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"Dangerous Corner" at Lawkland 1792

At the other end of the road, near Settle, a good piece of work was carried out. The old road ran from the top of Buckhaw Brow, past Brunton House and regained its line by steep and slippery descent known as Raulinshaw Brow. The new road was carried on an easy gradient under the limestone crag of Cave Ha' to a field of Mrs Clapham's, and thence under Crow Nest Scar -- through the lands of Mr Waddington and Mr Lupton into the present road at the foot of Raulinshaw Brow.

The old road still remains at the back of and above Cave Ha'.

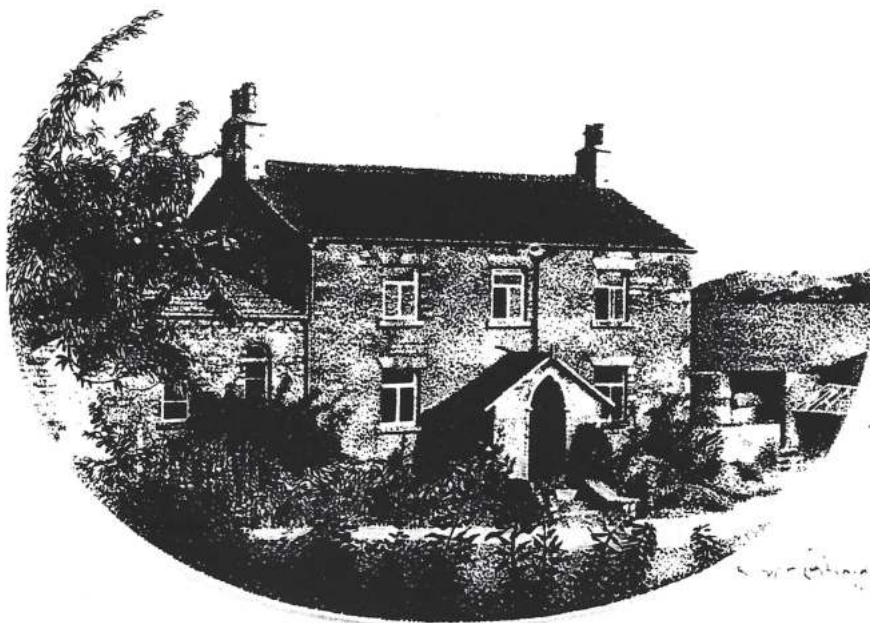
Lawkland . . . the Catholic Chapel built in 1990 and

- 1. Was the cottage at the bottom of the Street.
- 2. The top four cottages in the Street.
- 3. The Reading Room. Bought by Mr T. Bradley.
- 4. The Cottage, Town Head. Bought here by Mr Kelly, it was later sold back to the Campbell's.
- 5. Whitbeck meadow. (on the right-hand side of the road before you reach Silloth House).
- 6. Hewning Wood. (Austwick Hall Wood) Bought here by Mr C. Lord, it was later sold back to the Hall.
- 7. The Old School. This is Town Head.
