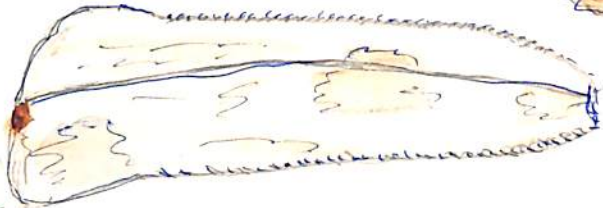



a Piece of very Black Bones and Caroline Paper found 2 Pieces we were working to gether trying to find the door way. I found a piece of Metal  thicker in the middle I think it was something Iron. but we left it un named. Louise found a  flint and a few people found (flints) which would have been left by the earlier people. We didn't find any door way that we could be certain of, but there were some grand big stones and one very smooth as if it had had a lot of wear on it.

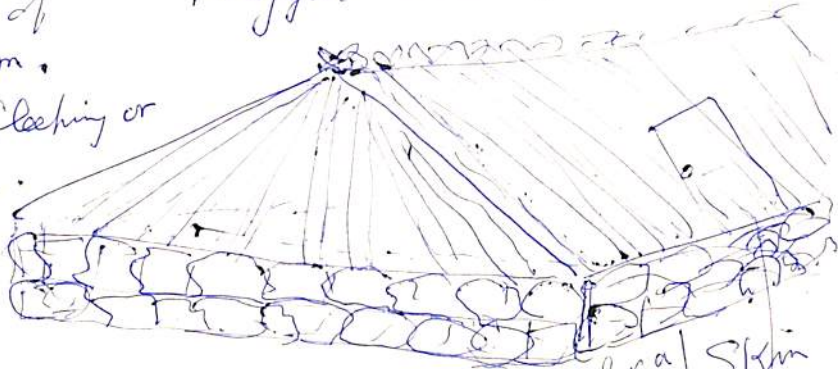

and I've no doubt, these will end up in a book.

