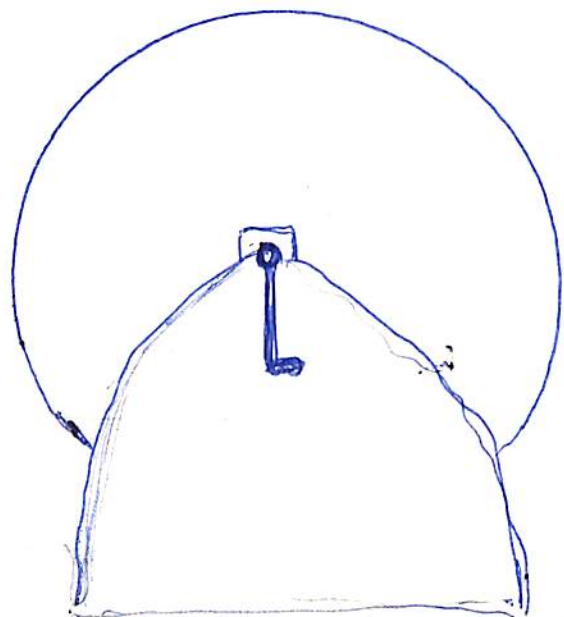
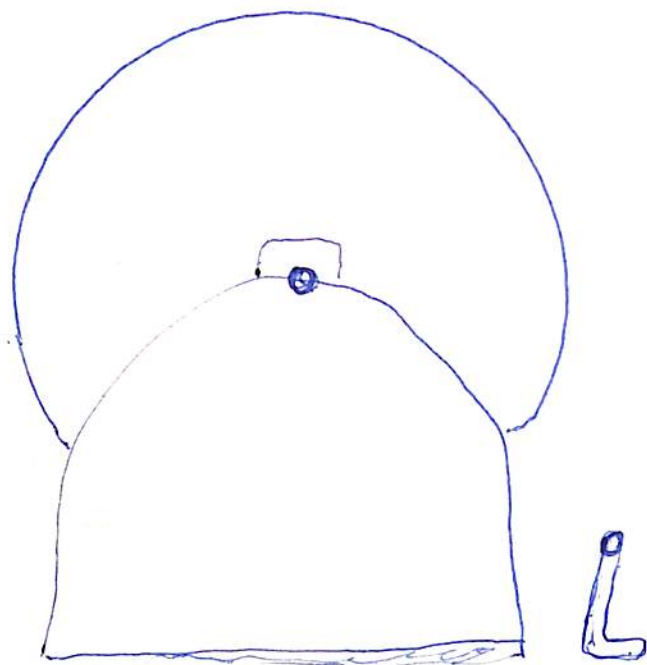
May 1984 I went with Mrs Metcalf

