May A.D. 1879"



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Clapham, John, son of Thomas Clapham, Stackhouse; Christ's Coll., Cambridge, July, 1774; Scholar, May, 1776; B.A. (1st Sen. Opt.) 1779; M.A. 1782. Ordained Deacon, Peterborough, June, 1781; Priest, York, October, 1782. Instituted to Vicarage of Giggleswick, 6th October, 1782; collated by the Archbishop on a lapse. Died 21st May, 1839; aged 80. His tombstone is in the village Churchyard.

The Rev'd John Clapham's own marriage to Mary Bateman took place in Old Hutton, Kendal in 1785.





There is only one child recorded of their marriage when they lived in Giggleswick – Thomas

They had another son, William , who left a considerable sum of money.

There is no record found of the death of John Clapham's wife, Mary.



There are a few local references to his life and work as Vicar of the Giggleswick Church.

There are entries in various documents held in the Parish Rooms of St Alkelda's relating to the Rev'd John Clapham. By all accounts he had a robust local accent and was somewhat of a difficult character to deal with at times.



he Reverend Clapham was noted for his eccentricity. There is a story that one Ash Wednesday he was about to conduct the service, when he discovered that there was only one person in the three-decker pulpit and said to his clerk, "As there's nobbut me and thee and old Miss So-and-so, I think we'll e'an gang home and get theagles out. So tell her to fetch t'scholar-boys who hev a holiday." So they did, the reverend, his clerk, old Miss So-and-so, the boys and the beagles. They walked for some time when, on passing a farmhouse, they smelled cooking. The Reverend knocked on the door and asked what it was. "Tatypie," the good lady replied. "Would you like some?" - Whereupon they all trooped into the farmhouse kitchen and sat round a large table. She gave them all a helping but when he tasted it, the Reverend Clapham said, "Where's t'meat?"

To which she replied, "I said taty-pie, and taty-pie you've got!"

Alice Atkinson (1800 - 1879)

Alice Atkinson was the lady who paid for the Clapham window.

There is very little known of the person of Alice Atkinson.

1841 Census

This shows Alice age 40, named as Allice, living with her mother, Alice, aged 65, both independent women, with two servants.

She is recorded in a census as living in "Bankwell" , the house, next to the Parish Rooms in Gigglewick.