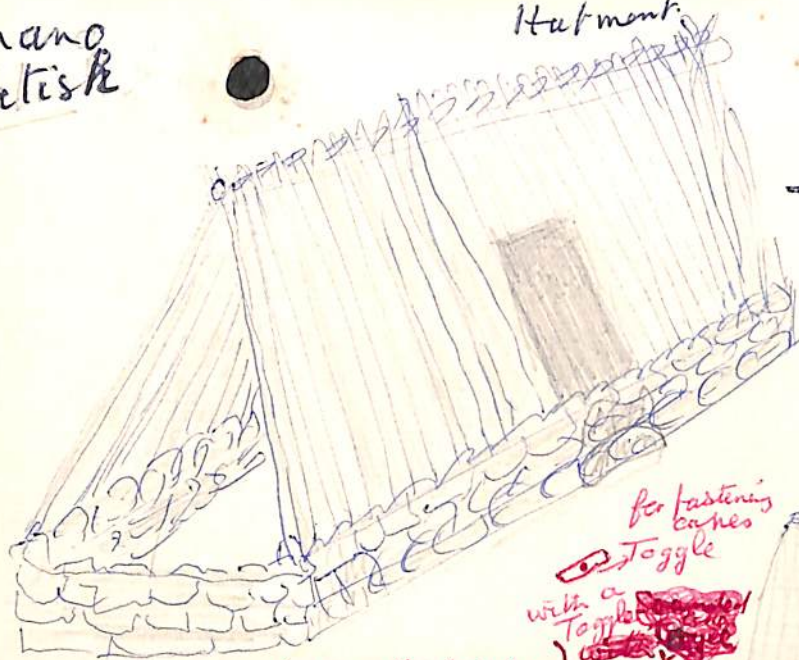

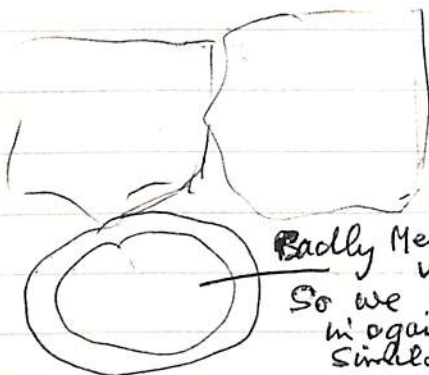

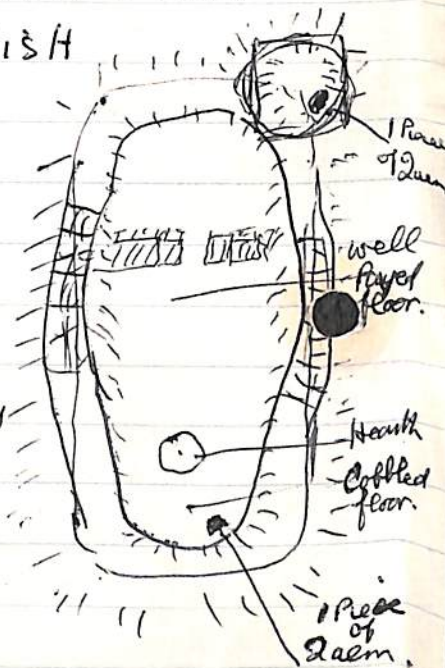
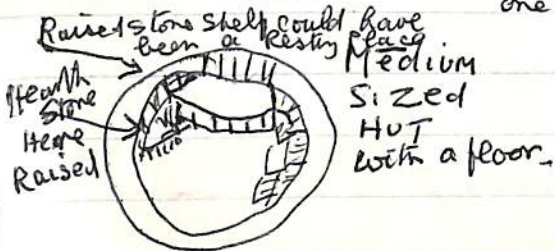
This looks like an old Quarry.

ROMAN & BRITISH



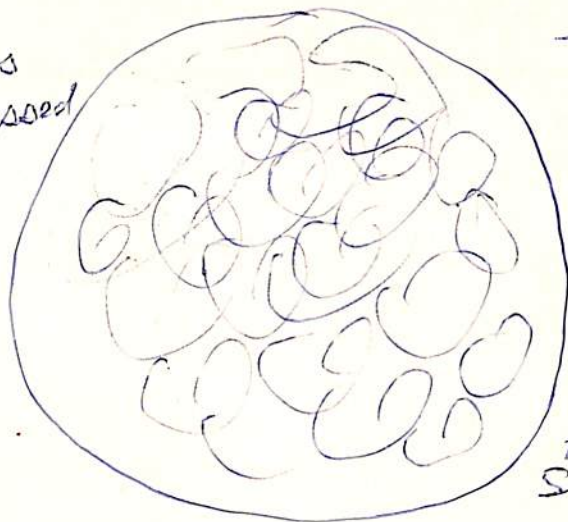
So we filled it

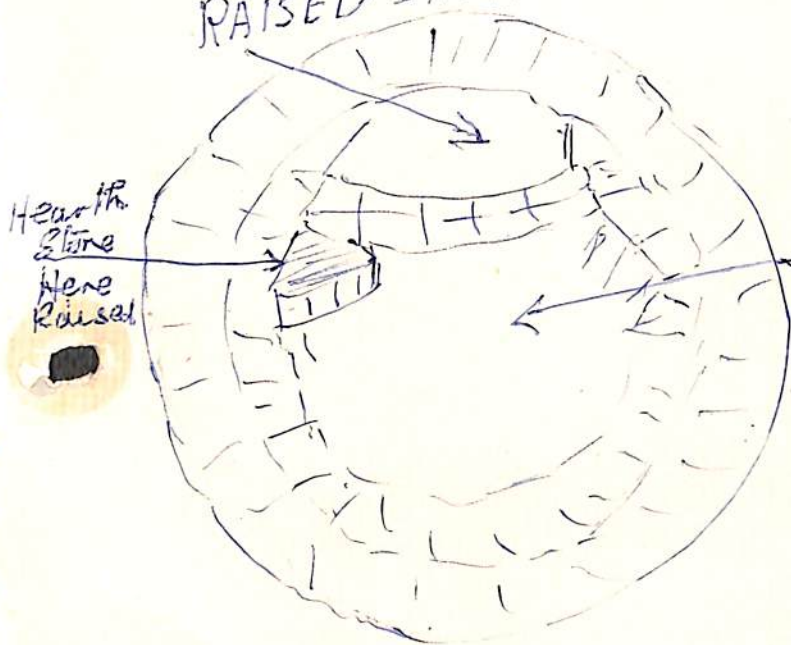
Knovle Fell - Dig. 1965.