Quaker Burial ground

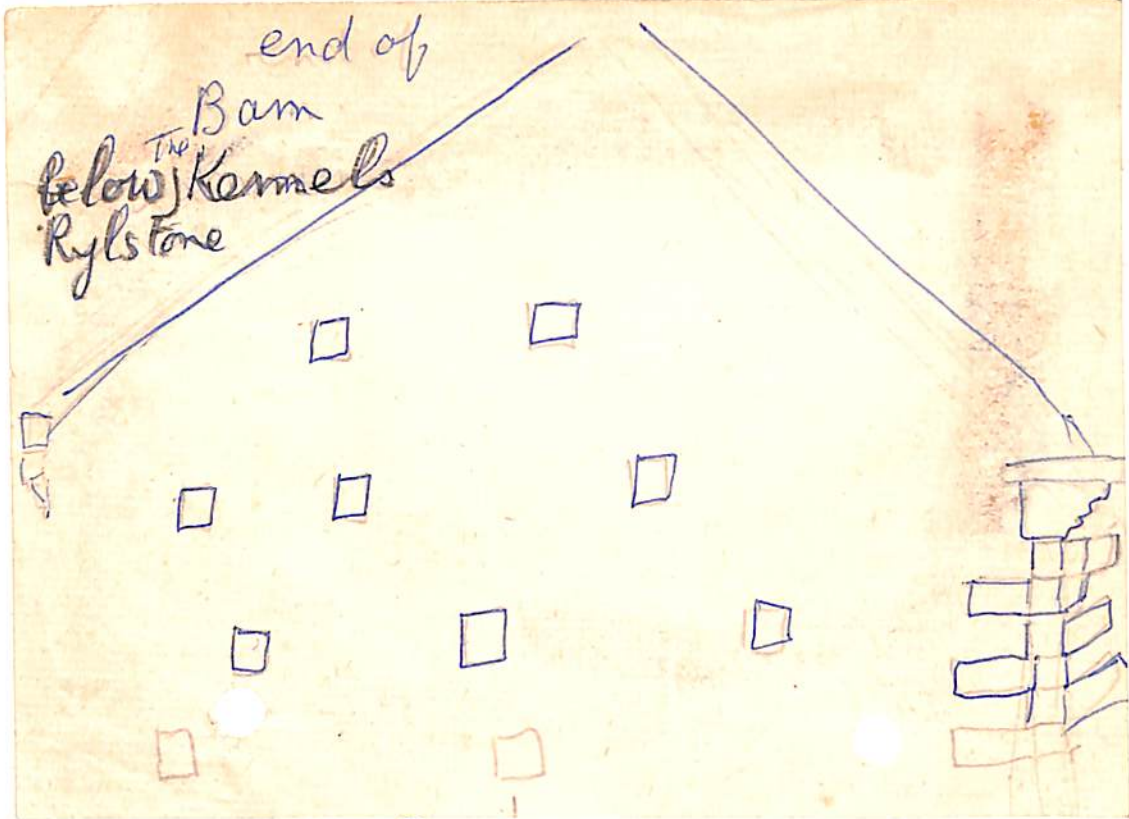

# old Burton House Rilston



This house is based upon the traditional northern plan of the middle ages. It all passage with kitchen at one end and parlour at the other. The roof is very unusual with the ridge across the hall making the parlour appear as an off-shoot. The floor and windows thus come into the gable and the side walls are blank. The kitchen is roofed at right angles to the rest. Carved doorhead RB 1696. - string course and window mouldings are all in a uniform style and certainly belong to the main building period. A backward extension of two rooms and a small parlour has a pair of large Georgian period framed windows say 1730-1760. The main hall roof has been extended over these rooms. all chimneys are asial - main fireplace on back wall of hall opposite the windows. Internal doors are stone framed with curved head.

MULLIONS.

The Main Roof Truss across the Centre of the Hall has strongly Curved Rafters which have all the appearance of being Cruck timbers, It seems likely with the early plan, that the present house replaced a Cruck and Timber built hall and that the peculiar Roof structure is an accommodation to Shortage of long timbers. 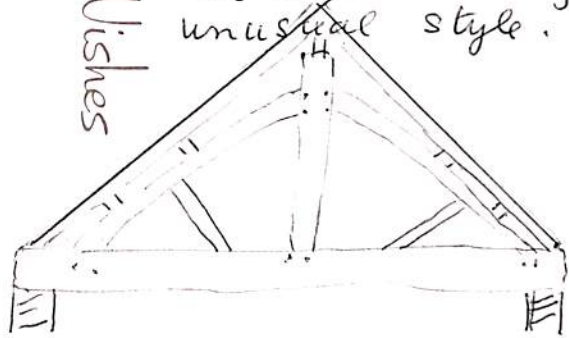

Public Opening of Rylstone Station, by LADY WILSON.
- 12-35—Special Train will leave Rylstone Station.
- 12-45—Arrive Grassington Station.  
Public Opening of Grassington Station, and Declaration of the Opening for public traffic of the Yorkshire Dales Railway, by LADY WILSON.  
Vote of thanks to LADY WILSON.  
Addresses by MR. WALTER MORRISON and others.
- 1-30—LUNCHEON.—In Marquees in Field adjoining Station.—Entrance for Directors and invited friends from Station Yard only, and for the general public from the Field.
- 4-0 —AFTERNOON TEA at the Old Hall Inn, Threshfield.
- 5-30—Special Train will leave Grassington for Skipton, calling at Rylstone.

This is the reverse side of a railway pass issued for the opening of the railway line from Skipton to Grassington in 1902. It has been sent to "The Keighley News" for forwarding to Keighley Museum by Mr. J. Bottomley, who now lives at Southport. The pass was issued to shareholders and Mr. Bottomley adds: "My mother was a shareholder and probably used the tickets on this occasion."

Rylstone Parish Mag for Aug.

