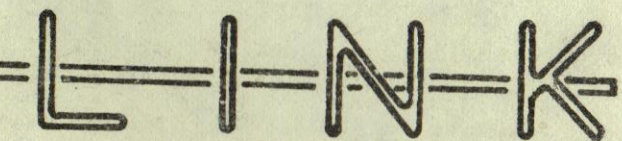
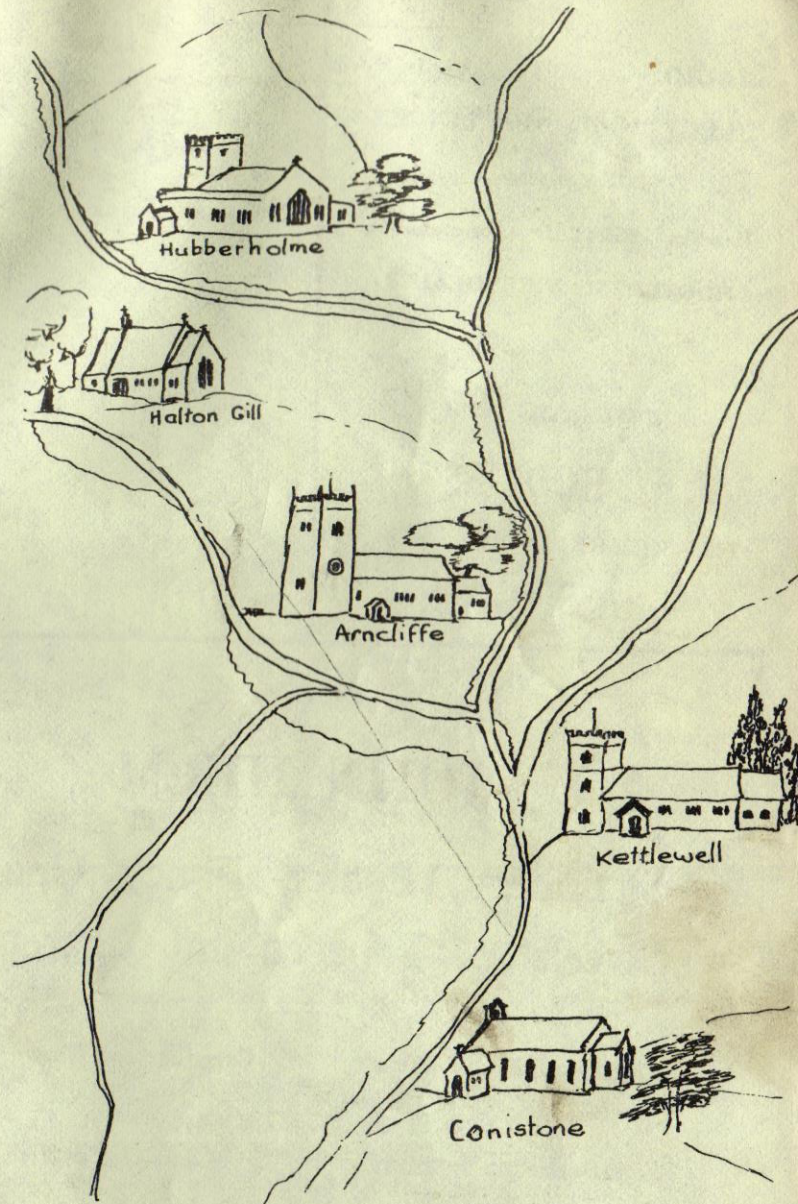

KETTLEWELL SCHOOL

Extracts from the children's diaries telling of their visit to Amsterdam

"Holland is a network of canals and in Amsterdam we went by waterbus to see some of the beautiful architecture. The waterbus sailed slowly so we had plenty of time to sight-see and it took us into the harbour to see ships in dry-dock."

"Bikes seemed to be everywhere flying up and down the road, chained to the railings, standing in stands or chained to the door handle. They were old fashioned bikes and we had to wait for bikes to go by before we could cross the road."



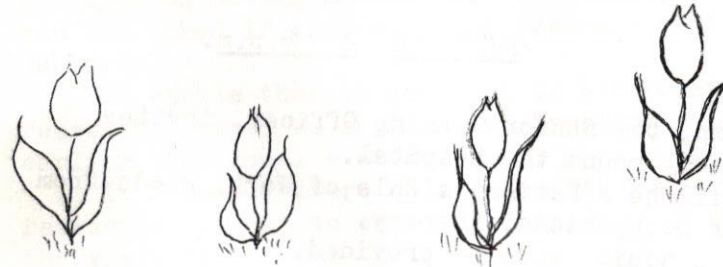
"We travelled by tram in Amsterdam. They were nearly always full and we had to stand. The tram stops were in the middle of the road and you didn't feel at all safe with cars whizzing past you in every direction."

