

Henry Gore, a stationer, bookbinder, commercial traveller

The 19th century was a time for entrepreneurs to experiment and flourish. Henry Gore made his money as a salesman when and where opportunity arose.

Henry Gore was the son of a landed proprietor John Gore and his wife Elizabeth Andrews from Cambridgeshire. Henry married Elizabeth Pratt from Derbyshire and they had a son Henry and a daughter. Henry (snr) worked as a commercial traveller, occasionally dabbling in bookselling and took his family to Derbyshire and then in 1879 bought the well known Settle printing business from *William Wildman*. He was based at the corner of Duke Street and Station Road opposite Craglands, the old police station.



In 1880 Henry, of 'Craven Machine Printing Works' printed leaflets to promote the sale of Scalebar and Lings Copy (close to Lodge Farm) 'now in the occupation of *Thomas Twisleton*' [ph1].

Son Henry Stafford Gore Andrews was 11 when he died in 1881 and perhaps this prompted dad Henry to sell the business to E Clarke in 1884 to become the Craven Printing and Stationery Co.Ltd.

Henry obviously made a good living while he was here – he could afford the gravestone for his son, and had a servant and apprentices throughout his life. He also dabbled in cricket materials! [WSA/LSA]