Tues July 29<sup>th</sup> 1902 12-25 PM.

The first passenger train steamed into Rylstone New Station which was  <sup>tastily</sup>  favourably decorated and compared with Grassington

The school children greeted the train with much cheering

Mrs Roundell opened the station with a golden key. The whole ceremony occupied about 10 mins.

The train had a heavy load of passengers and several other trains ran during the day. a large number of people were carried up and down the line

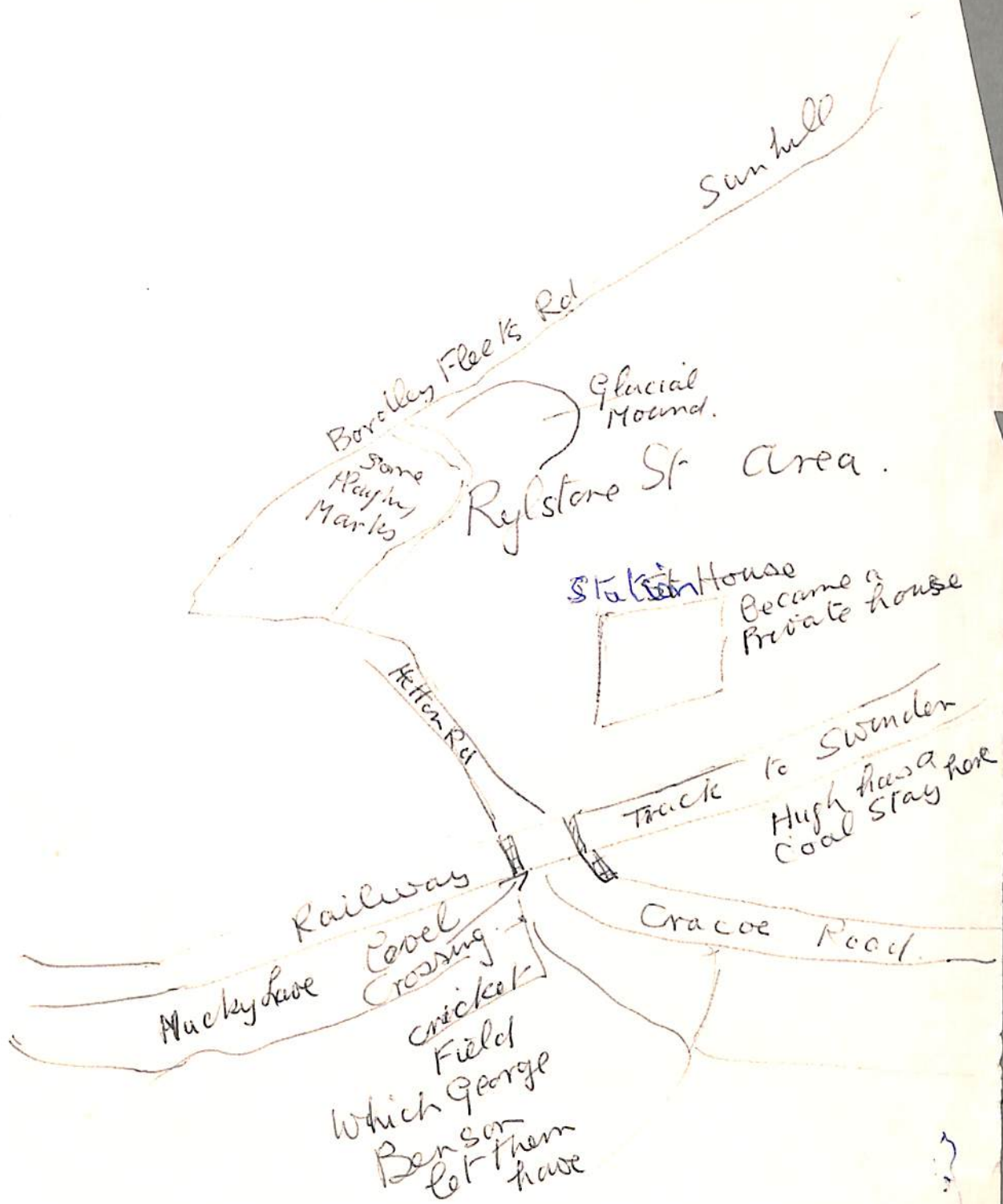