"At the Edam cheese Farm a Dutchman in national costume told us how real Edam cheese was made. We saw the big vat and the presses. The real farm cheese is matured for nine months before it is ready to sell."

"Volendam is a pretty fishing village with cobbled streets. Along the quayside are stalls selling mussels, eels and kippers. Most of the shopkeepers wore dutch costume. The ladies wore long striped skirts, black tops, white caps and white aprons edged with lace. The men wore baggy trousers and jackets to match in balck with silver buttons."

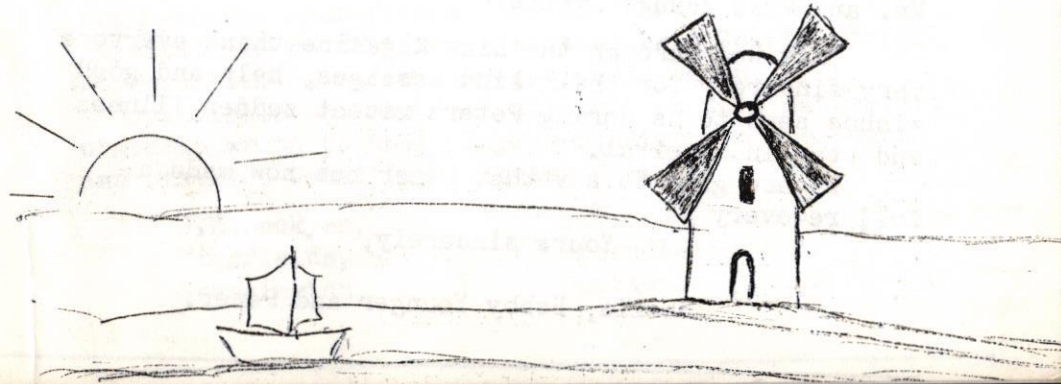


"Flying home was a lovely experience though we were very sad to leave Holland. Flying over Yeaton Airport we saw the white and orange lights of the cities through the night clouds."

The Anne Frank House

In 1940 the Netherlands were attacked by the Germans with the result that most of the country's Jews were used in brutal experiments or deported.

The fate of the Amsterdam Jews was shared by the family who emigrated to Amsterdam in 1933. The father of the family decided to build a secret hiding place to avoid deportation and persecution. The family went into hiding when the eldest daughter got a deportation order. The hiding place was up a flight of stairs hidden behind a bookcase which could only be opened from the inside. The family lived in the little room for almost two years and in this time Anne kept her diary and it has been translated into almost 50 different languages.

Dear Friends,

May I thank you for the generosity of the Easter Offering, which I much appreciate.

You will know I expect that the central authorities of the Church have been much concerned about the inequalities of Clergy pay. There have in the past been wide differences of income for clergymen in different (often neighbouring) Parishes. These differences have had no sensible basis, depending as they did on accidents of History, in that the money available to pay the Vicar came from endowments left by benefactors in the past.

Arrangements are now made to see that each man gets approximately the same income, which includes the amount he receives in fees and Easter Offering.

This means that although what you put in the Easter Offering does not directly increase the Vicar's income, it does with all the other Easter Offerings of the Diocese help to increase the income of all the clergy of the Diocese.

I shall be away on holiday for part of June, the Rev'd Gordon Turvey will be taking the services on June 13th. and 20th. He and Mrs. Turvey will be staying at the Vicarage and I know that you will make them welcome. The Rev'd J. THE HUMANITY OF JESUS - Leon Morris

Greek mythology abounds in stories of gods who walked the earth like men. They looked like men. They acted like men. But at the critical point they would throw aside their disguise and by using their divine power show themselves for what they were. They were never really men, but gods in disguise.

To this day some Christians think of Jesus in much the same way. They picture him as God, walking among men. He looked like a man. He spoke like a man. He lived like a man. But they do not think of him as really being a man. They shrink from taking seriously those parts of Scripture which speak of his limitations. In effect they understand him as God, not man.

But if we are to be faithful to the New Testament we cannot accept the addition, "not man". Christians have always agreed that Jesus must be seen as fully man. To say less is to be a heretic. Jesus was a man of his time, a first-century Palestinian Jew. It may not be easy to combine the thoughts of Deity and humanity, but the evidence allows us no alternative.
